## Pupils in Methodist Church Headstart Program



## "Headstart" Program Ended Wednesday

The "Headstart" program sponsored by the Methodist Church closed Wednesday with a "sharing" program.

The school began March 18 and met every week day from 8:30 until 11 a. m. The purpose of the school was to help children who will be enrolled in the first grade in the fall to feel "at home" in the new school situation and to give the children experiences that will help them in their later school activities.

This was done by teaching them to use some school supplies, use books correctly, work together, share, follow directions, develop good health habits, listen to stories and music, make conversation, and become familiar with the community as a whole. The children were exposed to colors, letters, numbers, concepts of shapes, easel painting, finger painting, clay, cutting with scissors. Each child had the opportunity for individual creativeness.

The school was the outgrowth of the church's concern for children who were not already enrolled in kindergarten and who might experience difficulty in beginning first grade. All teachers and workers were volunteer and the school was supported by members of the church and other interested persons.

## Hail Accompanies Turbulent Weather Late Tuesday

### Rains Falling Since Last Thursday Total 2.02 Inches

Cool, cloudy weather over this area late last week brought some needed moisture to the area.

Scattered showers fell almost all day Thursday, and the official measurement here in Crowell was .75 inch. A light mist fell part of Friday, but no measurable amount of moisture was received.

Reports from over the county varied greatly, with the south and east parts receiving less than the north and west parts.

Cloudy skies hung over this area all during the week end and official measurements showed .16 inch Saturday, .31 inch Sunday, .25 inch Monday for a total of 1.47 inches.

Then, on Tuesday afternoon, another .55 inch fell to bring the total for the week up to 2.02 inches. Turbulent weather Tuesday brought some hail here in Crowell and one particularly black cloud to the south sent Crowell residents scurrying for storm cellars.

Bax Middlebrook, Foard County resident for more than seventy years, succumbed in the Foard County Hospital Wednesday of last week.

Funeral services for Mr. Middlebrook were conducted at 10 a. m., Friday from the Margaret Baptist Church with Rev. Lawrence Cox of Frederick, Okla., a former pastor, and Rev. E. H. Martin, pastor of the Margaret Methodist Church, officiating.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Samuel Baxter Middlebrook, Sr., was born April 8, 1880, at Sweet Home, Texas, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Middlebrook. He moved to the old Beaver Creek community, south of Vernon, with his parents in 1888 and then moved to the Margaret community in 1896.

He was married to Miss Frances Dunn on April 17, 1906, at Vernon and they lived at Margaret where he was engaged in farming.

Mr. Middlebrook was a charter member of the Margaret Baptist Church, and had served as a deacon for many years. He had been Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, and had served on the school board for the Margaret School. He was a member of the Thalia Lodge No. 666, A. F. & A. M.

He is survived by his widow; two sons, S. B. Middlebrook, Jr., of Vernon and Billy Jake Middlebrook of Kermit; one daughter, Mrs. Melvin Moore of Denver City; one sister, Mrs. Mollie Jameson of Pecos; three grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.
