Lewis Sloan, 67, resident of Foard County for sixty years, died in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring Saturday morning after a long illness.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:30 p. m. Monday in the Methodist Church here with the pastor, Rev. Ernest McGaughey, and County Judge Leslie Thomas officiating.

Burial was in the Crowell Cemetery with Crowell Masonic Lodge conducting graveside rites. Womack Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Sloan was born in Lingleville, Texas, June 5, 1900, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Sloan. He and his parents moved to Foard County in 1908. He was married to the former Miss Eva Hocker of Gainesville on April 28, 1928, in Quannah.

Mr. Sloan was a former professional baseball player, having played with the West Texas-New Mexico league and in all-star games in Denver, 1921-1928. He served with the army unit at Meridian College at Meridian during World War I. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Mr. Sloan is survived by his wife; one brother, Dr. Roy C. Sloan of Newton, Iowa; two sisters, Mrs. Evelyn White and Miss Inez Sloan, both of Lubbock.

Absentee Balloting in Second Primary Started May 22

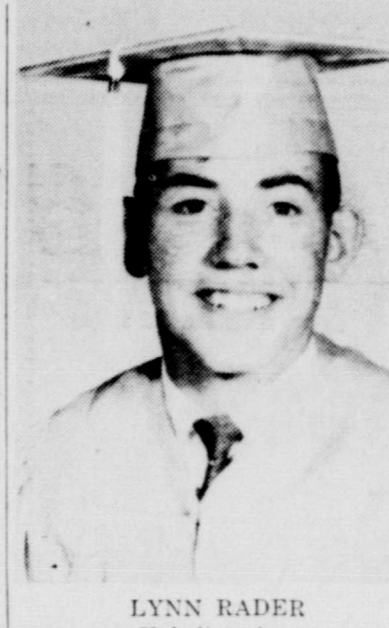
Absentee balloting by personal appearance for the second Democratic primary in Foard County got underway Wednesday, May 22. Foard residents will ballot in only two races:

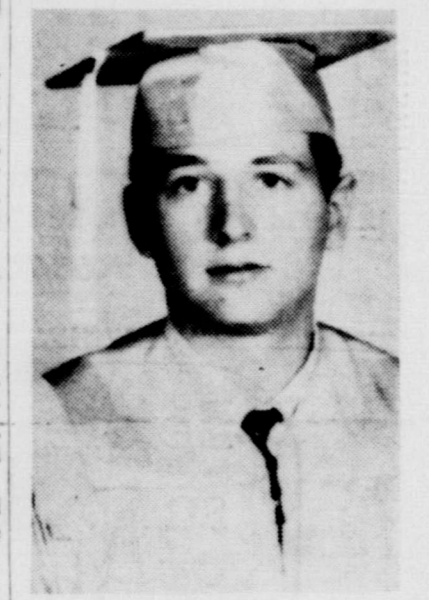

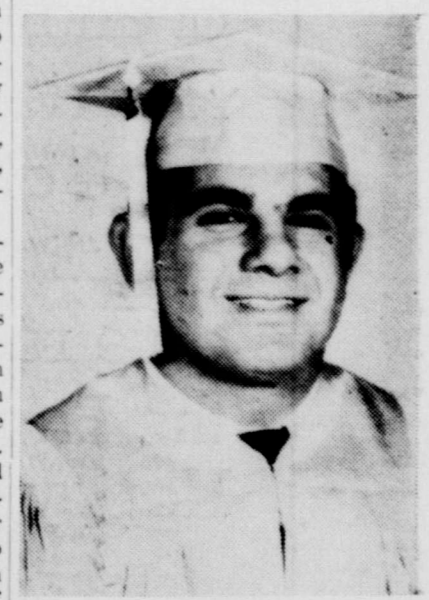

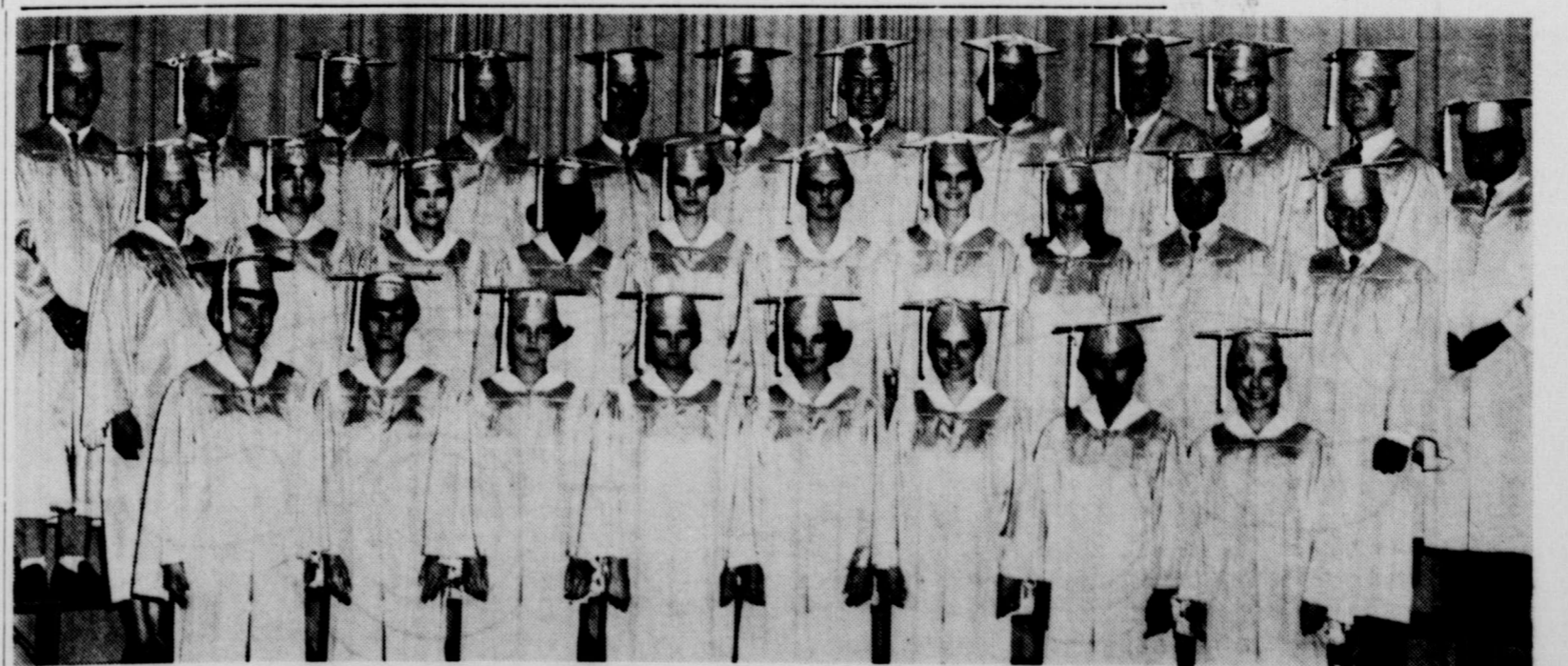
A reception for the seniors, their parents, relatives, the high school faculty, friends and members on the program will be given in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Bird following the program.

