Oil & Gas Association Reports

Foard County Petroleum Industry Has Annual Economic Value of \$1,722,400

Foard County's petroleum industry produces 512,482 barrels of crude oil valued at \$1,644,680 and 567,298 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$77,720 an annual economic value of \$1,722,400.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county produced 153rd among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Crude oil production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade reached an all-time high in 1969 with 1,151,775,000 barrels, according to U. S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2 per cent since 1960.

She is survived by her husband of Brownwood; one son, V. W. Latimer, Jr., and one daughter, Mrs. Charles Kilpatrick, both of Brownwood; five brothers, Alfred Johnson of Lone Oak, Ca., Richard and Herman Johnson of Crowell, Clarence Johnson of Wichita Falls and Henry Johnson of Sunburn; four sisters, Mrs. Cora May of Redlands, Calif., Zela Johnson of Henrietta, Mrs. Roena Barry of Sundown and Mrs. Estelle Heatham of Brownfield; and six grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by one son, Billy Ray Latimer, who died here in Crowell in January, 1953.

New State Park to Be Open to Public Each Day

Bob Martin of Quanah, Texas Wildlife Department's manager of the new park north of Crowell, said here Tuesday that the park, which is still unnamed, will be open to the public from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. each day.

Mr. Martin said that entrance should be made from the north side of the park, 2 miles north and 1 1/2 mile west from the Peace River bridge. He added that fishing will be allowed with a valid Texas fishing license.

Population of Crowell Is 1,132

The City of Crowell has lost 21.8 per cent of its population during the past ten years, according to preliminary census figures released Monday by Texas A&M University.

Crowell's population in 1970 is listed as 1,132, down from the 1960 figure of 1,703.

Figures released several months ago showed that Foard County had lost about one-third of its population in the past ten years.

Wildcats Win No. 2 Spot in District

CROWELL TAKES 28-0 WIN OVER CHILLICOTHE

The Crowell Wildcat football team took second place in District 8-A for 1970 as a result of a 28-0 win over the Chillicothe Eagles here last Friday night in the last game of the season for both teams.

The Wildcats compiled an 8 wins, 1 loss and 1 tie record for the season under head coach Scott Boyd and his assistant, Bob Cook.

The visiting Chillicothe team was not able to contain the running of fullback Terry Farrar who accounted for half of the Wildcats' scoring and a big slice of the rushing yardage. He scored two touchdowns on runs of two and four yards, respectively, and came up with several key runs on crucial situations.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Wildcats broke loose early in the second quarter when quarterback Mike Weathered fired a pass to fullback Jim Tom Smith. The

play covered 72 yards and put the Wildcats in scoring position on the Chillicothe one-yard line. Farrar drove the score across.

Smith booted the extra point.

A few minutes later, Crowell lineman Rocky Bachman pounced on a Chillicothe fumble in the end zone for another Wildcat TD. Smith again kicked the point-after.

The Wildcats mounted a scoring drive in the third quarter which was capped by a one-yard plunge by halfback George Eavenson. Smith's kick for point-after was good.

The final Crowell touchdown came in the fourth quarter and was scored on a four-yard run by Farrar. Smith kicked his fourth consecutive extra point after.

The Eagles were led by Lester Norice and Ricky Bivins, but the Eagles could not cross the double stripe against the Wildcats' hard-hitting defensive unit.

Defensive stand-outs for the Cats were Bachman, Jessie Barrera, Doug Chowning, Smith, David Myers, Weathered and Farrar.

Completing their high school football careers in this game were Weathered, Smith, Junior Urquizo, George Eavenson, Kenneth Sellers, Jessie Barrera, Marvin Machac, Myers, Jackie Thomas, Chowning, and Jimmy Glover.

