# Farmer of the Year

Recie Womack of Crowell has been selected as the 1968 Outstanding Conservation Farmer for Foard County by the Board of Supervisors of the Lower Pease River Soil & Water Conservation District. This award is presented annually to the individual who has done the most outstanding job of conserving his soil, water and plant resources. On March 18, 1969, Mr. Womack was presented a plaque by the Crowell Lions Club in recognition of his conservation work.

In 1959, Recie purchased 160 acres of land southwest of Crowell. With the assistance of the District and Soil Conservation Service personnel, a conservation plan was developed on the farm in 1960. In 1965, Recie entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract in order to do a total conservation job on the farm.

Recie said, "I had to do something, the farm was washing away as it was." Through this Great Plains contract, he has built a waterway and seeded it to perennial grass, built a system of parallel terraces, built a diversion terrace, seeded marginal cropland to permanent grass and carried out good management practices on his cropland and rangeland. Recie stated, "I could not have done all the work if it had not been for the technical assistance given by Soil Conservation Service personnel and the financial assistance provided through the Great Plains Conservation Program."

In talking about the practices applied on his farm,

Mr. Womack said, "I saved about 1/3 of the time I normally spend on plowing, seeding, and fertilizing with my parallel terraces. They fit my equipment real well." He also stated, "I do not consider the acres in the waterway as being lost acres. My steers use the dry grass for dry matter while grazing wheat."

John McAlister, District Conservationist, of the local Soil Conservation Service office, stated, "Recie is to be commended for the job he has done. He has, in all instances, done more than was required to meet the specifications of GPCP Contract."






