



News was flashed over the United States last Sunday morning that England had declared war, or announced that a state of war existed against Germany after Adolf Hitler ignored her ultimatum to remove his troops from Polish soil. France followed England's move and declared war after a similar notice had also been ignored by Hitler. Late bulletins are to the effect that Hitler's forces are steadily making their way to the Polish capital, Warsaw, and that practically all of the civilian population has already left the city. The four men are Hitler, Field Marshal Herman Wilhelm Goering, Marshal Sigly-Rydz of Poland, and Gen. Marie Gustave Camelin, supreme commander of all French forces in the war with Germany. 


