The Coast and Geodetic Survey will launch this month the final merce Department's Environmentphase of a 2400-square-mile geo- al Science Services Administradetic survey in northern Texas.

The three-month, \$50,000 project will be carried out by a 17man field party. The party will complete a survey which will provide over 70 geographic positions, or latitudes and longitudes, for subsequent use in mapping and engineering projects.

Area ranchers, landowners and delegations expressed interest in previous studies of natural salt problems. Col. Pinkey said further investigations will be made to seek solutions to further improve quality of water in area streams.
