





Ordinarily the students worked in jobs that required their employer to withhold income tax and social security tax from their pay check. The law requires their employer to issue them a W-2 within 30 days after they leave the job. The students will need to carefully put away this W-2 until January 1, 1970. Ordinarily if they do not work elsewhere, they will get all of their income tax withheld refunded, provided they file a Form 1040 with the Internal Revenue Service. Of course they are not required to file unless they make \$600, but IRS can't send the money back until they do file. The students that lose the W-2's usually find that the employer will give them a duplicate-but only after at least one, and usually a series of tongue lashings.




