THIRTY YEARS AGO

 A howling band of Redskins will invade Crowell Friday night when the Nocoona Indians meet Coach Grady Graves' Wildcats in a non-conference game here last Friday night which opened the Wildcats' home season with a powerful running attack, which the Dragons were not looking for, to easily score a 26 to 0 victory over their strong opponents.
 A number of fires have been reported at the gins in Crowell during the past week, but none have been very damaging.
 A new law will go into effect on October 1 whereby every owner of a motor vehicle must have a certificate of title before he can offer to sell or trade his car.
 Twenty-three Boy Scouts of the Crowell and Truscott troops, and Granville Lanier, Scoutmaster, received their Junior American Red Cross cards in first aid this week from John E. Long, Foard County Boy Scout Commissioner, and Vance Favor, State Highway section foreman, who conducted the first aid school. Crowell boys receiving junior first aid cards were John Clark Long, Billy Klepper, Ray Davis, Joe Wells, Paul Vecera, Joe Wallace Beverly, Charlie Thompson, J. T.  Seventeen calves have been purchased recently for baby beef production by 12 boys of the Crowell Chapter of Future Farmers of America.



**Hope Expressed at
Meeting for Enlarged
Markets for Cotton**

Market expansion is essential if
farmers are to continue to pro-
duce cotton at a profit in keeping
with their investment in land, la-
bor, and material.

This was emphasized at Chil-
dres last Thursday night by
Charles W. Stenholm of Stamford
at a meeting of area cotton in-
dustry leaders. The meeting had
been called by Mr. Stenholm, a
trustee of the Cotton Producers
Institute, to review cotton research
and promotion activity.

Market growth also is essential,
he declared, "to help maintain the
value of our farms and to retain
a balance within agriculture that
will surely be destroyed with dis-
astrous results if the land now
producing cotton must go into pro-
duction of other crops."

"During the first half of 1969,
losses to rayon and polyester sta-
ple on the cotton system has been
halted for the first time since
early 1967," Carlton Power of
Memphis, director of the council's
field service, told the group.

Fire-retardant finishes with
durable press and a fire-retardant
process that makes cotton batting
highly superior for cushioning are
among research objectives. Other
projects are concentrated on: (1)
gaining a greater share for cotton
in markets for floor coverings,
non-woven disposable materials,
and coated fabrics; (2) increas-
ing yields; (3) improving efficien-
cy of herbicides and insecticides;
and (4) eradicating insects and
diseases.

Concluding the presentation,
Mr. Power pointed to a number
of developments which are "glim-
mers of light" for cotton: (1)
trade publication stories that some

mills are weighing a switch to all-
cottons; (2) over-production of
polyester blends resulting in a less
than favorable profit outlook; (3)
a shift by the two largest retail
chains from blends back to all-
cotton muslin sheets; (4) pros-
pects for a strong comeback for
cotton in the shirt market; (5)
mill interest in cotton as a con-
tinuing source of raw material;
(6) possibility of reasonable re-
straints on textile imports, and
(7) an adequate supply of cotton
at competitive prices.

