The bill authorizing the change was signed by the governor May 15, and will become effective in 90 days from that date. Under the general law, quail season will run from December 1 through January 16, with turkey and deer seasons being from Nov. 16 through January 31.

1969 Wheat Harvest Total Tops Million-Bushel Mark

The second largest wheat crop in Foard County since 1961 was coming to a close this week with figures from the county's three elevators showing a total of 1,083,700 bushels delivered thus far. Elevator men estimated that the harvest is about 95 per cent complete with wheat still being cut in the Vivian community. This total does not include all of the wheat harvested in the county this year, as an estimated 40,000 to 50,000 bushels are stored on farms each harvest season. The market price on wheat early this week was \$1.19 per bushel—a decrease of 12 cents per bushel from a year ago this week. A rain Tuesday of last week brought the harvest to a stop, but the rush began again about 5 p. m. last Thursday and over 400,000 bushels of wheat were delivered to the elevators from then until Monday. Most of the combines and crews have moved on north, with only a few left to cut the remainder of the crop. The elevators also reported a total of 58,000 bushels of oats and 45,000 bushels of barley delivered this year. Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager of the Foard County ASCS office, said Tuesday that about 62,000 acres were planted to wheat in the county this year. Using that figure, the average-yield-per-acre for the county this year is 17.48 bushels on wheat brought to the elevators. The estimated yield-per-acre for the county is a little less than 2 bushels below that of last year which saw the biggest crop in the county's history—harvested—1,601,006 bushels. Last year, the ASCS reported 80,626 acres planted to wheat which made the county's average 19.857 bushels-per-acre on the wheat brought to the elevators.

New Water Rate for City to Give Customers 9,000 Gallons for \$9.00

Mayor Robert Kincaid announced Tuesday that City of Crowell water customers will receive more water for the same minimum charge, effective June 1. The new rate will be \$9.00 for 9,000 gallons. Heretofore, the rate had been \$9.00 for 7,000 gallons. Kincaid added that the council hopes shortly to get the charge per 1000 gallons for water used in excess of 9,000 gallons, reduced in price to the local customers.

To qualify for the honor roll, a student must carry a minimum load of 15 semester hours study and maintain a 2.5 grade point average on a 3.0 grading scale. Ms. Adcock, a senior, finished the semester with a 2.5 average. A total of 231 students were listed on the spring honor roll for WTSU.

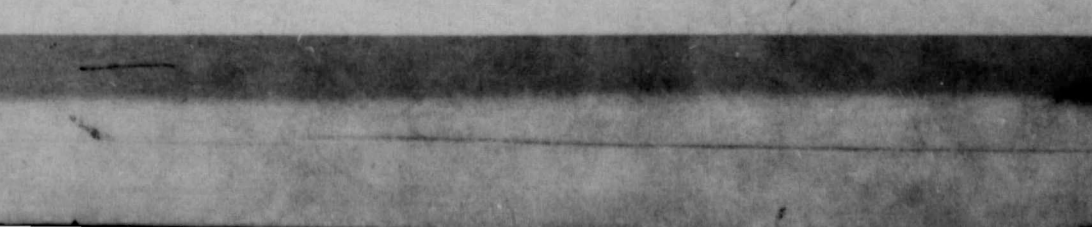


Santa Fe Depot at Truscott Sold, Moved

FOARD COUNTY 4-H YOUTHS EXCEL AT STATE ROUNDUP AT A. & M.

Miss Sharla Haynie of Foard County tied for first place in the State Food Show held at the 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University June 2 through 5. The judges had to break the tie and the \$500 scholarship was given to Miss Karen McClendon of Hale County, who will be a freshman in college this fall. Sharla was coached by her mother, Mrs. Warren Haynie. Pat Cates, another Foard County representative at the Roundup, won second place in the public speaking contest. He talked on the part 4-H Club work plays in developing citizenship and leadership in the youth of the state. He said that there are nearly 100,000 4-H Club members in Texas who are helped to be better citizens and leaders by the 4-H Club program. Pat was coached by Mrs. Kenneth Halbert. Pat and Sharla were accompanied to 4-H Roundup by Miss Harriet Halbert, member of the State 4-H Council, who helped with the Roundup, and by Joe Burkett, Foard County Agent. Mr. Burkett said that these outstanding youth of Foard County are to be commended for their hard work and fine showing in the state contest. "They are outstanding citizens and top leaders," he added.



