Doctor Says Way Available to Conquer **Heroin Addiction**

"Your doctor now has available way to conquer completely heroin addiction." This announcement was made last week by Dr. News items below were taken Paul Williamson of Practice Research, Inc.

"First, we put the patient on methadone which might be de-

scribed as a milder narcotic," Dr. Williamson said. "When an addict takes methadone, he can hold a job or go to school. This is impossible on heroin. In six months to a year, after he establishes a normal life, we then use electrosleep to take him off methadone.

"Electrosleep has been used for as much as ten years in Germany to fight addictions," Williamson said. "It is now being manufactured in Texas, in New York and will shortly be manufactured in Nebraska.
