Kenneth Sellers Wins First in 220 at Regional Meet

Crowell Runner Sets New Regional Record in Event

Kenneth Sellers, CHS sprint star, won first in the 220-yard dash and second in the 100-yard dash in the regional meet held in Denton last week end. In winning the 220, Kenneth broke the regional 220 record with a 21.7. The old record was 22.2 seconds.

In the sprint relay, the Crowell team won fourth and was composed of George Eavenson, Mike Weathered, Junior Urquiza and Sellers. Larry Swan won seventh in the 880 yard run.

Sellers will be entering the state qualifiers meet in Lubbock Saturday and will be entering both the 220 and 100 at the state meet in Austin May 8 and 9.

Munday and Clifton tied for first place honors in the regional meet at Denton. Crowell accumulated 22 points.

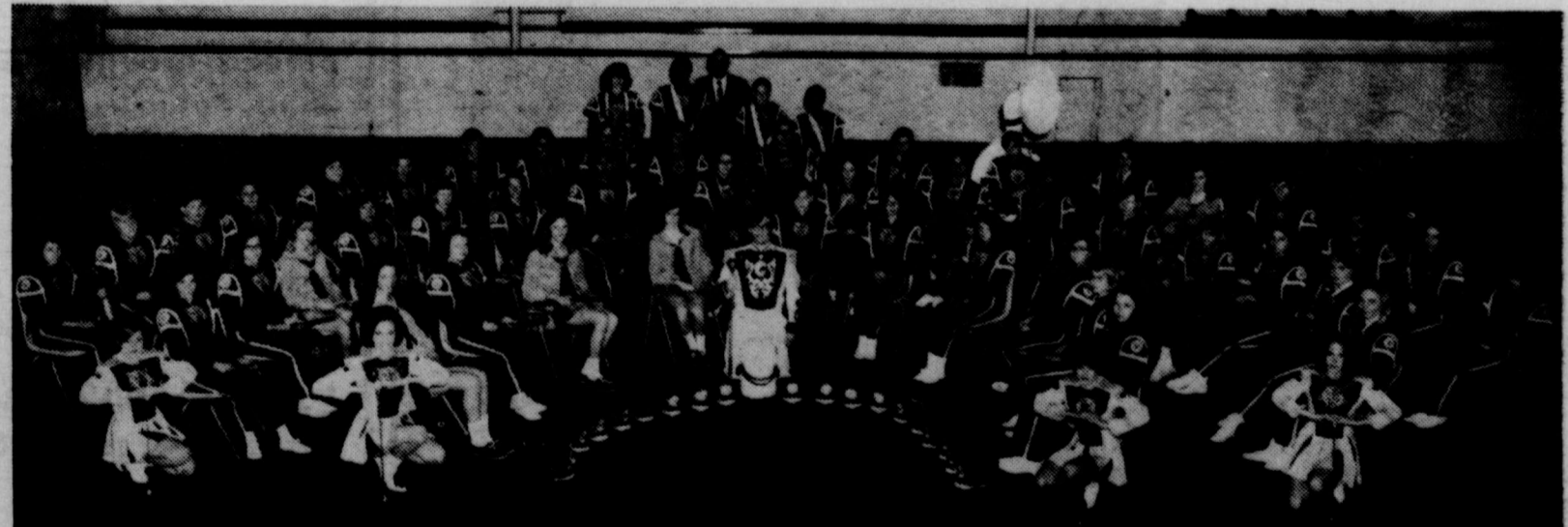
Being selected best supporting actor at regional entitles Pat to a summer theatre workshop scholarship at Texas Tech.



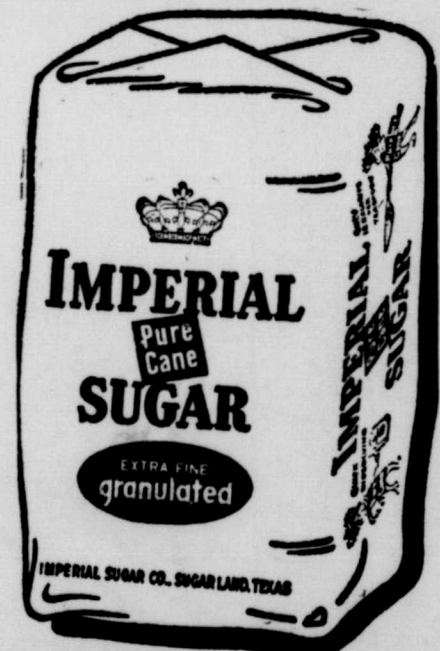

Greenbelt Cities Using Only 18 Per Cent of Water

The five cities in the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority are using only 18 per cent of the available water supply. Only 18 per cent of the 67.84 per cent which the authority owns, it was pointed out at a special meeting of Greenbelt directors at the filtering plant near Clarendon Thursday night, April 24, and reported by Morris Higley, publisher of the Childress Index.

