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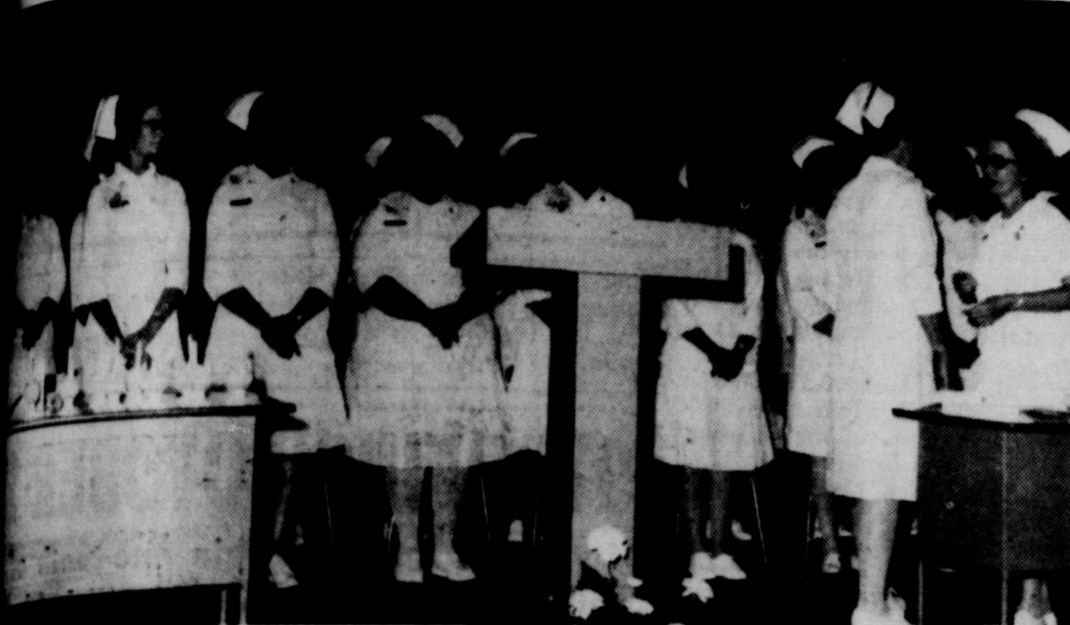

The Crowell Wildcats and Holliday Eagles, both undefeated in District 11-A competition, meet at Crowell gridiron Friday night in an important district contest. Amber City is the only other team in the district which boasts an undefeated district record.

The Holliday team won over Amber City 27-0 last week while the Wildcats were eking out a 7-6 victory Monday last Friday.

ABSENTEE BALLOTING STARTS

Big Ballot Presents Many Choices for Voter to Make

Absentee voting for the November 5 general election got underway in Foard County and over Texas on Wednesday, October 16.

The presidential election year ballot, a big 15 by 17 inches, has been prepared and was delivered to the county clerk and is now available for persons wishing to vote absentee.

In addition to local, district and state races, the voter will be selecting a presidential candidate from three parties, the Democrats with Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie, the Republicans with Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew and the American Party with George C. Wallace. (The name of S. Marvin Griffin will appear on most of Texas ballots in lieu of Wallace's chosen running mate, General LeMay. However, a vote for Griffin will be tantamount to a vote for LeMay.)

Absentee voting will terminate on November 1. For voters who recently moved into the state, and have made application for voting in the general election, balloting absentee will begin October 21.

A big day of swapping, trading, buying and selling is in prospect here Saturday, October 19, when the Foard County Hobby Club sponsors its third old fashioned "flea market."

The "flea market" will be held at the City Park in Crowell, which is two blocks south of the highway intersection stop light on Main Street.

The previous two swap days held here have attracted a large number of out-of-town visitors and the local club is hoping for an even larger crowd Saturday.

The club members stated this week, "Clean out your closets, cabinets, attic and garage, bring whatever you have to sell or trade. Something old or something new. The things you no longer want may be what some one else is looking for. So, set up a table and join in the fun."

"There will be a charge of \$1.00 per space and you will furnish your own table. If you don't have anything to sell or trade, come on down—visit with old friends, make new ones and have a good time. Homemade sweets, sandwiches, hot and cold drinks will be served all day, so bring the family and spend the day."

Two Members of Pioneer Foard County Family Make Visit to This Area

During the last half of the 19th century, many Texans built empires on the cattle trade.

