At a special meeting of the Crowell Independent School Board Monday night, Nov. 11, Vernon L. Behner, certified public accountant, presented his examination of the school finances for the year which ended on August 31, 1968.

The board employed Mrs. Anna Laura Evenson to work in the cafeteria; she will take the place of Mrs. Irene Sellers, who has moved out of town.

The board also decided that the concession stand in the new gymnasium will be operated by the athletic department; the money earned from concession sales will be used to purchase uniforms for the girls and boys on the basketball teams.

A letter was read from the Crowell Ministerial Association which complimented the stand taken by the board in eliminating school-sponsored trips. The board expressed its appreciation to the Ministerial Association for this complimentary letter.

Miss Stapp in Honors Program at Baylor University

Miss Virginia Ann Stapp, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Stapp of Crowell, is one of 29 sophomores enrolled in Baylor University's Honors Program.

The Honors Program at Baylor is a four-year program designed to challenge superior students and provide them a course of study commensurate with their abilities.

During the first two years, honors students are grouped in special sections to survey courses. In the last two years, they take special courses in their major fields, participate in a great books colloquium and pursue an independent research and writing project under the direction of a faculty member in their major departments.

Students who complete the program are exposed to the best education that Baylor can give. The majority of students who have completed the program since it was inaugurated in 1958 have continued their education in graduate or professional schools, according to Dr. Elmer Duncan, associate professor of philosophy and director of the program.

"Without exception they attest to the value of the Honors Program in their further educational pursuits," he said.

Miss Stapp is a graduate of Crowell High School.

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ARCHER CITY HOSTS CROWELL FRIDAY NIGHT

The Crowell High School football team takes to the road again this Friday night when they travel to Archer City to take on their old rivals, the Archer City Wildcats, in the last game of the season for both clubs.

Archer City, a pre-season favorite to win District 11-A, has won all its games this season with the exception of two. They lost a non-conference contest to Henrietta and their only conference loss was to Holliday, which went on to win the district crown.

Nine Crowell players will be appearing in their last game for the Wildcats as they are seniors and will graduate next spring.

These nine seniors are Billy Hord, Charles Dodd, Terry Bird, Jimmy Hammonds, Ike Everson, Leslie Hopkins, Junior Carroll, Alan Lee and Larry Ellis.

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The Crowell Wildcat Band was awarded a Division II rating in University Interscholastic League marching competition in Wichita Falls last Tuesday. This is the highest marching rating received by the band in several years.

The majorettes were medalists in twirling ensemble competition, receiving a Division I—Superior, rating on their quartet routine. Entered in the twirling competition were Cathy McLain, Jane Hughston, Mieke Owens and Nikki Woods.

The band marched in Midwestern Stadium with approximately 30 other bands of various classes. They were judged by three judges and received two Division II ratings and one Division I rating, which computes as a final rating of Division II.

Standards for judging for U. I. L. are Division I—Superior; Division II—excellent; Division III—average; Division IV—below average; Division V—Poor.

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The First Christian Church has announced the new brick building of the church will be dedicated at a service to be held at 5 p. m. Sunday, November 24.

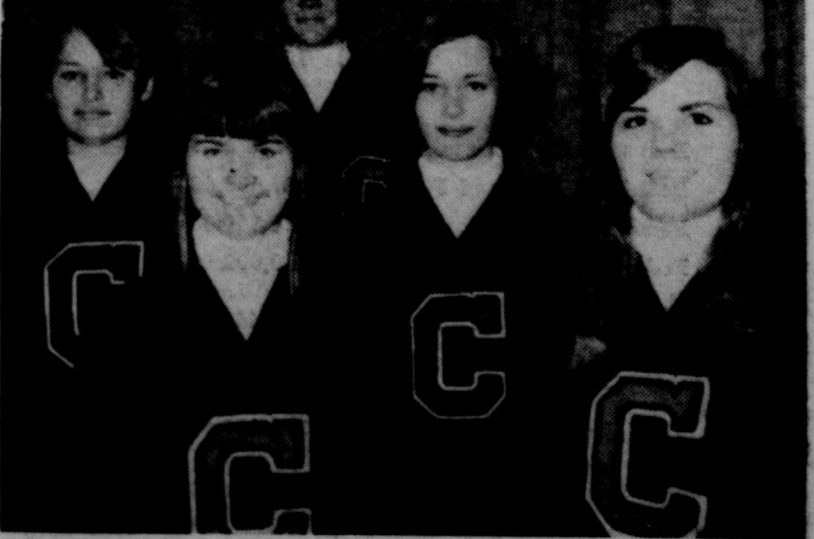
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Style Show to Be Presented at Local Neighborhood Center