Austin, Tex.—Millions for welfare, billions for water, and trillions for wages. These three "w's" point up the money problem presently facing the State.

Final decision, of course, rests with those who eventually pay the bill—the people of Texas. Their decision as to whether they are willing to foot the bills with additional taxes will come through the ballot when they vote for or against constitutional amendments at the special election on August 5.

As for welfare . . . the welfare groups face a do-or-die effort to boost the welfare benefits ceiling from \$60 million to \$80 million a year. If that amendment fails, as a similar one did last November, the Legislature will have no opportunity to re-submit the increase before 1971. That means that benefit payments to the ever-growing list of recipients will decrease accordingly.

As for water . . . a massive statewide campaign is shaping up to sell Texans on a \$3.5 billion revenue bond program that will be needed to bankroll the nation's largest state water development plan. A constitutional amendment on the August 5 ballot would authorize bonds—to be repaid by water users—to take care of the state's share of a \$9 billion Texas Water Plan . . . the largest and boldest of its kind ever proposed.

As for wages . . . legislators and legislative leaders have a special

interest in amendments to increase their salaries and to provide for annual sessions. Under one amendment the lieutenant governor and the speaker could be paid up to half the governor's salary (\$50,000). Senators and representatives could be paid as much as district judges receive from state funds (\$18,000 a year). Legislators already have passed an act raising their own pay. But it goes only from the present \$4,800 to \$6,800. Even this raise is subject to passage of the amendment.

TO DO OR NOT TO DO — Gov. Preston Smith is keeping to himself his decision on calling the Legislature back into session.

His "D Day" is June 22, a Sunday. That's the last day for him to sign, veto or let become law without his signature, the \$2.8 billion spending bill and the \$61.9 million teacher pay bill.

Smith said if he signs the budget measure, the teacher pay raise "is dead" because there is not enough money for both. Governor surprised teachers by criticizing the teacher pay bill. Earlier, he had been critical of the Legislature's decision to vote a one-year appropriations bill instead of the traditional two-year bill.

Smith has expressed some disapproval of at least two of the revenue measures—a Department of Public Safety fund transfer and a \$10 optional building use

The American Laundry Machine Industries has just licensed the process for application to garments and made-up textile products. fee on students. Smith is receiving many complaints about the appropriations bill as passed by the Legislature. College people are unhappy because funds for organized research were reduced.

Not enough money was put into the budget for the schools for mentally retarded children and for the new community mental health-retardation centers, according to the Texas Association for Retarded Children. Joe Day, Jr., president of the

association, objected because the bill provided money for planning a new state school in the Houston area while the Board for Mental Health and Mental Retardation had requested that new schools be built at El Paso, the Rio Grande Valley and Northeast Texas.

A last-minute change also reduced the allocation for air pollution control work by \$60,000 a year.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes hopes that the governor will let the appro-

priations bill become law. He thinks that a year's wait will show that smaller taxes will be needed than if the Legislature levied them this year.

COURTS SPEAK — Reversing itself, the State Supreme Court ordered a new trial in a Houston-Pasadena land annexation dispute which dates back to 1965 overlapping annexation ordinances of the two cities.

In other recent action the court: * Reversed an \$11,500 damage verdict against Coca-Cola bottlers in a Pittsburg, Texas, suit by a woman claiming injuries when a bottle exploded.

* Concluded that a Lubbock woman could not claim she was entitled to full widow's benefits since divorce proceedings were in progress though not finally settled when her ex-husband died.

* Turned down a Fort Worth minister's claim that he had a lifetime contract as Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Church pastor.

* Held that producing and selling state aggregate products is not liable for sales taxes on transportation costs of moving material from plant site to delivery point.

* Stood firm against appeal of a Port Arthur widow who claimed a Houston law firm got her to sign an agreement for its service in a damage suit while she was still in a state of shock over her husband's death.

