Range grass is greening, along with plenty of wild rye, and livestock are reported in good condition. A weed relatively new to this area is giving grain growers concern. The mustard-looking plant is found in abundance in wheat fields.

Foard One of Five Counties in State With No Suspensions
Foard County was one of five counties of the 254 in the State of Texas which did not have a drivers' license suspension or denial during 1969, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Across the state, there were 21,295 persons who had their drivers licenses suspended last year. There are 22 different violations listed in the annual report under which a driver's license may be suspended.

Bill King is manager of the farmers gin here. **Truscott Elevator** The Farmers Co-Operative Elevator Association of Truscott has also scheduled its annual meeting for Saturday, April 25, according to Elmo Todd, manager. The meeting will be held at the Truscott school building beginning at 1:30 p. m. The Truscott elevator each year sends all its members a ballot containing the names of all resident and non-resident members of the co-op, and from this list, members select their seven choices for members of the board. These ballots must be returned in time for the counting of ballots which begins at 9 a. m., April 25. All ballots must be in before 12 p. m.

Sentencing Set for Thursday in Dist. Court Action

Guilty Verdict Is Returned in Theft by False Pretext Case
A 46th district court jury Wednesday of last week returned a verdict of guilty in the trial of a Wichita Falls man who was accused of theft by false pretext. District Judge Tom Davis of Vernon announced that sentence will be passed on the man Thursday, April 23, at 10 a. m. The case involved a charge of theft of false pretext in connection with the sale and storage of almost worthless automatic fire extinguisher devices in August of 1969. District Attorney Bill Neal of Vernon said similar charges against the man are pending in Wilbarger County. In other 46th district court action Wednesday, a 23-year-old man was given a two-year probation sentence after entering a guilty plea to possession of marijuana. On Thursday, a Littlefield man pled guilty to driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, and was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary. He was arrested in Crowell in December, 1969, following an automobile accident in which he was involved.

R. S. (Dick) Carroll, 72, native of Quannah and former Foard County resident, died suddenly at his home in Denison on Sunday, April 12, following a brief illness.

Mr. Carroll was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Carroll, pioneer hardware merchant family of Quannah, and he was a brother of the late Mrs. Leslie McAdams of Foard County. He was a veteran of World War I having served with the Navy, and served during World War II in the Pacific with the Seabees.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m., Wednesday, April 16, in Denison with burial in the veterans plot of the Denison cemetery. Military graveside rites were conducted.

Survivors include the wife of the home; one son, Richard Carroll of Sioux Falls, S. D.; one brother, Homer Carroll of Denison; six grandchildren and one great grandchild; also one stepdaughter of Denison. He was preceded in death last July by one daughter, Mrs. Mary Helen Chamberlain of Pennsylvania, N. J.

Mr. and Mrs. Otis Gafford of Crowell, their son, Charles Gafford of Garland, and Mrs. J. D. Carroll of Quannah were among those attending the services.

The Veterans Administration is urging nearly 667,000 veterans whose term life insurance policies are due for renewal this year to examine them closely to determine whether they should convert to permanent plan policies.



Austin, Tex. — Adequacy of planned public school education programs on the dangers of drug abuse drew a challenge last week from Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes as the war on narcotics increased in tempo.

Barnes told newsmen he feels the program can be "redeemed" and straightened out by the beginning of the next school year. He suggested that bona fide authorities on drugs and former addicts should be included among teacher-resource personnel.

Meanwhile, the Lieutenant Governor told a narcotics seminar that law officers and prosecutors that Texas is spending far too little money on drug law enforcement.

Gov. Preston Smith, in the opening address to the conference, said the primary obligation of law

enforcement is to rid society of pushers who traffic in narcotics for profit. Smith also said education is the key weapon in fighting drug abuse by addicts and experimenters.

Barnes said the new school course on narcotics should be made as "personal" as possible. Both Smith and Barnes agreed that teaching must be done by those who know what they are talking about.

Lieutenant Governor believes that lowering of penalties for first-offense possession of marijuana to misdemeanors would end the reluctance of juries to convict. He reported heavy response to his suggestion, and said that correspondence is running four-to-one in favor of lighter sentences. Pushers, he emphasized, should get tougher punishment than at present.

Spending for enforcement, the Lieutenant Governor claims, could be increased "200, 300 to 400 percent" without undue burden on taxpayers—by "re-evaluation of priorities."

