DEPOSITS TAKE BIG JUMP OVER YEAR AGO

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank took a quarter-of-a-million dollar jump during the past year, figures this week revealed. Deposits at the close of business on

June 30, 1969, were \$4,349,675.74, which is \$259,902.33 more than the deposits of June 29, 1968, when they totaled \$4,089,773.41.

Deposits are up \$1,405,972.99 over two years ago when they totaled \$2,943,702.75.

Compared to the statement of three years ago, deposits are up \$1,546,302.36, while in comparison to four years ago, deposits in the local bank have shown a \$1,239,531.58 increase.

David Fish, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Fish of Vivian, was killed instantly about 6 p. m., Sunday, June 29, when his motorcycle was involved in a collision with a car driven by Lawrence Walton Green, 19, of Clarendon.

The accident occurred just north of Crowell on the Quannah highway near the Texas Highway Department property.

According to reports, the Fish youth was believed to have been attempting to turn his motorcycle around when he pulled into the path of the car. Sheriff Dan Callaway said the victim's body was thrown some 50 feet from the point of impact and the motorcycle was found about 80 feet from the collision scene.

David's death brought Foard County's 1969 traffic fatalities up to three.

Funeral services for David, who would have been a freshman in Crowell High School this fall, were conducted at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 1, from the First Christian (Continued on back page)

William E. (Bill) Backus was born Oct. 9, 1896, in Childress.

After an extended stay here in 1964, Bill adopted Crowell as his home and though he returned to California after that, in May 1966, he and his wife returned, and have resided here continuously since that time.

He was the son of the late William G. and Mary Alice Backus, early-day pioneers of the Paducah area, who moved to Los Angeles, Calif. in 1913 and Bill, then a young man, moved with the family. He attended the Church of Religious Science and conscientiously attended the mid-week morning

devotionals of his church both in Alhambra and in Apple Valley. He was dependable, loyal, and always mindful of others, especially older people. He enjoyed sharing his pleasures with others.

He was reared in the Methodist Church. The personal message Bill tried to put over was that "if we had faith, we could do all things."

Bill served in World War I, being a member of the 91st Division and it was his duty to take ammunition to the front line and bring the wounded back; he was cited for bravery and gallantry for such service, but never made mention of such citation.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one sister and one brother, and is survived by his wife and a brother, Leslie Backus, of Vernon.