THIRTY YEARS AGO

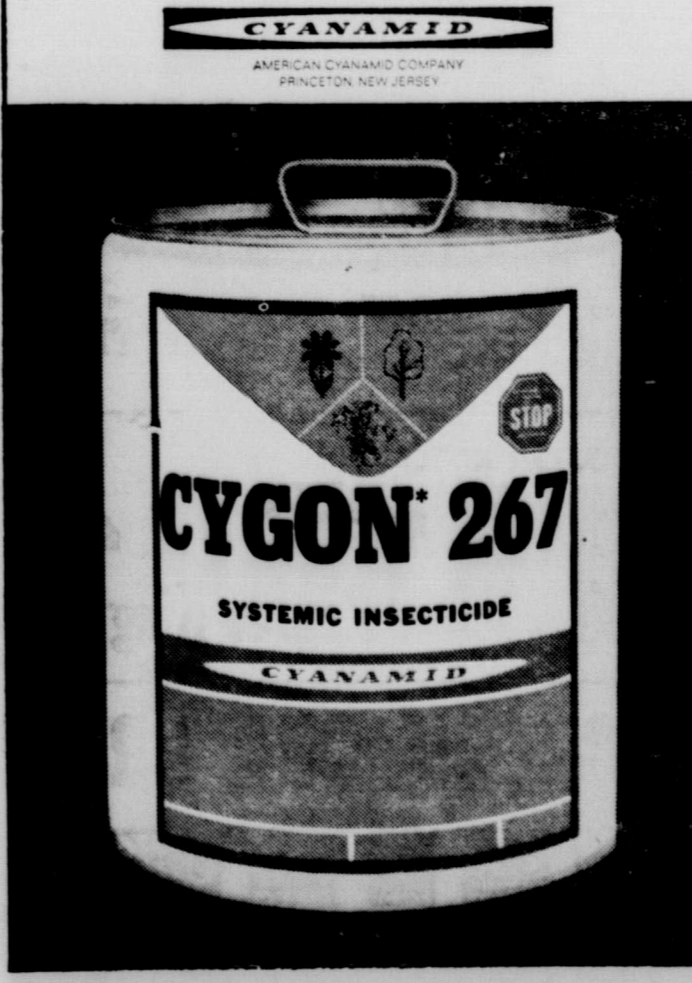

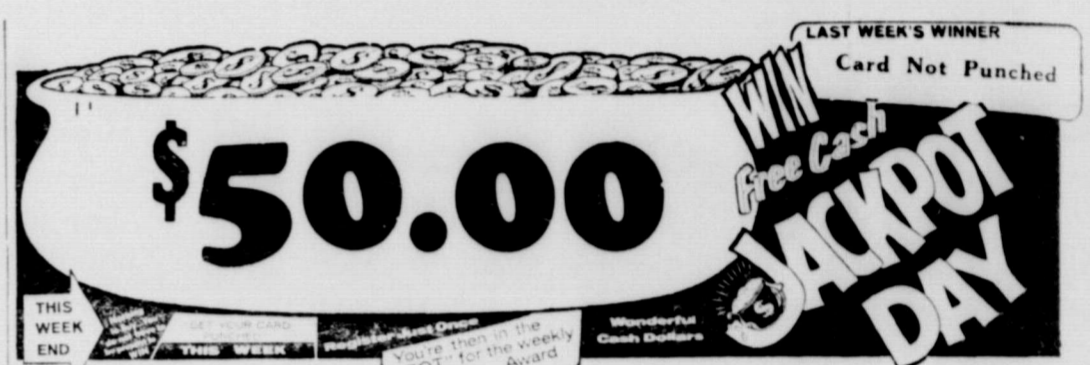

We have the capacity to assure not only food and shelter, but also hope and dignity and opportunity for all men.
Now is the time for every American to recognize and accept personal involvement in the efforts toward that goal. It is an undertaking worthy of the best each of us has to offer. It is a part of our duty to our fellow men and our Creator.
