# GENERAL RAINS LAST WEEK GIVE BOOST TO COUNTY

## Wildcats Dump Petrolia 59 to 46

Crowell's Wildcats go off to a slow start in their game with Petrolia Tuesday night. They were able to score only 2 points in the first 4 minutes while the Pirates pumped in 8. Then Wildcat guard, Lynn Rader, found the range and with Billy Hord sweeping the backboards, Crowell pulled out in front and was never pressed too hard the rest of the game.

Charles Dodd tipped in a field goal just as the buzzer ended the first quarter with Crowell leading Petrolia 15 to 10.

Rader got the Wildcats off to a good start in the second quarter as he sank a field goal and two free throws. Fine defensive plays by Joe Ray Burkett and Billy Hord helped Crowell gain a comfortable 29-15 half-time lead.

Third quarter action saw each team score 15 points and Coach Ben Tyler's crew carried their 14 point lead into the fourth period. Crowell led at this point 44 to 30.

As the fourth quarter got underway, play began to get a little wild when game officials let the contest get out of control occasionally. One player from each team left the playing floor at the request of the referees; the game then settled back to a normal pace.

The game ended as Gary Cates sank a jump shot in the final second of the game, from approximately 35 feet.

For Crowell, Lynn Rader had 30 points and Joe Ray Burkett 8. Petrolia's Jones had 14, followed closely by Shays with 11.

### Girls Lose 74-25

In the girls game, Crowell found points to be very scarce, as they could muster only 25 for the game. Petrolia presented a very tough defense and an even more potent offense. They were able to score 74 points and win the game handily.

Janis Whitley was top scorer for Crowell with 11 points, followed by Cindy Erwin's 8. For Petrolia, Matthews had 38 and Holland 28.

Tomorrow night, Friday, the two Wildcat teams go to Archer City for conference games, and next Tuesday night, January 30, they go to Knox City for two Conference games.

### District Records

Under the new basketball coach, Ben Tyler, the boys' team has a 4 wins and 4 loss record in district play. The girls' win over Holliday was their first conference win of the season.

All records for January rainfall in this county were shattered during the past week as a five-day rain brought a total of 5.05 inches, as measured by the government gauge. Rainfall records for the county go back to 1913, and during the ensuing 55 years, the most moisture ever received in January, prior to this year, was in 1941 when 3.56 inches fell. The only other January when as much as three inches fell was 1949 with 3.39 inches.

The rain began falling Wednesday night of last week, and continued through Monday of this week. At times it was only a light mist, with intermittent heavy showers during the period.

Up to Saturday morning, the government gauge had measured 2.12 inches, and the heaviest period of rain fell Saturday night, Sunday and Monday with a total of 2.93 inches recorded in that three-day period. A norther Monday night cleared out the clouds.

The moisture fell slowly and practically all of it soaked in until Sunday, when the ground could hold no more and it began to run off. Relatively warm weather during the rainy spell prevented the usual icing which accompanies winter moisture.

This area had been extremely dry—nothing unusual for Foard County—and the benefits to be derived from this winter moisture are incalculable.

# CITY OF CROWELL TO GO ON GREENBELT WATER SYSTEM

Residents of Crowell will within the next week be getting their water from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Mayor Robert Kincaid said Tuesday that as soon as connections can be made to furnish water to the Margaret customers, the new supply of water will be cut in to the local system.

Residents of Crowell voted several years ago to join the Greenbelt Authority to assure the city a dependable source of water. A line was laid during the past year from Quanah to Crowell to bring the water here.

The source of water will be a lake in the Clarendon-Hedley vicinity. The Authority has been furnishing water to Childress and

Quanah for over a year now. With the new source of water, rates were revised at a meeting of the City Council last week. The new rates follow:

Minimum: 2,000 gallons, \$4.00.  
Next 8,000 gallons, \$4.80 (60¢ per thousand.)  
Next 15,000 gallons, \$8.25 (55¢ per thousand.)  
Next 15,000 gallons, \$7.50 (50¢ per thousand.)  
All over 40,000 gallons, 45¢ per thousand.