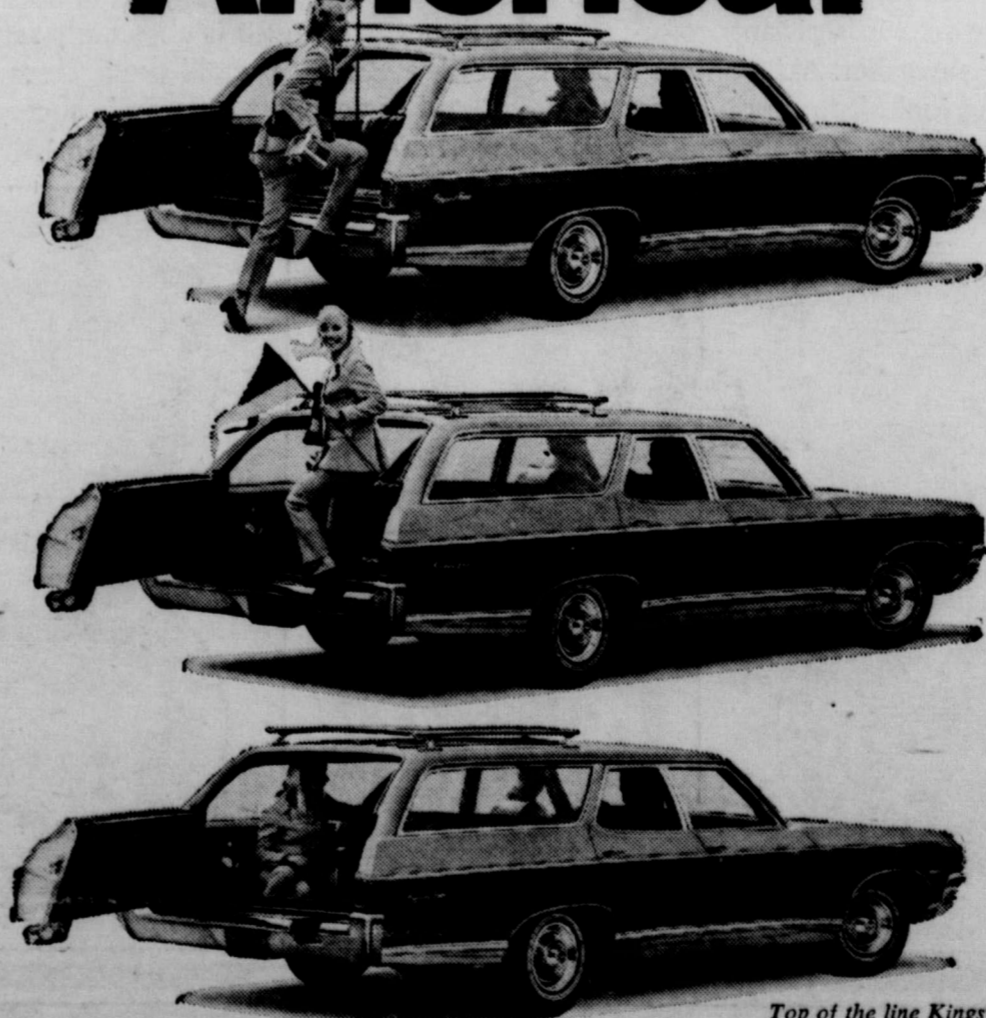

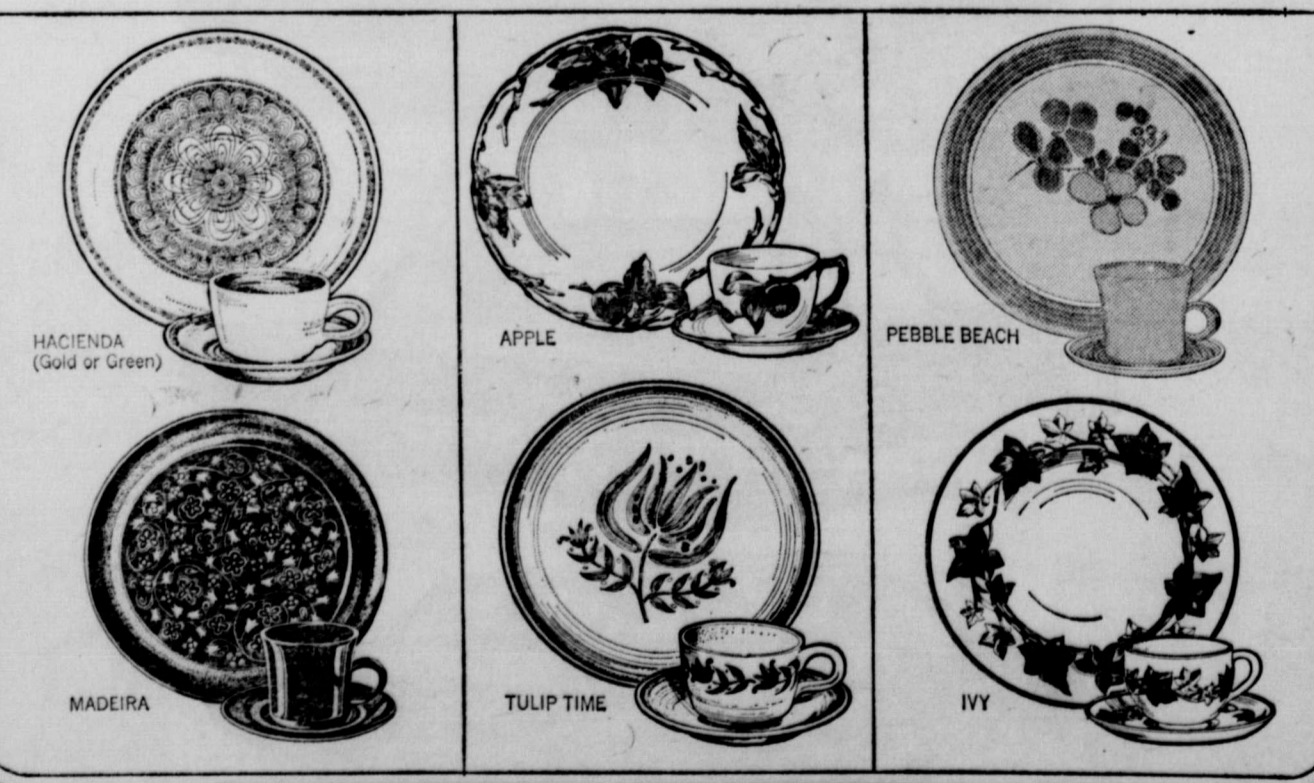

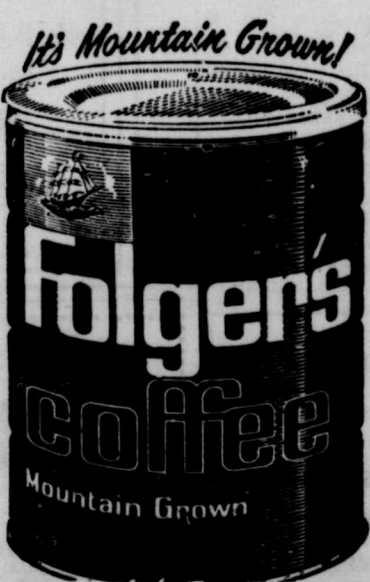

Austin, Tex. — Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law a \$5.8 billion 1970-71 state budget. This was after vetoing \$4.4 million in miscellaneous spending items. Yet the expenditure set an all-time record.

Earlier, Smith approved a new record \$348.6 million tax bill which takes effect Oct. 1. (In addition to state revenue, cities will get an estimated \$6 million a year due to extension of the sales tax to beer and liquor. Sales tax rate goes up from 3 to 3.25 per cent.)

Smith also signed other acts of the special session, including legislation creating 28 new Texas district courts. He will name all judges to serve until the next general election. This may be the largest single amount of judicial patronage assigned a Texas governor at one time in state history.

Tax bill as passed by the legislature provided plenty of revenue to fill the state's needs, but Smith said his vetoes are "justified for the sake of economy perhaps more than for anything else." Many of the items vetoed, he noted, were not part of the original House or Senate appropriations acts, and some were not even re-

