Bill Sponsored by Passed in Congress

Congressman Graham Purcell last week saw his bill pass by a unanimous vote. The legislation provides American consumers with better, cheaper meat and dairy products through the establishment and operation of an international animal quarantine station to import new strains of breed livestock.

The end result, Purcell said, of the quarantine station would be "the continuance of domestic herd protection while making available introduction of new blood strains for increased and less expensive productivity.'

Present law contains stringen restrictions against the importation of livestock when they come from countries declared by U. S. Department of Agriculture to be infected with certain diseases, particularly foot and mouth disease. Purcell said the legislation would continue to protect domestic animals, but pointed out "that it has been shown that the wider the genetic diversity of parent stock used in cross-breeding, the greater are the potential improvements, such as increased muscularity, efficiency of weight gain and fertility."

The bill would allow currently restricted or prohibited, but potentially beneficial breeding stock, to be placed in quarantine on an island, providing maximum security measures against diseases and pests. The Secretary of Agriculture would be authorized to set the conditions for release of the animals for shipment to other parts of the United States.

Purcell stressed that this can ne done at little cost to the federal government "through acceptance of donations of property and fee schedule that minimizes government cost of the station."

The Subcommittee on Livestock and Grains, which Purcell chairs, mittee on Agriculture where it said the bill was also supported by the Department of Agriculture and livestock breeders. The Senate has already passed similar legislation.

While most tax practitioners are competent and honest, Mr. Campbell alerted taxpayers to these potential danger signals:

Never sign a blank return; Do not sign a tax return pre pared in pencil, it can be changed

Avoid the advisor who "guarantees" refunds, wants a percentage of the refund, or supposedly knows all the angles; and

Be on your guard if it is suggested that your refund check be mailed to the advisor.

Mr. Campbell said a professional advisor should sign the tax return he prepares on the line provided and you, the taxpayer, should record his name and address for future reference.
