A hearing on the proposed division and reorganization of the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District has been set for Tuesday night, September 8, beginning at 8 o'clock in the court room at Crowell.

On July 8, a petition signed by a majority of the members of the board of directors of the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District No. 122 was presented in the office of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board at Temple requesting the division and reorganization of the SCS district. The LPRSWCD is comprised of land located in Foard and Hardeman County, and it is reported that the proposed change would make separate districts, one comprising the land in Foard and the other comprising Hardeman County land.

According to Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, which called the hearing for Crowell, the discussion will be held on the question of the desirability and necessity of the division and reorganization of the district; on the question of boundaries of such districts to be reorganized; upon the propriety of the petition and of proceedings taken under the provisions of Senate Bill 152.

> "Department of Public Safety officers will be out in full force during the holiday period, as will local police officers within the cities, for the purpose of enforcing the safety laws which were designed to save lives and property," he said. "Operation Motor-cide," a statewide cooperative effort on the part of all police agencies and the public media will be in effect during the 78-hour period to serve as a reminder of the added hazards of holiday road trav-

Speir said an analysis of the fatal accidents that occurred during the last similar holiday period, the 78-hour Fourth of July holiday week end revealed the follow-

ing contributing factors: General carelessness, excessive speed for conditions, failure to yield or stop when required, drivers drinking, pedestrian drinking. "Our study indicated that without a doubt, most of these fatal accidents could have been avoided,'

"It also is perhaps significant to note that most of the accidents involved only one vehicle, indicating that in most cases there was nobody else to blame but the driver himself. The study also revealed that in nearly half of the fatal crashes, the driver himself was the victim. There were nearly as many cases of vehicles running off the roadways as there incidents involving more than one vehicle. In most cases where pedestrians were killed, the records indicate that it was the pedestrian who

was at fault." The record also reflects that there were numerous accidents caused by drivers failing to negotiate curves, again indicating speed too fast for conditions, he continued, pointing ont that "imprudent speed" is a violation of the law. In some cases, drivers ran off roadways on straight stretches indicating driving while drinking or excessive fatigue, another important factor, said Spear.


