## HAIL, WIND, RAIN DAMAGE FOARD COUNTY CROPS FRIDAY NIGHT

High winds, driving rain and hail sweeping across Foard County last Friday night, did extensive damage to Foard County's wheat crop, and washed out young cotton.

Official rain measurement here in Crowell was 2.2 inches. Friday night's rain fell in a relatively short time, and caused washing in many fields in the county, covering up or washing out young cotton.

Reports are that the most heavy damage from the wind and hail occurred to wheat in the southeast part of the county with reports of damage ranging from 20 to 50 per cent.

Nearly all parts of the county received at least 2 inches of rain during the storm which sent many Crowell residents scurrying to storm cellars.

Harvesting of the county's hoped-for bumper crop had just begun to get underway when the rains came and harvest will be stopped until fields dry out sufficiently for the combines to operate.

Before the Friday night moisture was received, the county had just begun to harvest wheat and barley and oats. The elevators had received just over 50,000 bushels of wheat and about 20,000 bushels of barley.

Some exceptional yields of barley were reported, with one field making about 90 bushels per acre. Some wheat was cut Tuesday afternoon as fields began to dry out.

Cates, Jr. Walter Ambrose Cates was born August 12, 1888, in Cooke County, Texas, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Cates. He was a retired farmer and rancher and a member of the Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death by one daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Horn of Canyon, a few years ago.

## Joy Wins Judgeship

### Foard County Voters Give Native-Son James Joy 10-1 Vote over His Opponent

Foard County voters gave Preston Smith an almost 3 to 1 edge, and Foard County native James A. Joy a 10 to 1 edge in the second Democratic primary held last Saturday.

In the two races appearing on the ballot, Foard voters went for Preston Smith 299 to the 106

votes cast for Don Yarborough in the governor's race, and in the run-off battle for Associate Justice, 7th Court of Civil Appeals, Foard voters favored Foard County native James A. Joy 365 to 34 votes for his opponent, Jack Hazlewood.

According to reports in the daily newspapers, Joy defeated Hazlewood over the 46-county district to win the nomination for the judgeship. In the first primary, Joy received about 10,000 less votes than Hazlewood.

In Saturday's second primary, Joy drew 49,191 votes, compared to 44,151 for Hazlewood, Amarillo attorney. Joy is now judge of the 64th District Court of Hale, Swisher and Castro counties.

Individual returns from the county's voting boxes showed the following results:

Precincts 1 and 3: 32 votes cast; Smith 27, Yarborough 5; Hazlewood 2, Joy 27.

Precincts 2 and 4, 251 votes cast; 196 for Smith, 54 for Yarborough; 15 for Hazlewood, 233 for Joy.

Precinct 5, 33 votes total: 23 for Smith, 10 for Yarborough; 10 for Hazlewood, 23 for Joy.

Precincts 6 and 7, 53 votes cast; 36 for Smith, 17 for Yarborough; 2 for Hazlewood, 51 for Joy.

Precinct 8: 6 for Smith, 12 for Yarborough; 0 for Hazlewood, 18 for Joy.

Precinct 11, 19 votes cast; 11 for Smith, 8 for Yarborough; 5 for Hazlewood, 13 for Joy.

Total votes cast in county 406; 299 for Smith, 106 for Yarborough; 34 for Hazlewood, 365 for Joy.

## Oil and Gas Wells Provide \$2.9 Million a Year to Foard County's Economy

Oil and gas wells provide approximately \$2.9 million a year to Foard County's economic output, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Based on most recent U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, the Association compilation showed that Foard County produced crude oil valued at \$2.8 million in 1966 and natural gas worth \$40,000.

Texas oil production in 1967, responding to demands for more domestic crude as a result of the Israeli-Arab conflict, totaled 1,050,000,000 barrels, a statewide increase over 1966 of about 5 per cent. Production last year varied widely among state railroad commission districts, however, ranging from 3.5 per cent below 1966 to 15 per cent above.

"Production from Foard County last summer helped prevent any oil scarcity for U. S. consumers at a time when one-third of the world's supply was cut off," said Corbin J. Robertson, Houston, Association president. "We must keep in mind, however, that it may be difficult for Texas fields to sustain production in future emergencies if the discovery of new reserves continues to lag, due to lack of exploratory drilling."

The annual study showed that Foard County ranked 141st among Texas counties in total value of its production of some 958,000 barrels of oil and 309 million cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas oil men, according to Rinehart's yearbook, drilled four wells in the county risking some \$64,000. All of them were dry holes.

County landowners and others with mineral interests cashed royalty checks totaling about \$361,000 during the year. Likewise, the county's flow of oil and gas generates \$134,000 a year in production taxes paid by producers and royalty owners to the state treasury.

From the News...

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, June 9, 1938, issue of The Foard County News:

Although there were very few days since the 1938 wheat harvest started in Foard County last week in which wheat was dry enough to be cut, approximately 163,600 bushels have been delivered to the elevators in the county.

