NO MORE FREIGHT LINE

The News learned this week that the I. C. X. freight lines have asked the Texas Railroad Commission for permission to cancel its daily freight line run from Vernon to Plainview.

Should the Railroad Commission grant the freight line's request-and if no other freight company could obtain the permit—Crowell and all the towns on US 70 between Vernon and Plainview will be without freight service and freight coming here would have to be picked up in either Vernon or Quanah. Likewise, outgoing shipments would have to be delivered to these out-of-town

It has been suggested that petitions signed by local businessmen in the towns that would be affected by this discontinuing of service be sent to the Transportation Division, Texas Railroad Commission, Austin, protesting this action, and requesting that the Commission, if it grants ICX's request, make arrangements with another freight line to provide service to these towns.





However, fertilizing is highly recommended with stubble mulching. The addition of nitrogen fertilizer to the crop residue after harvest helps to have plant food available for wheat in the fall. The reason for this is that nitrogen will become tied up in decomposing the wheat straw and will it will help to decay the wheat straw and will be available sooner for the next crop.

Every farmer is interested in increasing his income from wheat and a high level of management is the answer. Stubble mulching is only a link in the chain of management. For additional information on means of increasing your income from farming, contact any staff member of your local Soil Conservation Service office.