Well known in this area was the Witherspoon Ranch, built by Phil S. and J. G. (Jim) Witherspoon, who came to Texas from Tennessee in the late 70's. Formed in Gainesville and known as the Gainesville Land and Cattle Company, the two brothers operated the ranch which sprawled over parts of Foard (then Hardeman), Baylor, Haskell, Knox and King Counties.

Visiting recently in Crowell were A. H. Witherspoon, Sr. of Gainesville, son of Phil Witherspoon, and Charles Witherspoon of Fort Worth, grandson of Jim Witherspoon. Charles' maternal grandfather was J. W. Cope, who was sheriff and tax collector in Foard County from 1895 to 1905.

It was the first visit for A. H. Sr. in 82 years, yet while driving through the farm land east of Crowell, he remarked that he missed the mesquite trees. Driving deeper into the old ranch territory and joining Glenn Halsell for a visit to the old ranch headquarters, which was a few miles northwest of the present Halsell Ranch head-

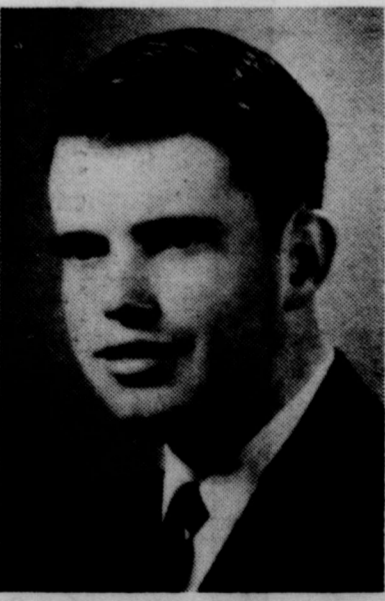

Safety Demonstration

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Ben Bullard, assistant safety director, Texas Farm Bureau, said last week as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at CHS. "Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Bullard said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under

which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour can be excessive.

Bullard added, "when drivers know the true facts and base their driving on those facts, highway accidents will drop sharply." A film on traffic safety was shown to the students, teachers and the guests.

Students and teachers took part in the tests which were conducted in a specially equipped car.

Last week's safety demonstration was brought to Crowell under the sponsorship of the Foard County Farm Bureau and is part of a long-range program of traffic safety conducted since 1957 by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

