## Instructions Given on 1968 Wheat Export Program

Producers who participated in the 1968 wheat program have been mailed instructions concerning their share of the export certificates, Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager of the Foard County ASCS office, said last week. "If you did not receive instructions, this means your share was less than \$3.00 and no check was printed by the computer. If you wish to receive your share of less than \$3.00, you must make a written application at this office. All payments not claimed will accumulate to be used for research and market promotion. All other producers should follow the instructions in the letter they received," Mrs. Reeder said.

She also advised wheat producers with 1970 crop wheat loans to talk with their elevator man as they might have some profit in this wheat.

### Future Cotton Program

It is possible that actual cotton production for 1970 is to be used to establish 1971 projected cotton yields. "You should be certain that your ginner properly credits each bale to the farm where it was produced," Mrs. Reeder added.

### Crop Reports Needed

During the early part of November, some 25,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop questionnaire from Gary Palmer, state statistician, for the Texas crops and livestock reporting service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers for providing an accurate picture of their county and Texas agriculture. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly.

### Report Changes

The local ASCS manager advised, "If you have bought, sold, leased, rented or otherwise acquired or disposed of farm land, you should visit this office and report the transactions."

## Gold Star Winners Named

### Fifty-One Foard County 4-H Youths Honored at Program Saturday Night

Fifty-one Foard County 4-H boys and girls were awarded medals for outstanding 4-H Club work last Saturday night, November 7, at a meeting in the First Baptist Church in Crowell. The occasion was the annual 4-H awards program.

A large crowd of boys and girls, their parents and other interested persons attended the program. Medals are presented each year to outstanding 4-H boys and girls by the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University in cooperation with various donors.

The highest county award given is the Gold Star Award and Miss Rita Coffey and Bill Myers were the 1970 recipients of this award.

Miss Coffey is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delton Coffey of Crowell. She has been actively participating in 4-H activities for eight years.

Rita has carried projects in leadership, foods, citizenship, sewing, gardening, record book and home management. She is a member of the 4-H subcommittee of the Foard County Program Building Committee. She has received medals in home improvement, clothing, foods and nutrition, bread, citizenship, and meat. Rita has attended district leadership camp for three years, and has acted as a project leader for the first year foods group.

She is very active in school, church and community activities. She is vice president of the Drama and Library Clubs, member of the FHA, FFA Sweetheart, member of the Pep Club, critic for the Sub-Junior Columbian Club, and president of the Foard County Junior Leaders 4-H Club.

Bill Myers is the 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Myers. He has been in 4-H Club work eight years, and has received county medals in safety, beef, and conservation of natural resources.

He was selected to receive the Gold Star award on the basis of his outstanding leadership and for helping and encouraging younger 4-H'ers with their demonstrations and other problems.

Bill has carried demonstrations in safety, electricity, leadership, tractor, citizenship, field crops and livestock production. He attended the district leadership lab at Lake Brownwood in 1970. He is a member of the Foard County 4-H and youth subcommittee and has helped carry out many county 4-H functions. Bill is active in school and community activities.

Rita and Bill will be honored at the District Gold Star luncheon Saturday, December 12, along with the other Gold Star winners in District 3.

At the Saturday night program, the Foard County 4-H Council's chairman, Miss Coffey, was master of ceremonies. Miss Sharla Haynie, member of the County 4-H Council and delegate to the District Council, recognized special guests; while Jerry Martin and Bob Burkett led the group in prayer and the 4-H pledge, respectively.

Miss Helen Fincher and Joe Burkett, county extension agents, were presented with a corsage and boutonniere, respectively, by Miss Coffey as a token of appreciation from the 4-H youth of Foard County. Music for the program was provided by Misses Sharla Haynie and Karen Stater. Refreshments were furnished by the Foard County 4-H Clubs.

Pat Cates, member of the Foard County Junior Leaders 4-H Club and Chairman of the District III, 4-H Council, brought an inspiring message, "Look Up," which challenged each 4-H member to continue doing his best in 4-H club work.

## WILDCATS WIN 34-15 OVER PADUCAH FRIDAY

Crowell Wildcat football coached by Scott Boyd, won District 8-A football game Friday last Friday night as they defeated the Dragons a 34-15. This brings the Wildcats' record for the season to 7 wins, 1 tie and 1 loss.

The Crowell attack in the next-to-the-last game of the season were quarterback Mike Weatherred and fullback Jim Tom Smith.

Weatherred led the team to a 7-7 deadlock at the end of the first half, but the Dragons exploded for 21 points in the third quarter.

Weatherred started scoring in the second quarter when he capped a Crowell drive with a one-yard keeper play in the middle. Smith booted for point.

The Dragons came back strong with a scoring drive as David Sweeney went over from the 1. Jesse Solls tied the score with a kick for the point-after.

Crowell's third touchdown in the period came on a 25-yard run by Smith. Urquiza passed to Billy Ray Neal for the two-point conversion. The Wildcats added an insurance touchdown in the fourth quarter when Weatherred raced 10 yards for six points. The kick failed.

The Dragons scored late in the contest when Sweeney capped a drive with a one-yard blast up the middle. Sweeney also ran for the points after.

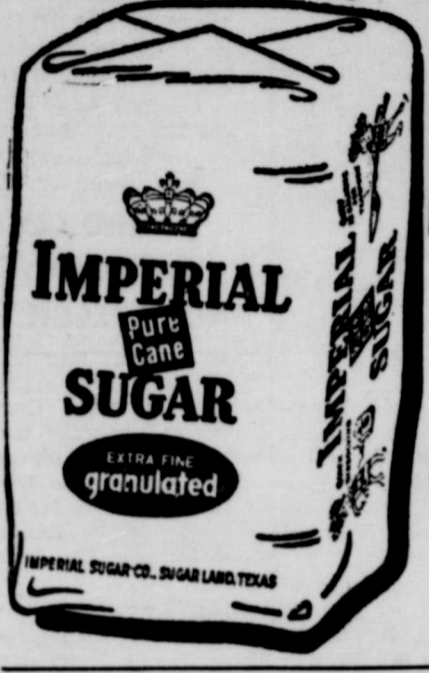

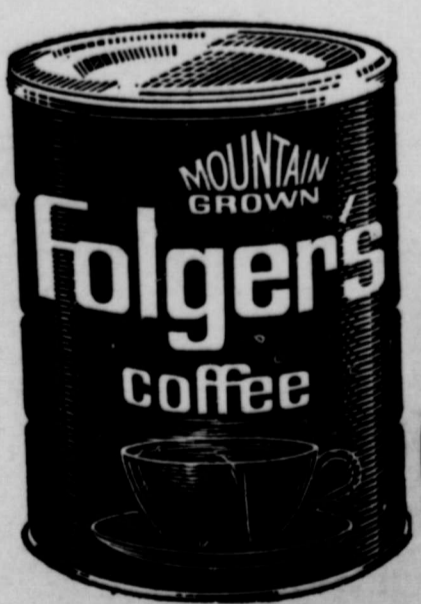
