

Grain harvest in Foard County was drawing to a close this week after thousands of bushels of grain were cut with the favorable weather that has prevailed here since last Thursday.

Totals as reported by the county's three elevators Monday afternoon showed a total of 785,336 bushels of wheat had been delivered to the elevators up to noon Monday. A total of 77,679 bushels of oats and 46,-569 bushels of barley have also been delivered to the county's elevators.

One elevator man estimated on Monday that the wheat harvest was 85 per cent complete at that time. If this prediction is correct, the county will fall a little short of a million bushels of wheat.

Market price of wheat had remained steady at \$1.20 a bushel all through harvest up to Monday, when the price dropped to \$1.18. The big days for the harvest were last Friday and Saturday with the grain cutting getting underway in a big way last Thursday afternoon following several days last week of cloudy, moist

They may qualify for these benefits without having worked themselves if their deceased husbands worked long enough under social security. A widow's disability must have started within 7 years after her husband's death or after she last received checks because she had minor children in her care in order for her to qualify for these benefits.

A widow is considered disabled only if her impairment is so severe that it keeps her from workmonths. Age, education, and work

Although the benefits payable are permanently reduced, many widows find this opportunity to receive a monthly check a real elp in time of need.



for another decade nearly one quarter of the residents-or 2 million New Yorkers-will be on the dole. At present, 1.1 million are collecting welfare each month.

The cost of the city's welfare is \$1.9 billion this year. The Federal Government is paying \$825.7 million, the state \$520.1 million and the city \$596.4 million.