Construction of the municipal park to be located west of State Highway 16 one block south of the court house square, will be started Thursday morning, according to Walter Thomson, who will be the WPA supervisor on the project. Dan Callaway will be employed as time keeper on the park project.

It appears as though the month of June has started out also to collect a rain record in Foard County. During the first few days of the first summer month, three inches of rain have been received here.

Lightning struck and killed a horse owned by R. J. Thomas, on Mr. Thomas' farm 13 miles southwest of Crowell, Wednesday morning during the electrical storm.

Dick Todd of Crowell has been awarded his second varsity track letter by Texas A&M in College Station.

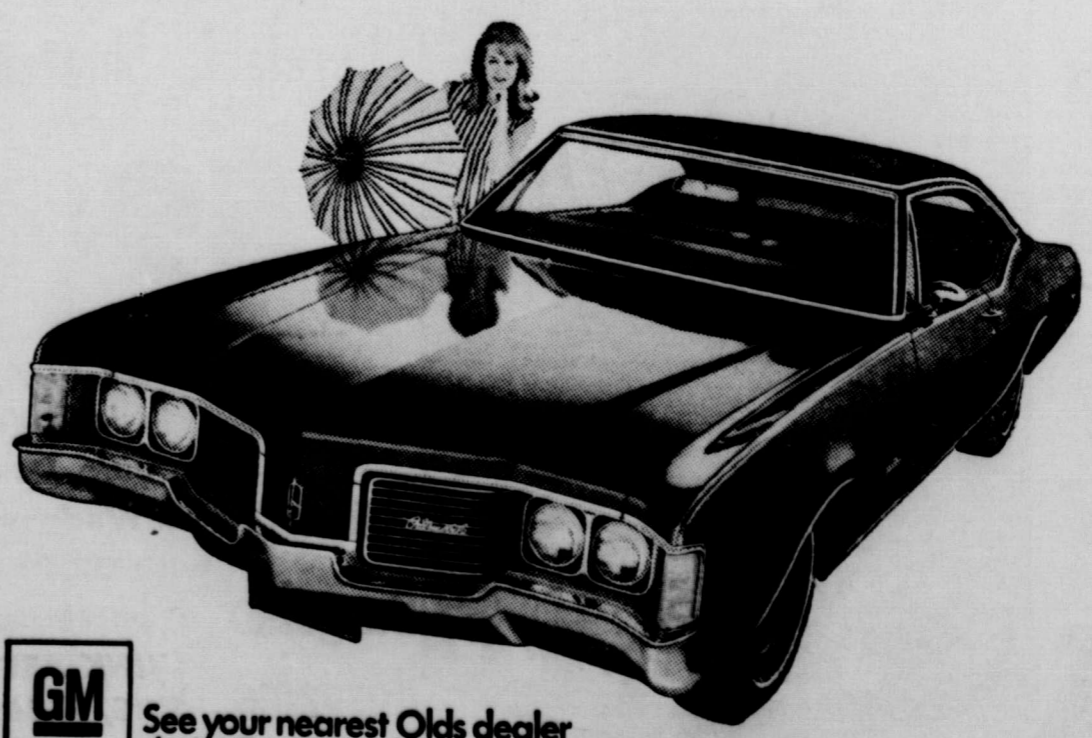

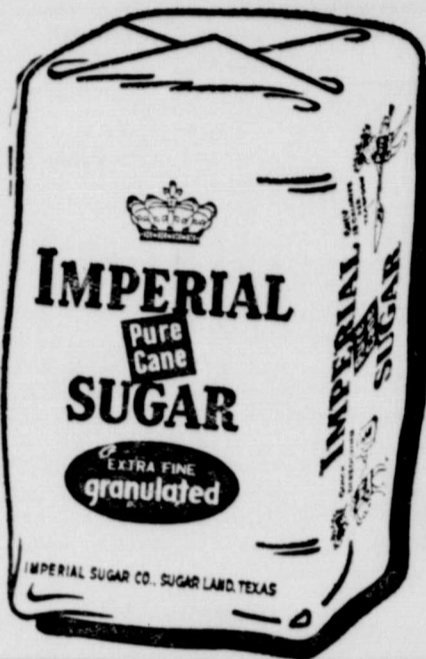

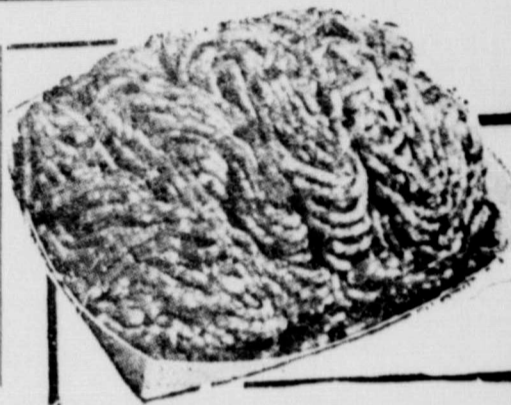

**Decision Must Be Made on Medicare by Those Reaching Age 65**

Every month, more than 120,000 Americans reach the age of 65. Each of them has a decision to make about Medicare—to enroll or not to enroll.

Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon social security office, this week reminded folks approaching 65 that the decision should be made before they become 65.

"They should enroll during the three months before the month they attain that age," Mr. Draughon said, "to obtain the Medicare protection that helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. They can also enroll during the month they reach 65, or during any of the next three months, but this would delay the date coverage would become effective. Late enrollment does not affect the date of hospital insurance protection under Medicare, however, unless more than a year has elapsed since age 65.

Although about 95 per cent of those reaching 65 enroll for the Medicare coverage that involves a \$4 per month premium, Mr. Draughon urges those who are approaching that age to obtain enough information to make their own decision. A free leaflet explaining the program is available from the Vernon social security office.

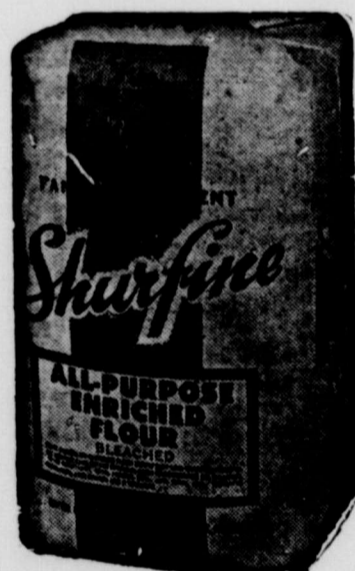

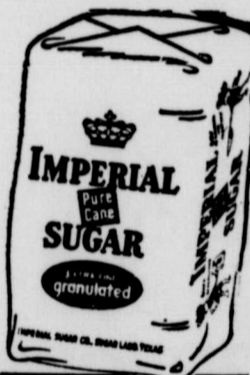

Forsements will bring into the four county planning arena actual participation in planning projects and carrying them through to successful conclusions.

Everyone is asked to participate in the program by suggesting projects for the RC&D. Suggestions can be made to mayors, or county judges, or newspapers or soil conservation offices. "If your project will improve the town, rural area, or four county area, we want your ideas," Chapman requested.

Although the Four Winds Resource Conservation and Redevelopment District is working feverishly to meet a deadline in order that Bill Neal, president of Four Winds Industrial Foundation, Inc. and R. A. Yarbrough, manager of Gate City Electric Cooperative of Childress, can present the proposed work plans at a meeting in Washington, D. C., early next week, Chapman pointed out projects can be added in the future.

At the Washington, D. C., conference, local representatives will meet with Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John Baker, John Barringer, assistant for development for rural areas and Mr. Sonneborne, assistant in the HUD department assigned to small town development.

A RC&D program is one of great scope. One of the benefits could be stationing of USDA research scientists in the Four Winds area to work on brush and mesquite eradication. Sponsors and endorers will not be asked to obligate themselves financially. They will be saying, by endorsing the RC&D project, they are interested in community betterment and orderly development of growth in both the small towns and rural area.

Monday's meeting climaxed a visit to Quanah last week of Hal Story, SCS project coordinator for a RC&D program covering eleven counties in the Liberty, Texas, area. Story gave a graphic review of some of the accomplishments of those 11 counties under an RC&D program. Some 75 representatives of Four Winds county gathered to hear Story, all enthusiastic about getting such a project underway in Hardeman, Cottle, Childress and Foard counties.

The very fact that Neal and Yarbrough are leaving for Washington, D. C., and have important conferences scheduled with the heads of departments in the government who can lend assistance in getting an RC&D project underway, attests to the interest in the four counties.

At the same time, Chapman and county SCS people will be guiding the RC&D application through the SCS and state offices with hopes an RC&D project can be underway in a matter of weeks or a few months.

Readers are asked to read the following sponsoring resolution that will be requested of the counties and SCS districts. It is such resolution groups will be asked to endorse.

Whereas, there is a definite need for the orderly development, improvement, conservation and utilization of the natural resources of the area so as to provide employment and other economic opportunities to the people in our area, and

Whereas the following problems, among others, exist in our area:

1. Young people leaving for larger cities.
2. Low income for many of our citizens.
3. Rangeland being depleted by brush infestation, overgrazing, lack of livestock water and erosion, etc.
4. Cropland depletion caused by wind and water erosion and other factors.
5. Flooding problem in several of our watersheds.
6. Lack of adequate recreation facilities, especially water based recreation.
7. Mismanagement and underdevelopment of our wildlife resources.
8. Lack of local industry to process and manufacture products of our area and to provide jobs.
9. Lack of adequate modern housing in both rural and city areas.
10. Lack of adequate rural water systems.
11. Lack of adequate senior citizen homes.
12. Lack of adequate protection from natural or civil defense disasters, and

Whereas these problems are too large, expensive, and complex to attack without multi-county action and

Whereas, the Resource Conservation and Development Projects as authorized in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962 authorizes the Department of Agriculture to cooperate with and assist local sponsors in developing and carrying out a long range plan of action to correct the above mentioned problems.

"This resolution should give us some ideas on what we can do here."
