4-H AND F. F. A. PROJECT SHOW SET FOR SATURDAY

March 15 Is Final Date to Sign up for A. S. C. Programs

In the February newsletter by the Foard County A. S. C. S. office, Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager, stated "If you are earning a payment under the cotton, wheat and/or feed grain, you cannot have an interest in any other farm that exceeds its allotment or base. For this purpose, husband, wife, heirs, and minor children's interest are considered. Landlords cannot escape this responsibility by leasing their land to others. This is very important so it is your responsibility as operator or owner to see that all farms in which you have an interest are complying with program provisions where payments are involved."

Farmers were also reminded that March 15, 1968, is the final date to sign up in the annual programs to earn price support or diversion payments. Mrs. Reeder said that advance payments can be made for one-half of the diversion payment earned on cotton and feed grain. No advance payments will be made on price support or wheat certificates.

Finally, Mrs. Reeder said, "You are urged to certify your wheat acreage as soon as you have disposed of your excess by grazing or plowing under. We will be glad to assist you in making this determination before you dispose of the excess, if you so desire."

Graham Purcell Winner of Texas 4-H Alumni Award

U. S. Congressman Graham B. Purcell of Wichita Falls has been named winner of the Texas 4-H Alumni Award for the past year, according to an announcement from the Texas 4-H Club offices at College Station.

Purcell represents the 13th Congressional District of Texas and is a member of the House Agricultural Committee and chairman of the subcommittee for livestock and grains.

New Historical Marker Placed on Court House Lawn

New Marker Lists First Foard County Officials

The official Texas Historical marker for first county officers of Foard County was erected last week, Mrs. Virgil Johnson, chairman of the Foard County Historical Survey Committee, announced this week.

The marker was placed on the west side of the court house square. Dedication plans will be announced at a later date by Mrs. Johnson.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 18 by 28 inches and is sponsored by the Foard County Historical Survey Committee.

This is the fifth official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Foard County.

The inscription on the marker reads: "First officials of Foard County. Committee appointed by the Legislature to organize county met in (Old) Margaret April 4, 1891. County divided into four precincts. Election held April 27. Following officials elected: Judge, J. C. Roberts; Attorney, G. T. Brown; Clerk, G. W. Thompson; Sheriff, S. J. Moore; Tax Assessor, J. A. Wright; Treasurer, J. W. Magee; Surveyor, Harry Sappington; Animal & Hide Inspector, T. H. Benson. Commissioners: John Wesley, J. W. Moore, John B. Stegar, W. T. McDaniel. (1967)"

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5-year RAMPS program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve, and Survey Texas history. More than 3,300 official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPS program was begun in 1964.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours and to acquaint the people of Foard County with their own unique historical past.

Women's Service League Hears Talk on Air Travel

In this world of constant and rapid change, the phenomenal rise of air travel has staggered the imagination. More and more, the air mode of travel is becoming commonplace. Just how necessary airports and airplanes have become was pointed out by Don Hawkins of Quannah, who in partnership with his brother, Anson, own and operate the Hawkins Aircraft Co. of Quannah.

Speaking before the Women's Service League at the noon luncheon meeting Thursday, Feb. 29, he based his talk upon the question, "How does the airport and air travel improve the economy of your area?"

Many high schools are introducing pilot training as a course along with automobile driver's education. Among them is Vernon High School, which this year offered the course. The Texas Aeronautics Commission will help any community to acquire an airport, and will extend loans to a maximum of \$27,000.00, Hawkins said.

"The future is in the air," was Hawkins' prophecy.
