**Former Visitor Here During Summer
Author of New Book on Spencer Tracy**

The first published biography of the late screen actor Spencer Tracy is authored by a man whose ancestral roots are in Foard County.

Larry Swindell, Quanah-born writer and motion picture scholar now living in Pennsylvania, is the author of "Spencer Tracy: A Biography," published officially last week by World Publishing Company, New York. The hardcover edition priced at \$6.95 contains

368 pages, including 32 pages of personal and professional photographs. A paperback edition will be published next year by The New American Library, Inc.

Many older Crowell residents may remember the author as a little boy who used to spend summer vacations in Crowell visiting his grandmother, the late Mrs. Emma Howard. He is the son of Mrs. Lucille Swindell, now of Quanah, and the late Rebec Swindell. His parents met when both were Foard County residents. Many relatives of the author now reside in the Crowell and Quanah vicinities.

Swindell, a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles, formerly was a newspaperman, magazine editor, and university instructor. He spent almost two years researching and writing the Spencer Tracy book, which has been enthusiastically received by its first reviewers and was published with an advance sale exceeding 10,000 copies.

Water Development Board to
execute contracts or issue re-
venue bonds when such con-
tracts or bonds are not secured

(f) Texas Water Develop-
ment Board and such contracts
secured by the general credit
of the state shall after general
approval by the Attorney General,
registration by the Comptroller

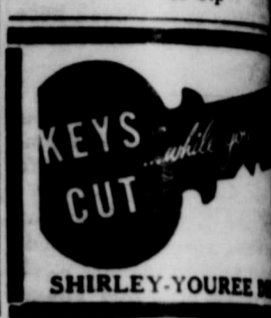

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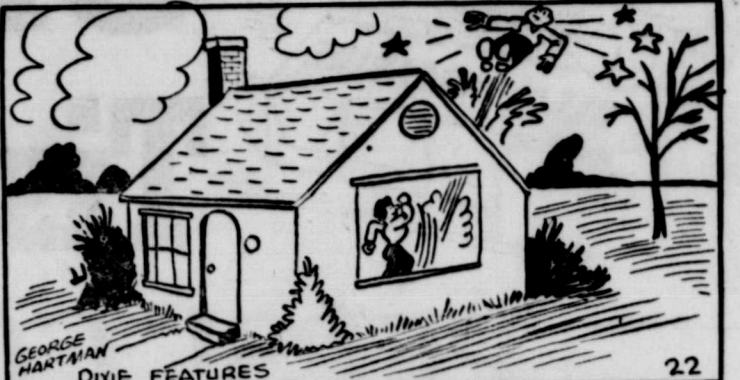
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