 State Board of Health may adopt reasonable rules and regulations relating to minimal equipment for ambulances, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

—Board of trustees for a firemen's relief and retirement fund cannot invest in mutual funds.

—Changes in boundaries of county election precincts may be made only during July and August terms of county commissioners' court and the month of September, 1970. Changes do not become effective until the following voting year.

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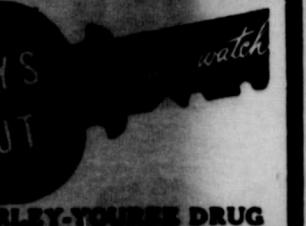

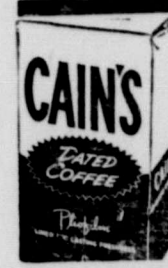

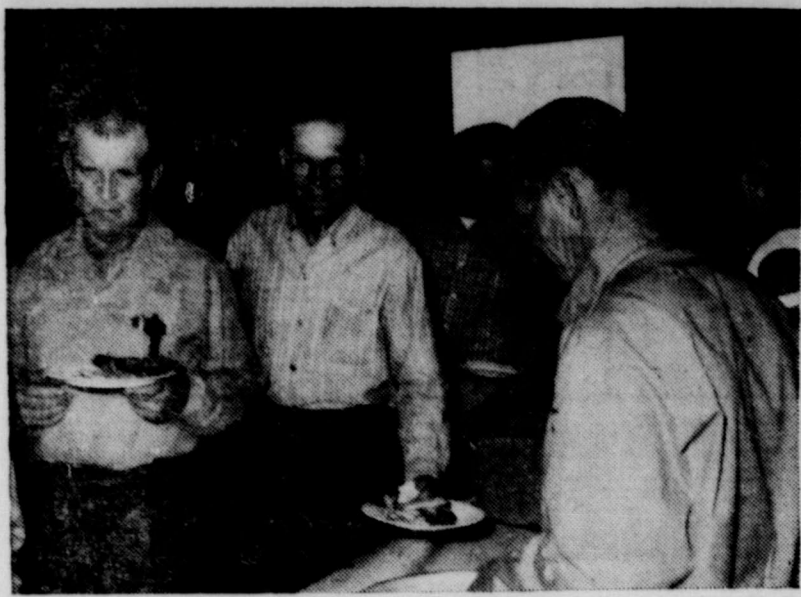

Altus Classing Office Completes 31st Season

Total of 2,782 Bales Foard Cotton Classed Last Season

The USDA's Cotton Division classing office at Altus reports the completion of a "better than average" cotton season in western Oklahoma and West Texas. C. E. Cox, in charge of the Altus office, initially described the harvest as "probably one of the latest and fastest" in the 31-year history of that office. Classing activity finally got under way in earnest just after the first of November and continued without abating for a little more than 8 weeks. Peak operation was quickly reached before the end of November. However, final scrapping of a 31-county territory has continued at a lagging pace until just a few days ago.

During the peak operation of the past season, as many as 55 employees worked at handling the influx of cotton samples. Of these, 16 were cotton classers and classing supervisors, and with the help of 16 recorders, 13 mike operators, and six laborers, all involved directly in the handling of the cotton samples, they were able to work a little over 8,000 samples per day. During the period of heaviest receipts, the classing office was able to stay within two to three days of current receipts.

Total samples classed at Altus during the 1969 season amounted to 278,278 bales. In addition, a seasonal sub-office at Memphis, Texas, classed 106,624 bales, making a total of 384,902 bales classed from 17 Oklahoma and 14 Texas counties. This compares with 478,648 bales classed during 1968.

Foard County's 1969 cotton crop was about one-half that of the preceding year, according to records at the Altus classing office. The 1969 crop totaled 2,782 bales, while the 1968 crop totaled 5,491 bales.

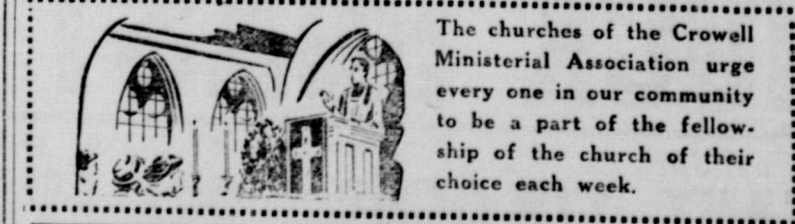
Cottle County History Will Be Published