quested by agencies. Gov. Smith vetoed the following items as now "unjustified or non-essential": Construction funds totaling \$2.9 million for the Dallas Neuropsychiatric Institute; \$262,717 for the Department of Public Safety sub-district headquarters in McAllen; \$250,000 for the Junction adjunct of Texas A&M; \$160,000 for Texas Maritime Academy Pelican Island Development.

Also an appropriation of \$225,000 for contracts of private lawyers to assist the attorney general in tort claims cases in 1971; \$172,000 for park land acquisition in Hardeman and/or Motley counties; \$207,500 for acquiring land and development of Port Lavaca Causeway State Park; \$50,000 for drilling a water well at Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County; \$25,000 for Longhorn Cavern State Park; \$29,000 for completion of a master plan for the Red River Authority; \$60,000 for a fish raising facility at Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches; and \$65,000 for environmental pollution control studies at Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College.

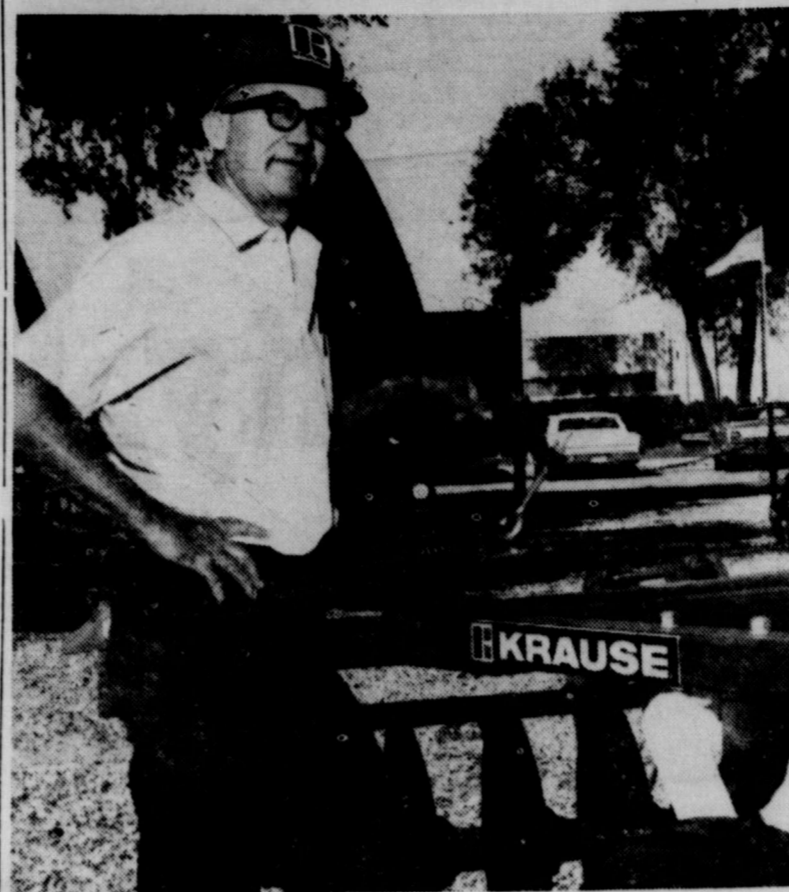
