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

The voter registration total for the year has already exceeded the 1968 year-a presidential election year-when the registration total was 1,032 about a week before the January 31 deadline.

The county is far ahead of the goal of 915 as set by the State Democratic Executive Committee in the "Operation: Everybody!" project to get Texans to register to vote.

Gold, silver and bronze plaques will be awarded to the counties which exceed their quotas by the highest margins.

Monday Is Last Day to File Next Monday, February 2, is the deadline for candidates to file with the Democratic Executive Committee chairman, Ray Shirley, in order to be listed on the Democratic primary ballot.



December 28, where it drifted on US 70 east of town, was still evident in a few scattered spots in the bar ditch Sunday. It has been a long time since a snow remain.


Leslie Hopkins Earns the Crowell superintendency to re-place Henry Black, who is retiring By Examination **By Examination**
