When the final fatal traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967 it is estimated that the death count for Texas is expected to be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966. If this proves true, then, it will be the first reduction in traffic deaths since 1960. 





Farmers to Receive **Payments Report**

Farmers will benefit from a new reporting service which has been inaugurated by ASCS, R. J. Owens, chairman of the Foard ASC County Committee, announce this week. A report of payments made to each farmer under ASC, cotton, feed grain, wheat, and other direct payment programs during 1967 will be mailed to the farmer during the latter part of January. This report is expected to be helpful in preparing individual income tax returns. The same information must also be furnished to the Internal Revenue Service in accordance with a requirement of

It is estimated that over three million farmers will receive this report, he said. This information is being gathered from county offices and summarized by computers located at New Orleans and Kansas City. The reports are being printed by the computers and mailed direct to farmers. A job of this size could not be completed without an automated system, added Mr. Owens.

Since this is the first year for a service of this magnitude, there are bound to be a few problems. He suggested that farmers carefully read the explanation on the report and check the accuracy of the total reported by comparing it with farm records. If an error is discovered, the nearest ASCS county office should be contacted to have the mistake corrected. County offices have been instructed to give farmers whatever assistance they need regardless of where the farm is located.

Matador Hunters Bag 800 Quail in Season

Approximately 800 quail were killed by 250 hunters on the Matador Wildlife Management Area, 11 miles northwest of Paducah in Cottle County, during the six, twoday public hunts, according to Biologist Bob Sinclair of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The hunts were held between Nov. 11 and Dec. 17, with two days hunting allowed per hunter. The average kill was 3.12 birds.
