

State tourism officials were hosted in Del Rio last month by the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce at the world premiere of the Texas Highway Department's new travel film, "Law West of the Pecos.'

The motion picture deals with one of the great legends of the Southwest, Judge Roy Bean of Langtry. The colorful saloon-keeper and frontier justice of the peace brought national attention to his rustic tavern-courtroom-bil-

liard hall called the Jersey Lilly. In those yesterdays the Jersey Lilly stood beside the transcontinental tracks of the Southern Pacific, serving early travelers on their way West. The old judge died, and the unused building weathered in the Langtry sun.

The Southern Pacific Railroad deeded the site to the state in 1939, and the Texas legislature directed the Highway Department to restore, to preserve and to maintain the historic structure, so that "the legends of Judge Roy Bean and the Jersey Lilly may

ever be told and appreciated." Today the Jersey Lilly still stands, serving modern travelers in a visitor complex where the legends of Judge Roy Bean still are

told and appreciated. In the new air conditioned Visitor Center by the rustic original, travelers are transported back to pioneer times as they view dior-amas which depict highlights of Judge Bean's life. Special tape recordings simulate the voices of characters in the three-dimension-

al scenes. Outside the visitor center, grounds are landscaped with native plants of the Southwest. Pathways thread through the area, and signs identify the plants, giving historical background on their

uses by Indians and early settlers. The "Law West of the Pecos" film is being placed with a national distributor for television use throughout the nation. It is also available free for school, club or group showings from the Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, Box 5064, Austin 78703.



Color to Match Mood Predicted

Wall paints that change color to match your mood, repel dust, or act as the wiring in your house are predicted in a report on the paint industry by Chemical and Engineering News.

Jelled paint that can be "buttered" on the wall, paint that gives off an aroma or a germicide, and paint containing "microvoids" that produce "subliminal psychological stimuli," also are among the farout paint products described by David M. Kiefer, senior editor of the American Chemical Society weekly.

A property of certain painted surfaces that causes them change hue with changes in lighting conditions has long been a serious headache to paint makers, because colors that match in one light may appear quite different in another. This property is now being developed into an advantage -the ability to change the color of an interior wall by varying the lighting.

Paints that conduct electricity already have been produced and might be used for wiring a house, if covered with an insulating coat, according to the report. It would also be possible to coat a wall with conductive paint and give it a static charge to repel dust.

Another innovation is a paint that develops microscopic bubbles of gas as it dries. Called microvoids, they scatter light to give good hiding power, thus replacing a portion of the much more expensive pigments. They also cause paint pigments to fluoresce, producing some unusual effects.

A-Scholarships are generally not taxable and do not have to be reported for tax purposes. Since there are many different types of scholarships, you will want to check with the organization that gave you the scholarship to see if they have information on its tax status.

Q-Why did IRS drop the short form 1040A?




