

and Christmas, it is our privilege to sit and reflect upon our many blessings and friends. I feel fairly confident that it is not often that a sheriff is adopted, but you certainly have been adopted by our family.

With all your duties, large and small, good and bad, a seemingly small and relatively routine incident has come and gone your way and you have done your customary, I am sure, efficient job.

Several months ago, you received a call from a frantic father in Amarillo trying to locate his wife en route to Munday, Knox County, Texas. You were told that a frantic grandfather and grandmother were bringing a very sick daughter by car and these two | people should meet in your town. You were asked if you could arrange a meeting of two cars from two different places never having seen either family or either car. Of course, you were most obliging, reassuring, and totally accommodating. On first examination, it might not seem like a lot to you, but to us it meant everything for the sick little girl was

The fact that the call came after routine and regular office hours meant nothing at all to you, and you promptly stationed yourself in such a manner as to intercept both parties and both cars. This you did and sent the mother back to Amarillo with the sick child to the hospital and a surgeon who was waiting.

Under ordinary circumstances, many would have termed this a job well done, but not you. You felt a further obligation to call highway patrol escort the mother through faith in the redemption and sick child on into Amarillo. And this you did. Not a hitch was made, not a bobble was encount-

Two Minutes With the Bible

Continue Thou

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse . . . but continue thou" (II Tim. 3:13,

These were among the words of the great Apostle Paul, written in view of his approaching martyrdom, to Timothy, his beloved son in the faith.

Circumstances, outwardly, were anything but encouraging. seemed that the last days of the dispensation of grace were indeed at hand. The apostle had borne many "persecutions" and "afflictions" and now "suffered trouble, as an evil doer, even unto bonds." There were those who, like Jannes and Jambres, had "resisted the truth" (verse 8). "Alexander the coppersmith" had done him "much evil" and had "greatly withstood his words" (4:14,15). 'Evil men and seducers" had ris en on every hand and were to 'wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived" (3:13).

There was even defection among his own brethren in the faith, so that now, from his Roman prison, he had to report: "All they which are in Asia have turned away from me . . . Demas hath forsaken only Luke is with me' (1:15; 4:10,11).

And what, now, is his parting advice to young Timothy? Does he say: "Perhaps I have been too intense. My methods have made many enemies. I advise you to be more diplomatic and tolerant than I have been?" Hardly, for the records show Paul to have been of all men most tactful and considerate. His sufferings were not the result of a contentious spirit, but of his faithfulness in proclaiming that message which so embarrasses and enrages "our adversary, the devil," that message which is God's gracious response to man's need and His answer to Satan's slander-the gospel of the grace of God.

Thus it is that the Apostle urges Timothy: "Continue thou be not ashamed . . . strong." He well knew that in this sin-cursed world the only hope for the individual is to be ahead and have the city police and found in God's offer of salvation






