We who are old enough to have gone to school with him, followed his career through Texas A&M and into professional ranks, were always "busting a button," full of pride at the mention of his name. A high tension pervaded every game in which he participated because he was a touchdown threat on every play. It seemed he played every minute as though never once to let down his team or to fail in a maximum effort.
 But, other factors with regard to Dick are worth noting well. He is a common fellow, ready to be a friend to all. He has never been "heady" even in the center of high acclaim. A big bonfire was held on the school grounds last Thursday night in preparation for the homecoming activities planned here over the week end.

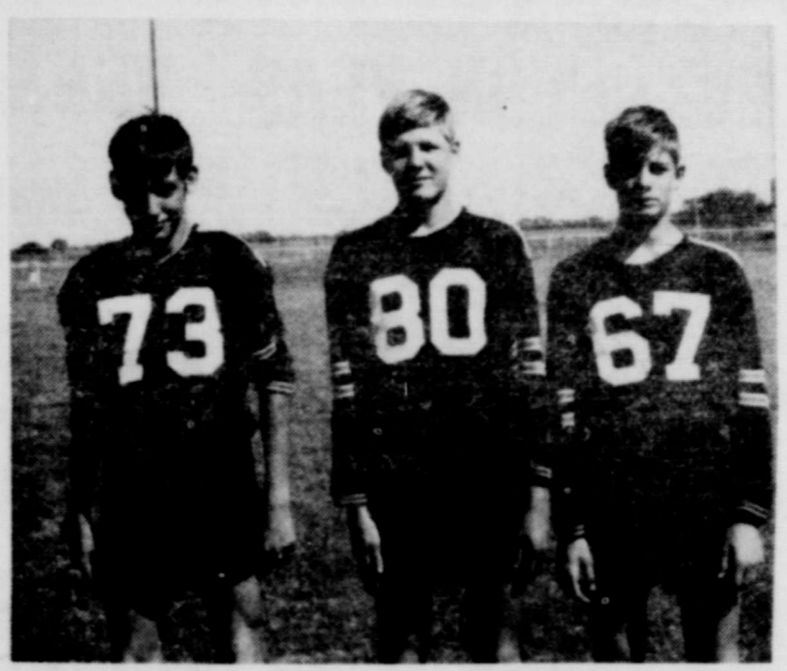

Texas Churches Help Relieve a Famine in Ethiopia

Through resources raised in community canvasses last year by CROP, the Community Hunger Appeal of Church World Service, \$2,000 worth of rice has been purchased and shipped to Ethiopia, where severe famine is taking place.

Large parts of one province of Ethiopia, Eritrea, have not had rain for three consecutive years. In one district of another province, Gojjam, 19,000 people are literally starving and without any food whatsoever, and 60,000 have very little left. Furthermore, the forecast for next year looks grim because no seeds are left for sowing and many farm plow animals have died for lack of fodder and water.

In the Gambela section of Ethiopia, the area destined to receive the rice purchased by CROP in Texas, people were seen gathering roots from the forest in search for something to eat. The staple food of Gambela, corn, suffered a 50 per cent loss due to the drought. The next crop will be able to provide enough food for the people of Gambela for only one month.

Urgent steps thus need to be taken to avert new famine as well as to overcome the present famine. CROP's purchase is helping.

CROP will canvass Texas again this year, for the most part the canvasses will be conducted by youth during the weeks of November 8-15, the week Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed "CROP Week in Texas." The local drive was conducted last Friday afternoon, and any resident missed in that drive who would like to contribute can give their donation to Rev. Walter Driver or Mrs. J. B. Weatherred.

From the News...

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, October 31, 1940, issue of The Foard County News:

The nationwide general election to be held next Tuesday, Nov. 5, will determine who will be the next president and vice president of the United States. It will decide whether the voting citizenship of the United States wants the continuance of the present administration to be headed by Franklin D. Roosevelt and Henry A. Wallace or a change to a new administration which would be headed by Wendell L. Willkie and Charles McNary.

The number 158, the first to be drawn in the nation's peacetime draft lottery at Washington, D. C., Tuesday, was held in Foard County by Louis Rivers. The number was drawn by Secretary of War Stimson and was read to the world by radio by President Roosevelt. The second number of the lottery was drawn by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau and was 192. Morris Diggs held this serial number in Foard County. The fifteenth number to be drawn became order number 3 for this county. This was No. 105 and was held by James Menefee.

Foard County was swept by its heaviest rain and hail in many years Wednesday afternoon shortly after 6 o'clock. Within forty-five minutes after the storm struck water was running over the highways within the city limits and water was higher in many sections of Crowell than possibly ever before. Every community of the county reports good rains, varying from 3 to 5 inches.

Dick Todd of Crowell reeled off a sensational 61-yard run in the early minutes of the fourth quarter for a touchdown last Sunday to bring his team, the Washington Redskins, from behind and to defeat the Detroit Lions, 20-14. The Redskins are leading the Eastern division of the National League. Todd also intercepted one of Whizzer White's passes.

Receiving enough breaks to defeat any football team, the Chillicothe Eagles nosed out Coach Grady Graves' Crowell Wildcats 14 to 9 after being played off their feet during most of the scrap.

Brunks' Comedians will return to Crowell to play a week's engagement starting Monday, Nov. 4. The heated tent theatre will be located south of the post office.

Construction was begun last Thursday on a five-room residence for Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Johnson on their farm 9 miles southwest of Crowell. The building will be a rock veneer structure and will be modern in every detail.

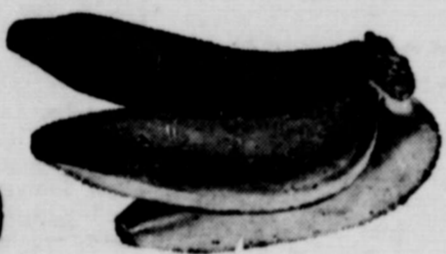

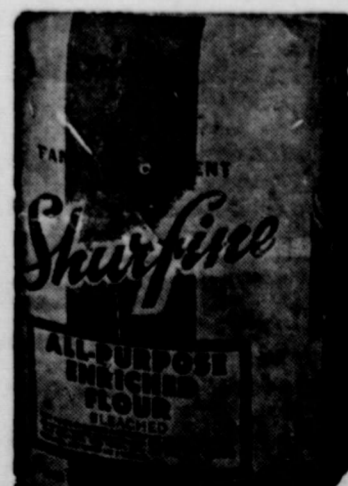
