## WILDCATS WIN 36-8 OVER PADUCAH FRIDAY

The Crowell Wildcat football team chalked up its District 11-A win No. 2 last Friday night at Paducah when they defeated the Dragons 36 to 8, in a game dominated by fumbles, penalties and pass interceptions.

The first three times Paducah got the ball, the Dragons recovered; And, each time the Cats marched in for a touchdown.

The first one started on the Paducah 44. Eleven plays later, Terry Farrar scored from the one-yard line. Jim Tom (Frog) Smith missed in the try for extra point. (The Wildcats never made an extra point all night).

On the next Dragon fumble, Buz Rasberry recovered for the Cats on the Paducah 31. Three plays later, quarterback Gary Cates hit Kenneth Sellers with a pass which covered 35 yards and resulted in a touchdown.

Another Wildcat kickoff and another Dragon fumble on the first play and it's Crowell's ball on the Paducah 37. Five plays, and Frog Smith scored from the 3.

The Dragons managed their only score of the game early in the second quarter when Jesse Solis cracked over from four yards out. He also ran for the two-point conversion.

The Wildcats came back quickly after the Dragon TD, with George Eavenson returning the kickoff to the Crowell 25. On the first play, Cates hit Sellers with a long pass, and it's a 75-yard TD play. A little later, after Junior Urquiza had intercepted a Dragon pass, Eavenson broke on a quick-opener and went 37 yards for a touchdown. Eavenson had a 7-yard average for the night; carrying the ball 15 times for 107 yards. The halftime score was 30-8.

Crowell's B string played the final 7½ minutes of the game. With six seconds left in the game, quarterback Rex Driver whipped a quick pass to Mike Weathered, and Mike picked up one block and was long gone on a 46-yard touchdown.

Gary Eddy and Gary Cates were outstanding on defense with a good pass rush by Eddy, Douglas Chowning and Rocky Bachman. Pass interceptions were made by Barry Branch and Ken Sellers.

## WHEAT DEMONSTRATION SET UP IN COUNTY

A wheat fertilizer demonstration has been established in Foard County by County Agent Joe Burkett in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station of Texas A&M University.

It is located on Jim Paul Norman's farm southwest of Crowell.

Eleven different rates and combinations of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers were used in the demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in the demonstration.

The fertilizer was put down on October 2 and the demonstration will be seeded to Early Triumph as soon as land is dry enough.

Later in the year, these plots will be marked, showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used, so the wheat farmers and others interested can observe them. When the wheat is harvested, the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made available to those who want it.

Outstanding on defense for the Crowell team were Terry Tamplen, Jackie Eavenson, Billy Eavenson and Allen Tapp.

## Eight Head of Cattle Die as Truck Overtakes West of Crowell Sunday

A large truck, loaded with 60 head of cattle, went off Highway 70 just west of Crowell early Sunday morning, hit a tree and turned on its side, killing 8 head of cattle and injuring three. The accident occurred about 5:30 a. m., according to investigating Highway Patrolmen.

Billy Aldridge of Duncan, Okla. was driver of the big rig which was owned by Freddie Loughridge of Marlow, Okla.

The 60 head of cattle belonged to Swift Packing Company and the load was en route to Gila Bend, Ariz., from Kiowa, Okla.

The driver was reported as not being injured in the accident, but the truck and trailer suffered considerable damage.

## MORE RAIN FALLS HERE

Foard County had two and one-half days of sunny, dry weather last week before it rained again. Thursday, Friday and part of Saturday were clear, but clouds began to gather late Saturday and more rain fell that night. Sunday was cloudy with another light rain falling during the afternoon to bring the total for the two days to .57 inch. This brings the total received here since September up to 11.48 inches.

Mrs. Crews was reared in Foard County and was a 1940 graduate of Crowell High School.