* Refused to disturb a Third Court of Civil Appeals ruling on condemnation proceedings involving mineral and oil rights for the Robert Lee Reservoir despite the attorney general's charge that it will vastly increase the cost of reservoir and highway development in the state.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — An elected criminal district judge cannot be a member of a county hospital district board of managers without waiving his right to state compensation, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

A specialized motor carrier means any of a variety of vehicles as defined in Texas statutes, not just those certified by the State Railroad Commission, said Martin in another opinion. He also defined "base municipality" as referred to in transportation statutes as "any municipality to which other municipalities are immediately contiguous."

Treasurer Jesse James asked Martin to rule on the constitutionality of giving cigarette tax stamp purchasers 15 days to pay. (They are now on cash basis.) Decision bears on whether revenue is available for teacher-pay raises.

Formation of non-profit food cooperatives of ultimate consumers does not violate Texas anti-trust statutes, Martin concluded.

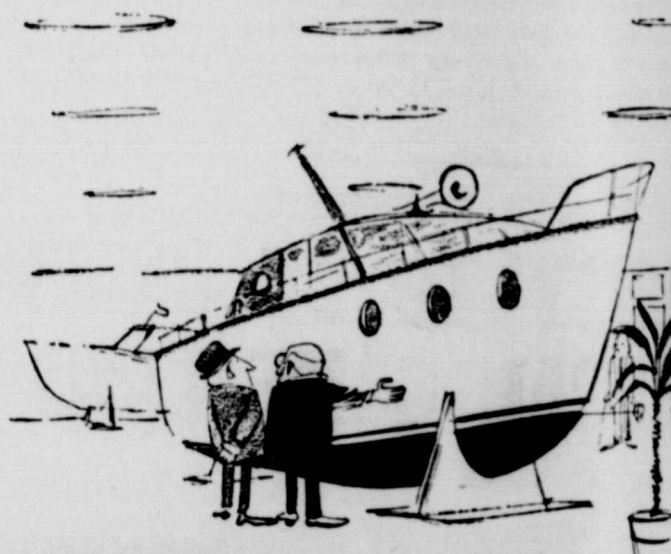
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After the entertainment, Gov. Smith will address the crowd. A special recognition will be given to Mr. Healy.

It is expected that teams will be playing softball under lights in Crowell within a week, according to a report from the managers of the two softball teams in Crowell Wednesday afternoon.

An unusually large head of wheat was found in a 67-acre wheat field of Cap Wheeler and Loyd Fox four miles south of Thalia and is on display in the Fox & Johnson Grocery store in Thalia, according to information furnished Monday by Mr. Fox. He stated the head measured 7 1/4 inches long and contained 24 meshes with from 4 to 8 grains per mesh which totaled approximately 150 grains of wheat.

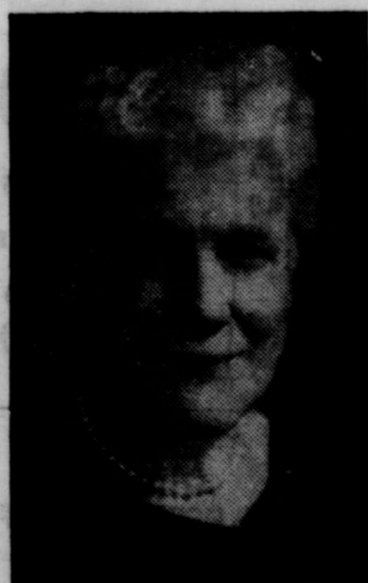
Charlie Thompson, Jr., who has been in Houston for the past month visiting in the home of his sister, Mrs. Crockett Fox, returned to his home Sunday.