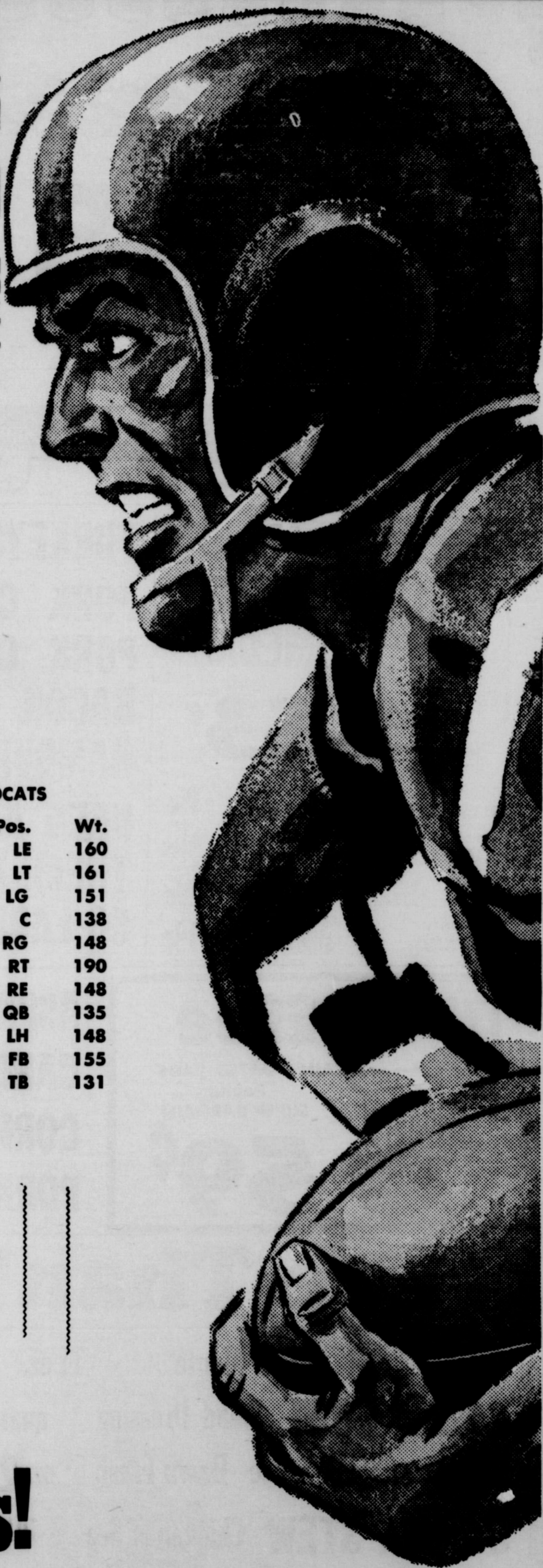

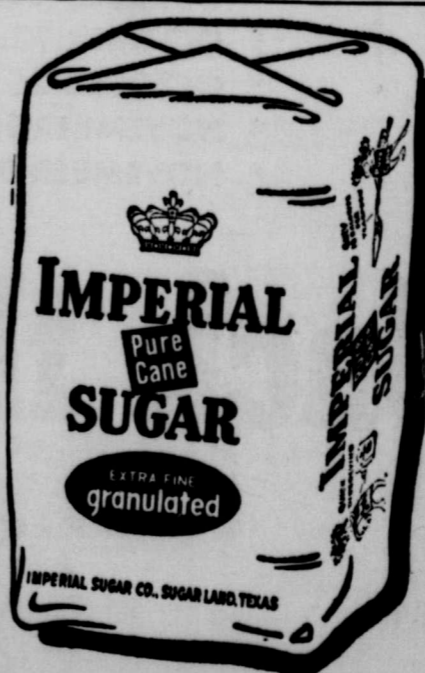

Record Quail Harvest Can Be Held During 1968

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is urging landowners and hunters to join forces this year for what could be a record quail harvest.