Mayor Kincaid reassured the Margaret customers that water will be supplied to them through the new system.

These new rates will be effective on the February 1 billing by the City, the mayor added.

## HemisFair '68 Opens Doors of Press Center

HemisFair '68 opened the doors Jan. 15 on its \$250,000 press center, a 14,000 square foot structure for use by newsmen covering the six-month World's Fair.

The center, located near two of the main gates on the 92.3 acre fairgrounds, will have desks, telephones and typewriters for 40 permanent news representatives, plus facilities for Western Union and wire services, sound-proof radio and television rooms for interviews and a photo and information library.

The HemisFair Press Club, located 30 yards across the plaza from the huge center, will be located in a 75-year-old house, one of 27 restored on the grounds for use as restaurants at the fair. It will have a German restaurant open to the public on the ground floor and the press club open only to accredited newsmen on the second floor.

Accreditation of news media for the April 6-Oct. 6 World's Fair will begin in late January. Newsmen attending opening week activities will be issued temporary passes, and those who stay for longer periods or attend after the first week's activities will be issued permanent passes, complete with a color photo of the applicant.

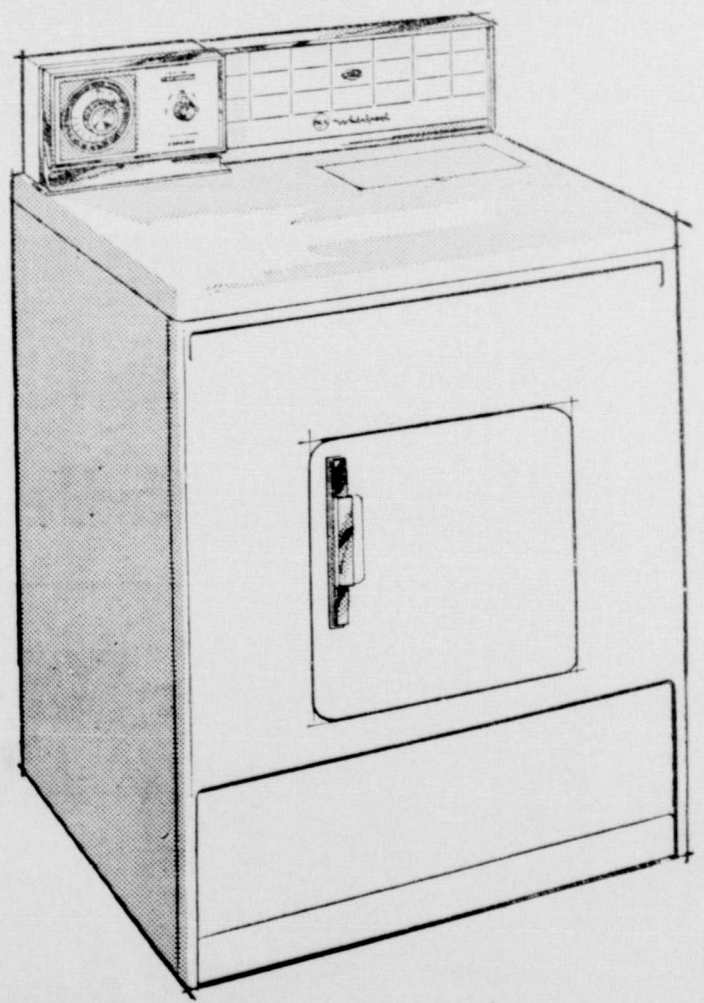

**Increased Social Security Benefits to Be Paid to Foard County Residents**

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on Tuesday, January 2, will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 per cent in the social security checks of about 500 men, women and children in the Foard County area, according to Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are figuring the increases for all 23,700,000 social security beneficiaries around the country and will finish the task in time to include the increases in the checks delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Residents of the Crowell area can expect the first increased check on Saturday, March 2, one day earlier than the usual 3rd of the month delivery of social security benefit checks. Under a recent arrangement with the Treasury

Department and the Post Office, social security checks are delivered a day early instead of a day late when the 3rd of the month falls on a Sunday or holiday.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 per cent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The average benefit payable to a retiree worker, about \$86, will be raised to \$98, an increase of \$12 a month. The average couple's benefit, now \$145, will go up to \$165; and the current average of \$75 to \$88.