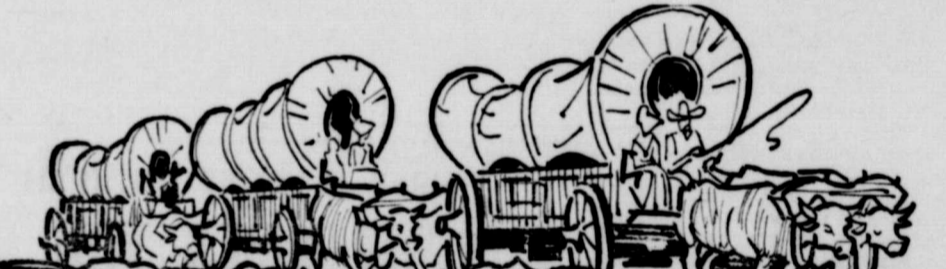
Services Announced for Truscott Church

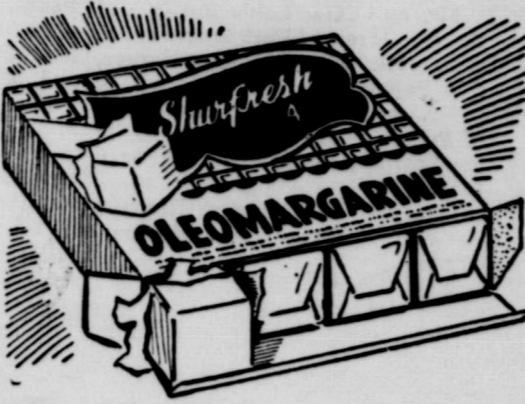

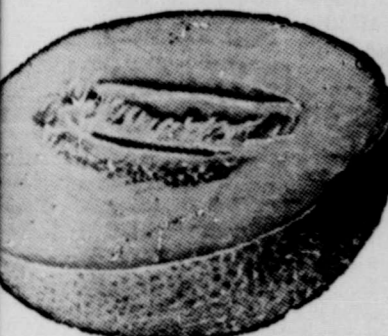

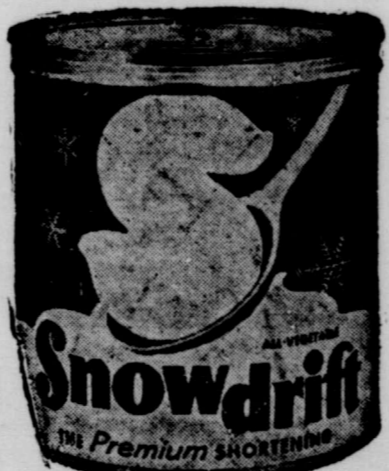

Contract Rejected for Proposed Lake Kemp Work

At least for the time being, hopes for renovation of the Lake Kemp dam and spillway died Friday morning.

On the day an extension for bid acceptance and contract awarding expired, Wichita Falls city officials received word from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers the bids "were rejected and construction contract award canceled" because Congress has not yet acted on its 1970 federal appropriations bill—which includes \$1 million for Lake Kemp renovation—and because the Corps cannot second-guess a possible spending limitation Congress might place on funds during fiscal 1970.

Notification of the cancellation met with strong protest from U. S. Rep. Graham Purcell who promised "to get to the bottom of the problem," when he learned of the action in Dallas Friday morning.

In a telegram to the U. S. Bureau of the Budget and the Chief of the Corps of Engineers, Purcell said, "It ill serves the needs of these people (Wichita Falls) and the surrounding countryside to delay a vitally needed project for which there presently exists ample funds, already appropriated by Congress."

The money Purcell referred to came in the 1969 Federal Appropriations Bill, frozen by the Nixon administration. About \$20 million worth of Corps of Engineers projects were halted pending a review by Nixon budgeters and will apparently lapse if not acted upon before the end of fiscal 1969 on June 30.

Since bids and contracts for the Lake Kemp project were not awarded Friday, the project will

have to wait at least until next spring, and no one will make any promises it can go ahead even then.

In his telegram, Purcell blasted budgeters for "leaving Wichita Falls out on a limb," having already spent about \$175,000 for land acquired at the site of the proposed new dam and spillway.

Purcell urged fund administrators "to reconsider your policy on this matter to take prompt steps affirmative to undo the harmful consequences of this unfortunate decision."

Aides to U. S. Senator John Tower Friday explained they think the contract delay was due both to the increased wage rates that will apply to the project and the possibility of a spending limitation next year.

When bids were submitted early this year, they were based on January, 1969, wage rates, and Tower aides said engineers fear the rates would no longer apply if the contract awarding date were extended past June 6.

Tower has written a letter to the Corps of Engineers requesting the contract be put up for bids again as soon as possible.
