

## Year-Round **Vehicle Inspection Program Started**

On September 1, 1969, the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Program began a year-round inspection schedule, announced Captain Alan Johnson, service commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this area.

Briefly, Captain Johnson listed the changes:

1. Inspections go on monthly year-around schedule. 2. Sticker location changed to








#### Texas as a Broiler Producer

Commercial broiler producers in Texas placed more than 168.3 million chicks during 1968, a new record, reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The state ranked 7th in the number of chicks placed. Gross income from broilers totaled \$81.6 million and the average live weight per bird produced was 3.5 pounds. Nationally, the gross income from broilers was in excess of \$1,263 million.

#### Tax Man Sam Sez

Back in the old days, most Texans lived in a rural area. A lot of us had maids and were probably liable for maid tax under the social security law. However, more than three-fourths of us live in metropolitan areas now. There are still some few that have a maid, but a mire common tax problem is the yard boy problem. In the affluent society we end up pay-ing a substantial wage to an enterprising young man from our neighborhood to do our yard work and to keep the grass and shrubs properly manicured. If you pay this young man more than \$50 a calendar quarter, you are due to get an employer's number and to withhold and pay social security on the wages he earns for the quarter. Keeping a few records and paying taxes may be an easier job than mowing that grass after all. Think it over.

## **Snacks Are Popular** Snacks are becoming more popular. This may be related to the increased proportion of teenagers in the population, to the popular-ity of television and to an increase in entertaining at home, relates Elizabeth Barnard, extension nutritionist. During the recent U. S. Department of Agri-culture 10-year survey, consumption increased for soft drinks, punches and ades, potato chips, crackers, cookies, doughnuts, ice cream, candy, lunch meats and peanut butter.

to **Fifty Years of Tax Fraud Work** This year is the 50th anniversary of the intelligence division in Internal Revenue Service. Six Post Office inspectors became the first special agents under ex-Post Office Inspector Elmer L. Irey in 1919. Even though the six men have grown to a force of approximately 1900 highly qualified and trained special agents, they still represent a very small part of the 65,000 total tax people in IRS. During 1968, there were 9,739 tax fraud investigations. Subjects of tax fraud investigations included a cross section of taxpayers in all strata of society and all walks of life. Types of violations successfully prosecuted included income tax evasion, willful

Crowell Chapter No. 916, OES failure to file a return, false claim for refund, and other tax law violations. During 1968 the special agents secured 1,026 indictments, next meeting will be December 9, 7:00 p. and 638 taxpayers pled guilty or nolo contendere during the year.