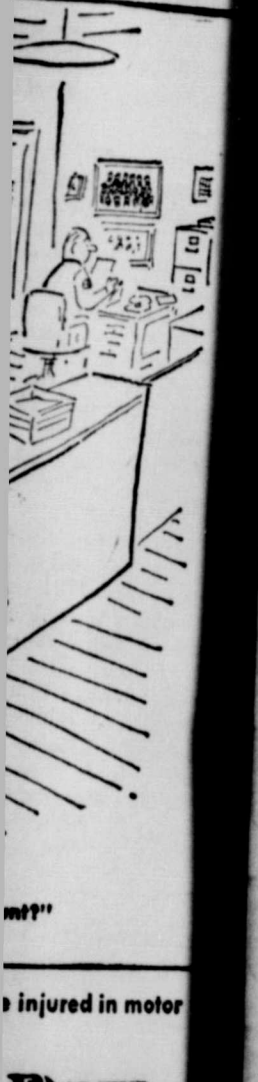

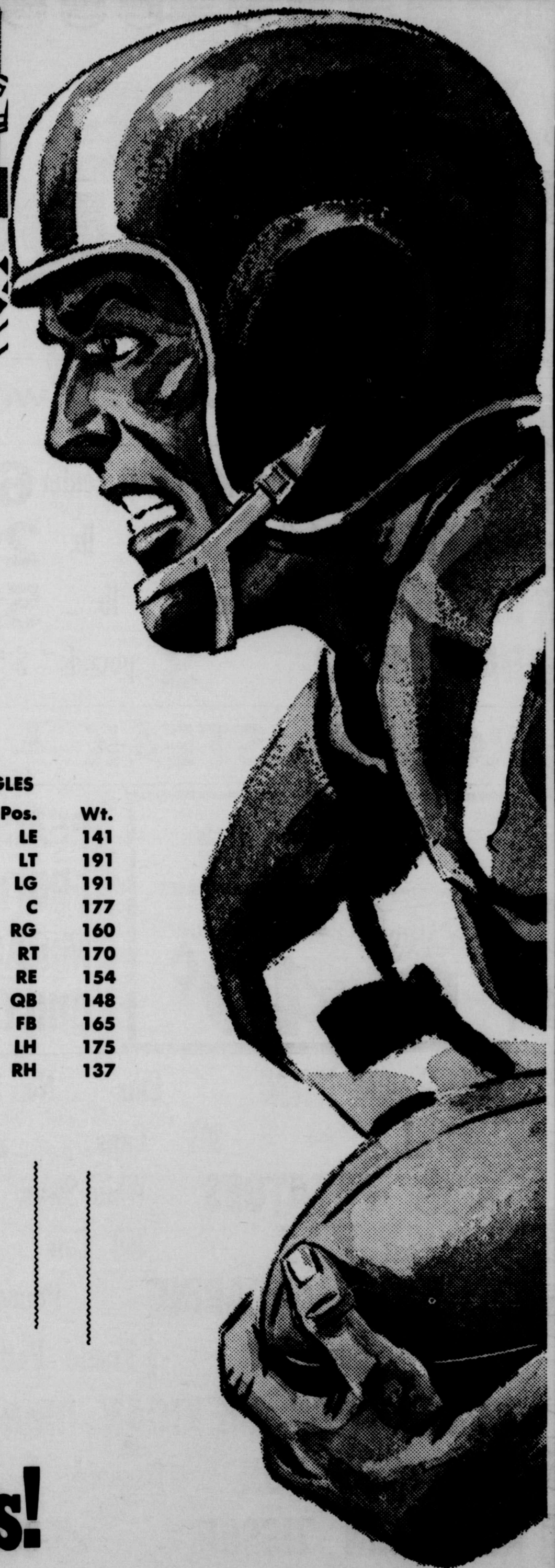

Federal Grant Being Sought by Four Winds

An application for non-metropolitan planning assistance for the Four Winds Industrial Foundation has been filed, it was announced last week by Bill Neal of Quannah, president of the four-county industrial group.

The application for the federal grant for industrial planning and development funds was drafted by R. A. Yarbrough of Childress, recently appointed executive director for Four Winds.

Yarbrough recently returned from Washington after conferring with Department of Agriculture officials on the new program approved by Congress this year to help rural areas develop a program to attract industrial prospects.

The request for assistance is being channeled through the North Regional Planning Commission of which Four Winds and the four-county area of Hardeman, Cottle, Foard and Childress are members.

Yarbrough said the application has been approved by Nortex and is being prepared to be submitted to the state agency handling such applications.

He said the grant, to be matched in part by the four counties and the state, would enable Four Winds to aggressively solicit industrial prospects and to develop the proposed "unwanted industries" park in the Pease River area of the four counties.

The new federal program will be handled by HUD, the Bureau of Housing and Urban Development, as a means to redevelop rural areas and to take the population pressure off the metropolitan centers.

H. D. Agent Tells Housewives How to Kill Insects in Pantry

One of the most aggravating experiences for a homemaker is to find beetles or moths in dry foods stored in the pantry. Foods that are most commonly attacked are cereal products, corn meal, flour, spices, nutmeats, chocolate, dry pet food, and fried fruits. Both the larvae (worms) and adults may be found feeding in these dry food products.

Almost always, stored food pests are brought into the home in packaged food that became infested somewhere in the transporting or storing of the foods. Once an infestation is brought in, insects spread to other stored food in the pantry. Several of the stored food pests have the ability to bore through cardboard or cellophane containers to get to stored foods.

The first step in controlling these pests is to determine the source of the infestation. If only one package is infested, the problem is eliminated by destroying the package. Buying in small quantities and rapid use is one of the surest ways of preventing trouble from these pests. If you suspect that insects have invaded several packages of food, the insects can be killed by sterilizing the packages in the oven at 150 to 160 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Small packages can be heated as they are, but larger packages should be opened and the contents spread in a thin layer to allow sufficient heat penetration.

Do not re-store infested products. Inspect packages for breaks and the presence of pests before buying, and inspect the packages periodically after storage.

For further information, the Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects is available from either of the extension agents.

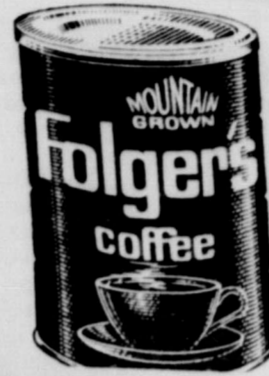
