Foard County farmers desiring to take part in the survey should take their trash samples to the Glenn Cato barn at Lockett where a trash machine with drums especially made for this type of survey and a heat table is set up to make the boll weevil count and adjust to a per-acre

The survey will reveal the degree of overwintering population and provide an indication of bollweevil emergence during the coming growing season.

The farmers will also be able on their farms. Cleaning up these sites will greatly reduce insect problems.

To take the trash sample, the farmer will need a yard-square on the ground where the sample is to be taken. After marking off of Fort Worth. this yard-square area, the frame is removed and the trash within the marked area is put in a bag. Soil to a depth of one-quarter to one-half inch should be taken to make sure no trash or bollweevils are left behind. Two or three

Only ground trash samples from the same type of ground the actual yield of lint cotton cover should be placed in the same bag. Trash samples should be taken from all types of ground cover that could possibly afford overwintering bollweevil protec-




