

Tax Requirements for Students Are Listed by I. R. S.

Students in Northern Texas who work part-time or summers may have a refund coming on their 1967 federal income tax returns, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, said this week.

Students are required to file a tax return if they earned \$600 or more. If they earned less than \$600 and taxes were withheld from wages by their employers, they should file a return in order to obtain a refund of the tax withheld from their wages.

Unmarried students who earn ess than \$900 will not owe any federal income tax. They are entitled to claim the usual \$600 personal exemption, plus a \$300 minimum standard deduction.

Students are entitled to claim their own personal exemption when filing a tax return, Mr. Campbell said. Parents who furnish more than one-half the cost of support for their child who is a full-time student may also claim an exemption on their tax return, unless the child is married and is filing a joint return with his or her spouse.




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