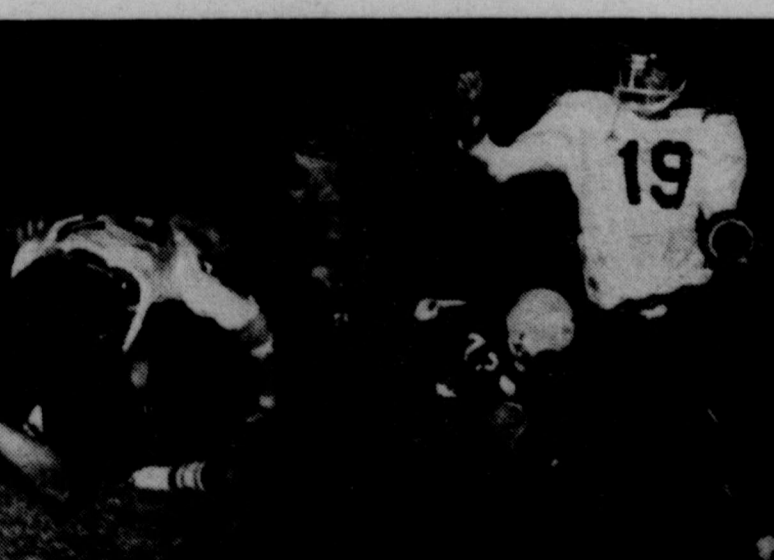
She is survived by her parents, and six brothers and sisters.

Twice since that date, Ameri-  
cans have come to the aid of op-  
pressed people, once in Korea, and  
now in Vietnam.  
As we observe Veterans Day  
1969, we pause to remember the  
Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a  
symbol of all American fighting  
men who paid with their lives,  
that the living might enjoy en-  
during freedom. More than one  
million men have given their lives  
in this endeavor.  
Veterans of all wars of the  
United States now number more  
than 39 million. Of this number,  
there are some 414,000 women  
veterans. There are more than  
27 million of these veterans alive  
today.  
To this very special group of  
Americans, we owe a pledge of as-  
surance that we are worthy of  
the many sacrifices they have  
made and are making at this mo-  
ment, in order that we may re-  
main a free nation.

George Clevenger, admin-

Over 4½ million men repre-  
sented the United States during  
this great conflict, World War I.  
Over 126,000 men would not be

**Two Minutes  
With the Bible**

**A Coffin for the Law**

God had barely given the Law  
to Moses when He ordered it to  
be put in a coffin. That's right—  
a coffin. The reason for this is  
that the Mosaic covenant clearly  
stipulated: "Now therefore, if ye  
will obey My voice indeed, and  
keep My covenant, then ye shall  
be a peculiar treasure unto Me  
above all people, for all the earth  
is Mine" (Ex. 5:19).

Israel, of course, did not obey  
God's voice indeed, but broke the  
Law before Moses even got down  
from Sinai. It was because of  
this that God, in grace, said: "And  
they shall make Me an ark . . ." (Ex.  
25:10). This word "ark" is  
rendered "coffin" in the last  
verse of Genesis and that is its  
simple meaning. But why did God  
order a coffin as the very first  
article of furniture for the taber-  
nacle? The answer is: To put the  
Law in. Read it for yourself:

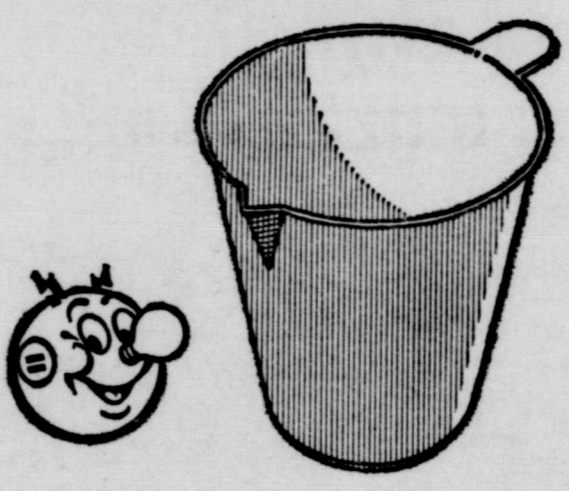
"And thou shalt put into the  
coffin the testimony (the Law)  
which I shall give thee . . . and  
thou shalt put the mercy seat  
above upon the coffin . . ." (Ex.  
25:16,21). If God had not put  
the covenant of the law in a cof-  
fin and met with His people from  
a "mercy seat" none of them ever  
would have been saved.

