

Time for Social Security Recipients to

Many residents of Crowell and surrounding communities must file a report of their 1969 earnings with the Social Security Adminis-

tration between January 1 and April 15, 1970. Not all persons receiving social

security benefits are requested to file a report of earnings, but many who are, do not, and this can result in either lost benefits or a penalty.

The general rule is that any person who is entitled to social 83 security benefits and worked and year-old woman in 1965. earned over \$1680 in 1969, will

be required to file a report between January 1 and April 15.

There are two general areas where filing is not necessary: (1) Those who did not earn over 4,300-vote convention to Fort \$1680 in 1969; and (2) persons who were age 72 in January 1969 or earlier.

Those filing a report in the social security office should take their 1969 tax returns if they were self-employed, or their W-2 forms if they worked for wages with them. They should also be did not work in their own business or work for wages of over \$140