The last increase in social security benefits amounted to 7 per cent, and was effective January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them the children of working fathers who have died.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from the currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40. In the future, the maximum payable monthly to any one family can be as high as \$343.40.

Pat Maxwell of Holliday was high point man for the winners with 20 points.

Mr. Campbell pointed out that instructions you need to file Schedule B are on the schedule itself. Schedule B is also used to report income from rents, royalties, partnerships, estates and trusts.

Taxpayers should not count on receiving all the federal tax forms they need in the mailing they receive in January. It is impossible for IRS to know in advance which forms and schedules a taxpayer may need.

If you find you need a form you do not have, check with your local bank, post office, or nearest IRS office.

**NEW WATER RATES FOR CITY**

The City of Crowell will be receiving its water supply from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority within the next few days.

Since we will be receiving and using water from this new source, the following water rates will be in effect, beginning with the February 1 bills:

# REGISTER TO VOTE BY NEXT WEDNESDAY

With the deadline for registration only a few days away, Texas voters over 60 years old have been reminded of a new law which requires every voter to register, regardless of age or place of residence. Heretofore, voters over 60 years old were required to register only if they lived in a city of ten thousand or more inhabitants. Wednesday of next week, January 31, is the last day to apply for a registration certificate.

Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill issued the reminder in a statement summarizing registration requirements. As Secretary of State, Hill also has the title of chief election officer of Texas. He said that anyone who is now eligible to vote or who will become eligible by February 28, 1969, may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and runs through February of 1969.

Hill emphasized that registration for most voters will close on Wednesday of next week, and they will not be permitted to register after that date. The only persons

who may register after the January 31 deadline are new residents who move to Texas after October 1, 1967, and persons who become 21 years old or become naturalized citizens after January 31, 1968.

An application form printed in this week's paper may be used to apply for a registration certificate by mail. The law provides that applications by mail must bear a postmark not later than January 31. An application which is mailed too late to be postmarked on that date does not comply with the law, even though it is deposited in a letter box or a post office drop box before the deadline. This reminder is especially important for patrons of small post offices, some of which close as early as 4:30 in the afternoon.

Voters may also register in person at the county tax assessor-collector's office in the court house.

## Protective Headgear Necessary When Riding Motorcycle

The law governing the wearing of protective headgear for motorcycle operators and passengers went into effect January 1, 1968, announced Major Luther Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Moore stated, "Effective January 1, 1968, no person may operate a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless he wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety, nor may any person carry a passenger on a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless the passenger wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety. No person may ride as a passenger on a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless the passenger wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety."

The major also added any peace officer may stop and detain any motorcycle operator or passenger for the purpose of inspecting his protective headgear to determine if the headgear is of a style and make approved by the department. A person who violates this law is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00.

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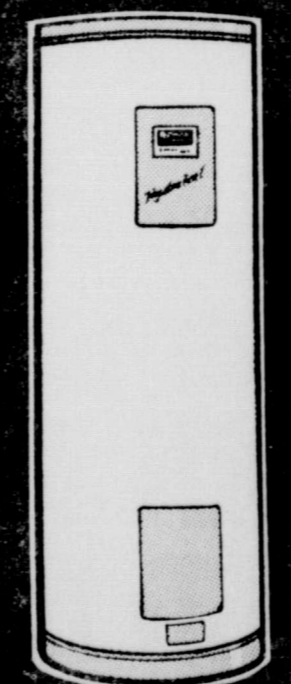


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
