increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million, it is estimated.

The postmaster listed these details on the proposed increases: First-class mail-Letters and post cards would be increased one cent, to seven cents an ounce and six cents a piece, respectively, on July 1, 1969. Airmail postage would remain at 10 cents. This is expected to yield \$557.2 million in new revenues.

Second-class mail-A handling charge of three-tenth of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This is expected to yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 per cent increase in addition to the 8 per cent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970.

Third-class mail-For single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This is expected to yield \$12.4 million.