This Old Testament type has a  
lesson for us too, for if God dealt  
with us according to our works  
none of us would ever be saved,  
but "Christ died for our sins,"  
meeting for us the demands of a  
broken Law, so that we might be  
saved by grace, through faith in  
His redemptive work.

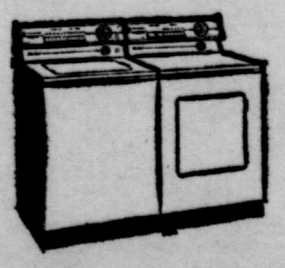
Col. 2:14 says concerning this  
"handwriting of decrees, that was  
against us," that our Lord, in  
death, "took it out of the way,  
nailing it to His cross," and Rom.  
7:6 goes on to explain: "But now  
we are delivered from the Law,  
that being dead wherein we were  
held; that we might serve in new-  
ness of spirit, and not in the old-  
ness of the letter." Thus believers  
in Christ are saved "by grace . . .  
through faith . . . not of works"  
but "unto good works, which God  
hath before ordained that we  
should walk in them" (Eph. 2:  
8-10).

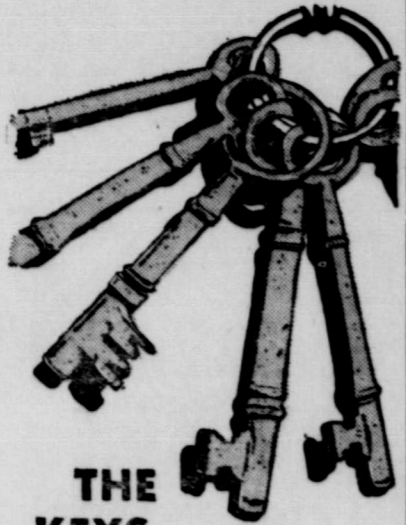

## Former Crowell Man Wins Third in Recipe Contest in Fort Worth

Dr. Robert Graves of Fort Worth won third place in the men's division of the Fort Worth Star Telegram's fourth annual recipe contest.

Dr. Graves' winning entry was a dessert: paper-sack apple pie. The recipe follows:

Ingredients:  
1 9-inch frozen pie shell  
6 medium-size Jonathan apples.  
1 1/4 cup sugar  
1 tbs. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. all spice.  
3/4 cup flour.  
1/4 lb. oleomargarine (1 stick).  
Chop apples into small pieces.

Place a layer of apples in pie shell (about half the apples). Mix all the spices with one-half cup sugar. Cover the layer of apples with about half of this mixture.

Place a second layer of apples over this and cover with the remaining sugar and spice mixture. In a mixing bowl, combine margarine (which should be at room temperature) with three-fourths cup sugar and three-fourths cup flour.

Mix until small beads are formed. Sprinkle this over the apples. Place the pie in a brown paper bag (an ordinary grocery sack) and bake at 400 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes.

## Santa Rosa Telephone Co-Op. Gets \$330,000 Federal Loan

Purcell said that \$287,000 of the amount would be spent in Texas and \$43,000 in Oklahoma. The loan is for the purpose of completing the system authorized under prior REA loans and will be used to install direct distance dialing facilities throughout the system, to expand toll facilities and to construct nine miles of new line.

Counties involved are Foard, Wilbarger, Childress, Clay, Cottle, Hardeman, Knox and Wichita.

Patrolman Francis E. "Buck" Johnson of Paducah was commissioned highway patrol sergeant Monday in Austin by Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

**Ag Chemical Clean-Up Time**
