## Crowell-Lockett Battle to 6-6 Tie Last Friday Night

The Crowell Wildcats, in their initial game of the 1969 season, were tied 6-6 by the Lockett Panthers in an evenly-matched contest at Lockett last Friday night. The Panthers crossed the double stripe first, after intercepting a Wildcat pass on the Lockett 5. The Panthers, promptly marched upfield to the Crowell 43-yard line where a hand-off to Lockett's quarterback John Reese resulted in a fine run by the Lockett star into the end zone. The try for extra points failed as the clock showed five minutes left in the first quarter. Near the end of the initial quarter, George Eavenson blasted through left guard into the end zone for the Wildcats' only score, after Jim Tom (Frog) Smith had put the ball there with a 23-yard ramble. The run for points after failed and that proved to be all the scoring for the night. George Eavenson, Crowell's outstanding runner of the game, lugged the pigskin 22 times for 117 yards for a 5-yard-plus average per try. Reese paced the Panthers with 102 yards rushing on 16 carries. Defensive stalwarts for the Wildcats were Danny Naylor, Mike Matus, and Rocky Bachman. As indicated by the statistics, the Wildcats were able to vote the ball well most of the night, except when they got near the Panther goal line. Also, the outstanding punting job by Lockett's Ronnie Holland (he sailed one 60 yards) kept the Wildcats backed up in their end of the field on several occasions.

## ADDITIONAL MOISTURE RECEIVED LAST WEEK

Cloudy, damp weather most of last week brought slow drizzles which totaled .7 inch by the government gauge. The total recorded here was repeated over most of the county, with only spotted sections receiving as much as one inch total during the week. It was cloudy again Sunday and a shower which fell about mid-morning brought .22 inch here in town. Portions of the south part of the county reported more than that received here. About one-fourth inch was reported in the Margaret community. Government records show that the official measurement for September thus far is .95 inch.

## Two Accidents Occur in County Last Saturday

The Foard County Sheriff's Department reported that two accidents occurred on U. S. Highway 70 in Foard County Saturday. The first was about 8:30 a. m. Saturday when Gary Streit of Oklahoma City and former resident of Vernon lost control of a pickup he was driving and which was pulling a trailer overturned about 7 miles west of Crowell. The trailer was loaded with venetian blinds. The trailer and its contents were destroyed in the accident. Local officers said Mr. Streit was not injured. The second accident occurred about 2:30 Saturday afternoon in Thalia at the intersection of US 70 and F. M. 67 when cars driven by Mrs. Willie Vessel of Crowell and Burl Abston Sr. of Thalia collided. Mrs. Vessel was alone in her 1967 Chevrolet at the time of the accident and Burl Abston, Jr. was in the 1958 Chevrolet with his father, according to reports from local officers. Highway Patrolman Eldon Thane of Vernon was the investigating officer. Heavy damage resulted to both cars, but the occupants were not seriously injured, local officers said.

### Governor Vetoes Bills Affecting This Area

The Austin Bureau of the Wichita Falls Times reported Sunday that Gov. Preston Smith vetoed several bills affecting this section of Texas.

He knocked out a \$29,000 appropriation to the Red River Authority for completion of its master plan.

He also vetoed a \$172,000 Parks and Wildlife item for a pet project of Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah that was to have been used to buy land in either Hardeman or Motley counties for a future state park.

In vetoing the money for a state parkland purchase in Hentley's district, Smith said it was not requested by the Parks and Wildlife Department and did not appear in either the House or Senate version of the bill.

He recalled that voters approved a \$75 million bond issue for state parks development and a plan for the development of the park system has been worked out by state agencies. He said "Acquisition and development of parks such as this one in the appropriation should be accomplished under the park bond development program applied by the department."

Austin, Tex.—Legislators closed out 44 days of special session conferences over taxes and finance.

Texas' \$348.6 million tax bill, which takes effect October 1, includes:  
\* An increase from 3 to 3.25 per cent in the general sales tax rate and inclusion of beer and liquor in the tax base for the first time.  
\* A boost in the cigarette taxes from 11 cents to 15.5 cents a pack.  
\* Increase in corporation franchise tax from \$2.75 to \$3.25 per \$1,000.  
\* Change in corporation franchise tax allocation formula to include out-of-state concerns which sell products in Texas (food and drugs exempt).  
\* Raise in natural gas tax from 7 to 7.5 per cent of value.  
\* Levy of five cents a drink on alcoholic beverages sold in private clubs.

A record \$5.8 billion biennial appropriations bill—\$313.8 million above the present general revenue spending level—would provide a \$205.6 million increase for education, \$58 million more for health, hospitals and youth corrections, \$62.2 million increase for medical aid to the needy and a 10.4 per cent increase in state employees' pay.  
When the major business of the session was over, legislature turned to other matters submitted by Gov. Preston Smith which included:  
\* Creation of 28 new district courts over the state.  
\* Establishment of an antiquities code, setting state policies for historic and scientific explorations on state-owned lands.  
\* Removal of the statutory interest rate limits on state and local government bonds.

\* A variety of "clean beach" legislation.  
\* Authority for creation of a non-profit corporation to provide deposit insurance for state banks and savings and loan associations in the \$15,000 to \$100,000 range.  
**LAWMAKERS RAISE ALLOWANCE** — Before departing for the hinterlands, legislators voted themselves increases in their contingency funds.  
House raised its allowance for each representative from \$450 to \$875 monthly during the interim between legislative sessions. Senators raised their expense maximum from \$1,000 a month to \$1,700.  
Legislators in both houses are paid a salary of \$4,800 a year.

**INSURANCE PROBE ENDS**—Governor's committee studying a proposed 11.4 per cent auto insurance rate increase recommended that the State Board of Insurance reduce insurance companies' expense allowance for acquisition of physical damage insurance from 25 per cent to 22.5 per cent of the premium dollar. This would scale down the proposed \$43 million overall increase by about \$6.6 million.  
Committee found an increase in premiums "inevitable primarily because of the large increase in automobile accidents and costs of repairs in 1968."  
Otherwise, said former Gov. Price Daniel, chairman of the nine-member committee, the increase is "conservative compared with rates in other states, lower than most states."

**67 Lbs. Frozen Food**  
Americans eat almost 67 pounds of frozen foods a year, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, extension consumer marketing specialist. Most of this is prepared foods, juices and poultry.