Cities in the Greenbelt, which are indirectly responsible to the

Authority for the payment of bonds, could be in financial difficulty in the not too distant future if more water is not used.

Danny Burger, director of management funds for the Texas Water Board, made several suggestions and heard suggestions from Authority directors on how to solve the problem, but no action was taken other than members of the Authority board will appear before the State Board on May 21.

There is a possibility that the state group will purchase another \$1,000,000 in water to hold in reserve for future use of the Authority. At the present time the state owns \$1,034,000 in reserve water. That proposition may be presented to the state group on May 21.

There is a possibility that the state board may come back with the agreement attached that some of the money be raised to support the bonds of the Authority through taxes.

"The state is not demanding anything at the present time because all of the Greenbelt cities are meeting their obligations," Burger said.

The obligations are expected to become more difficult, however, if the consumption of water continues to drop.

Should money be raised through taxes, the water rates can be cut in the various Greenbelt cities.

The tax proposition will enable a broader base from which to assure the payment of the bonds.

City Councils, with the additional income from taxes, could reduce the water rates, enabling

users to also take advantage of subtracting the taxes from income, which runs from 20 per cent up.

No groups but the City Councils can set water rates to the Greenbelt cities. The Greenbelt sets its rates to the cities and only enough is charged to retire the bonds, pay interest and operation costs.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the Greenbelt was not interested in making a profit, but producing the best water possible at the lowest price possible.

Most of the Greenbelt cities are caught with the pay-off not only of the Greenbelt debt but debts accumulated previously through searches for water.

For example, the city of Childress has a bonded debt of over half a million dollars, most of it spent in years past on Lake Childress, Baylor Lake, the Michie Sandhills, 62 Well and the city's water system.

Should the state purchase some more water to put into reserve until needed later, it could reduce the demand to the cities at the present time.

Burger pointed out that the Texas Water Board appreciates the difficulty of the Greenbelt cities at the present time, appreciates the fact that they are "taking it on the chin" to meet the bond requirements, but at the same time would not be inclined to use money of the taxpayers and buy more water without more assurance that eventually the water would be purchased back.

High charges for water has cut consumption of water in all of the Greenbelt cities.

Total of \$630.00 in Savings Bonds Sold in County During March

The Department of the Treasury has announced that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Foard County during March totaled \$630.00. During the first quarter of 1970, sales were \$3,521.00 for 5 per cent of the \$70,000 goal.

Texasans purchased \$14,317,669 in Savings Bonds and Notes during March compared to March 1969 sales of \$13,684,597—a 4.6 per cent increase. January-March sales totaled \$46,858,407—26 per cent of the state's goal of \$179.9 million.

Sales across the nation during the month amounted to \$458 million—20.3 per cent above March 1969 sales. Exchanges of Series E bonds for Series H amounting to \$62 million were reported for the first quarter—a 26 per cent increase over the \$50 million exchanged during 1969.

Deferment and Brush Control

Defer pastures to allow forage plants to restore vigor, advise range specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Defer, they say, after weeds have been controlled as an aid to a speed-up in range improvement. Landowners should make plans now for controlling brush and weeds with herbicides. Time for spraying is at hand.

WTCC Policy Regarding National Farm Legislation

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has released the text of its policy regarding national farm legislation. It follows:

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce supports the adoption of a farm bill that would support prices at a level that would give farmers an opportunity to operate at a profit. This could be a program similar to what we have had since 1965.

The Federal Government, commodity groups, and our own organization should be encouraged to work on programs that would remove the need for acreage controls, price supports and direct payments. Some of the programs that would help remove these needs are:

1. The State Department should take more aggressive action to counter Common Market tariffs on U. S. agriculture products with tariffs on industrial imports from Common Market countries and other countries that bar our agricultural products from their market place.

2. Our government and commodity groups should be more aggressive in promoting U. S. agricultural products at home and abroad.

Parity should be based on the purchasing power farmers had during a base period rather than the average price of a commodity during the past three years. The program should not be extended to other products not now included in the program.

We are opposed to any type of long-term land retirement or whole farm retirement program.