"The conditions are right. High quail populations have been reported in most areas of the state and each county has a season ranging from 20 days to three months," says Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the department.

Statewide, the quail population is a little below that of 1966 which is considered a record year. However, department biologists say several areas of the state actually have a higher population this year than they did two years ago.

Quail is the one wildlife species that dramatically points out that wildlife cannot be stockpiled or "saved" from one season to the next. Game managers of Texas have been saying this since the first research on quail began in the late 1930's.

Research over the years has always pointed to "hunt 'em when you have 'em."

Attempts at stockpiling or increasing quail populations by restocking, killing predators or closing seasons have all failed. Game biologists stress that a quail population is determined by habitat—food, water and cover.

"Birds trapped on un hunted areas show the same ratios of young to old as those from hunted areas, indicating that the process of reproduction moves along in normal channels regardless of hunting," Biologist Lay wrote 15 years ago.

Some game managers say that half of the quail population can be harvested safely without any danger to the breeding stock.

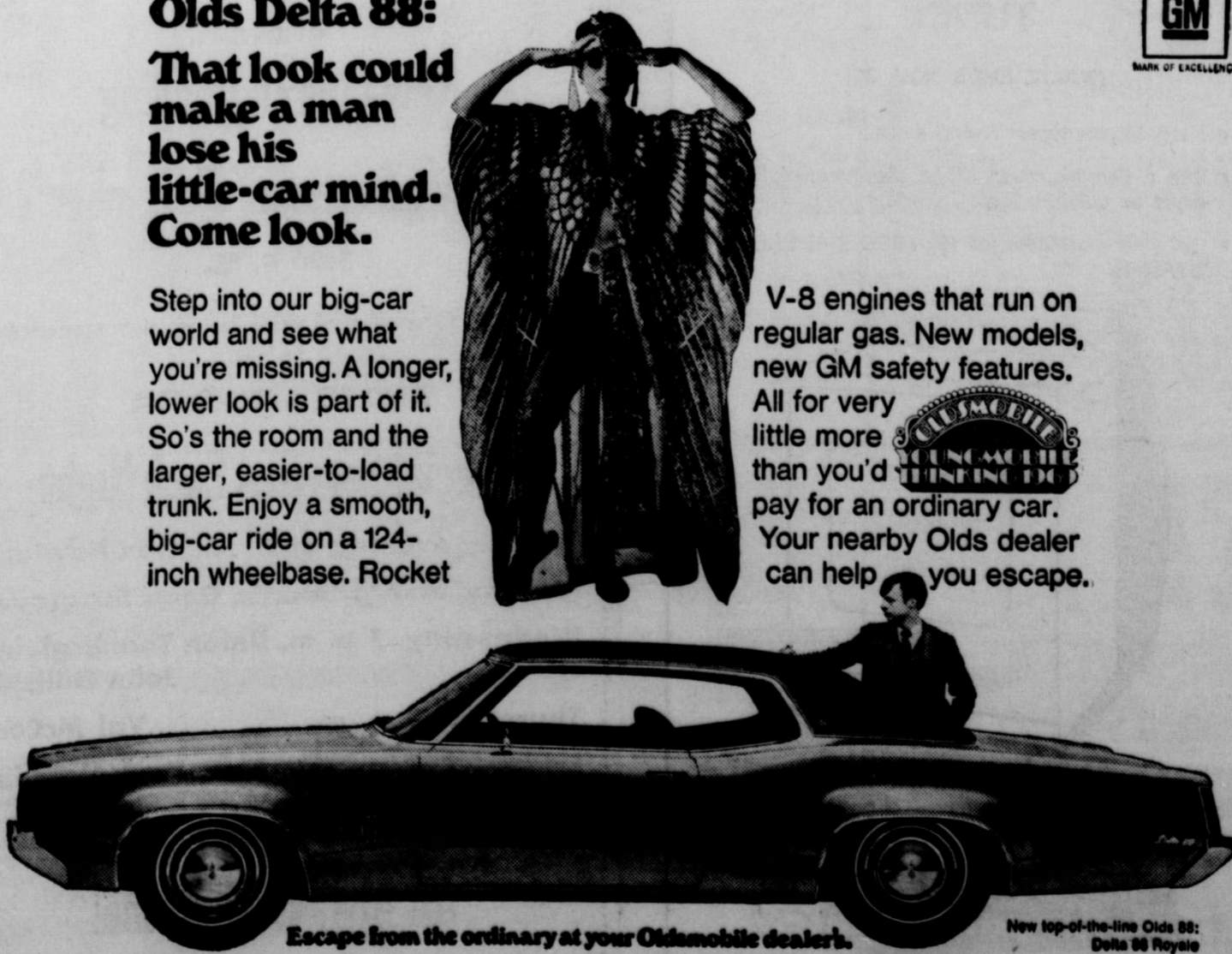

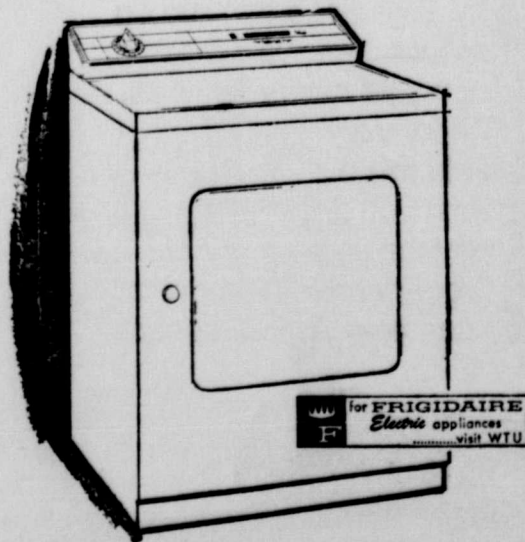

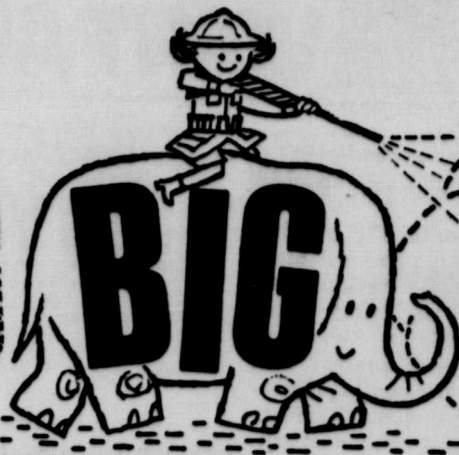

Public education program to encourage mothers to seek prenatal care which, medical authorities assert, can minimize the risks of prematurity and stillbirths and reduce the possibility of defective births. . . . Finances more than 100 birth defects centers throughout the nation (including Texas centers in Dallas, Houston, Galveston and San Antonio) to provide expert diagnosis, medical care and rehabilitation for children born with serious congenital problems. . . . Allocates funds at the local level for patient care when special needs arise. . . . Supports 14 birth defects research centers including the Salk Institute.

Through the utilization of the kinds of skills and dedication that led to the discovery of the Salk vaccine and the conquest of polio, the National Foundation seeks to make step-by-step progress geared to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of birth defects. In Foard County, one out of every ten homes bears the burden of a child born with a serious birth defect. Each citizen can do much to assure the birth of healthy babies if citizens will volunteer now to serve actively with the Foard County March of Dimes Chapter. Persons interested in volunteer service should telephone Mrs. Johnson.

The Wichita Falls Council of Chapters office which provides consultation and educational services to Foard County and ten other counties in the North Texas area, is located in Wichita Falls at 405 Kell Blvd. Through this office educational materials and films relating to general research, diagnosis and treatment of birth defects, genetics and prenatal care made available to schools, clubs and other civic organizations. These materials can be obtained by contacting the chapter officers in Crowell. The chapter officers and the council representative, Carolyn Bradford of Wichita Falls, will also assist local parents in arranging medical care for children born with serious birth defects.

Although the March of Dimes conducts only one campaign per year, memorial contributions are accepted by all chapters. All donations will be acknowledged to the donor and a notice sent to the family of the person in whose memory the donation is made.

November Plentiful Reflect Favorite Thanksgiving Fare