One-Act Plays to Be Presented at Crowell High School

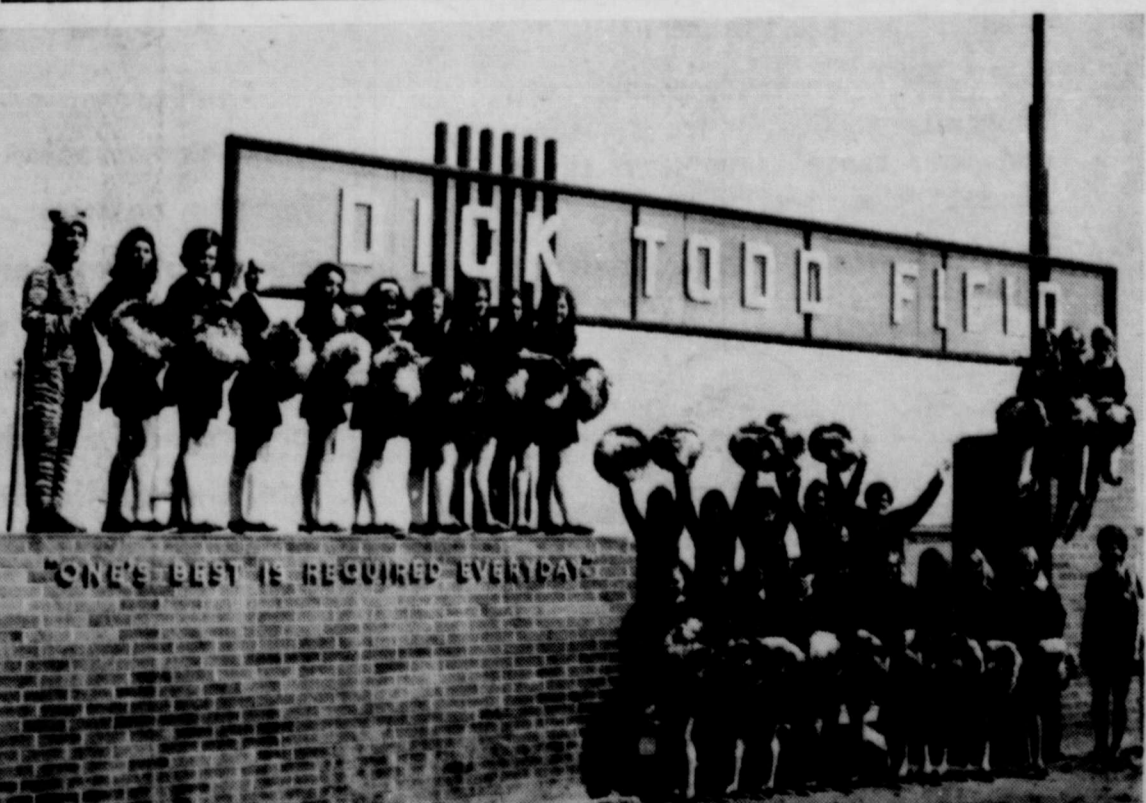

Austin, Tex.—Freshman state legislators received some sobering news in their first orientation conference before the legislative halls open on January 12.

About 30 legislative newcomers turned out for the two-day schooling in the capital city. Major state officials and agency heads functioned in the role of professors.

In addition to warnings that money and legislative redistricting problems lie ahead, young lawmakers got word that welfare cuts are virtually certain early next year.

Welfare Commissioner Burton Hackney reported this grim news on the plight of his agency. He announced that "unless an emergency appropriation is made early in the upcoming legislative session, we still face the prospect of cuts in Aid to Families with Depen-

dent Children and/or medical assistance in the first few months of 1971."

Commissioner Hackney added that "even with an appropriation that would take us up to the annual ceiling on state money for public assistance, we can predict the need for a cut in AFDC grants by June if the rolls continue to grow as they have."

Texas' constitution sets a ceiling of \$80 million for financial assistance to welfare beneficiaries. Hackney said he has asked \$96 million for fiscal 1972 just to cover the present level of public assistance checks.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher urged the freshmen to utilize the formula of "knowledge, cooperation and understanding" in the work ahead.

Further schooling for lawmakers is ahead at a University of Texas special orientation program.

SCHOOL FOOD PROGRAMS NOTED—Gov. Smith notified 1,182 school superintendents that he wants all Texas pupils to have full access to food programs.

He called attention to food services and equipment made available through the National School Lunch Act as mandatory on Jan. 1, 1971. Smith said that hungry children are vulnerable to malnutrition's effect on growth, ability to learn and general intellectual performance.

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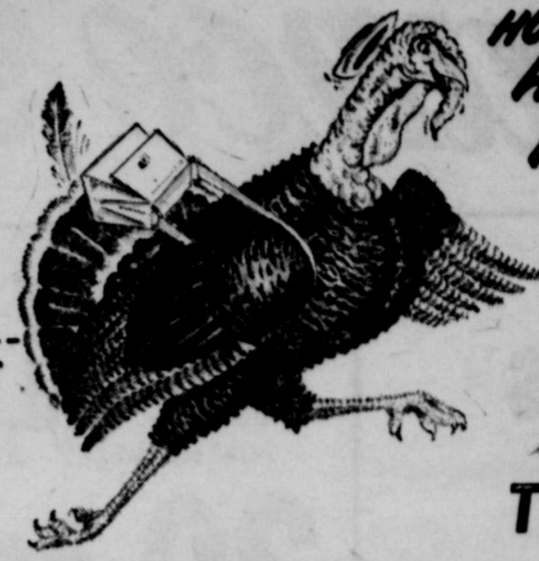

The Texas Farm Bureau elected two new officers, one new director, and adopted state policies and national recommendations at its 37th annual meeting in Fort Worth Nov. 8-11.

J. T. (Red) Woodson of Gober in Fannin County, a grain and livestock farmer, was named president of the 121,158-member organization, succeeding Sidney Dean of Victoria.

Foard County delegates attending the state meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Jones and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Nickie Chatfield.

Mr. Jones served on the state resolutions committee at the convention.

The Foard County Farm Bureau received an award for having renewed 95 per cent of its membership during the year.

The 772 voting delegates from 152 county Farm Bureaus adopted a national recommendation which said, "Now is the time to phase out government programs relating to wheat and feed grains since they are not serving the best interest of farmers."

A new cotton recommendation calls for a return to a market-based economy, but stipulates a seven-point transitional program "to lessen the impact of a sudden, or short-term progressive withdrawal of compensatory payments."

In other actions, the delegates said every effort should be made to inform the general public that usage of agricultural chemicals is subject to stringent federal and state regulations and that farmers are using these chemicals in accordance with federal and state laws.

It was at this convention that Miss Harletta Capps of Vernon, was selected TFB Queen for the year 1971. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Duane Capps of Vernon and granddaughter of Mrs. Maggie Capps of Thalia.

Two years ago, the office had classed a total of 2,652 bales of cotton from this county.

The Altus office has classed a total of 28,000 bales thus far this season. Grades are estimated at 53 per cent in the white grades, and 41 per cent light spotted, with the remaining six per cent mostly in the spotted grades, with a few light grays.

Dangerous Time of Year for Pedestrians

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. 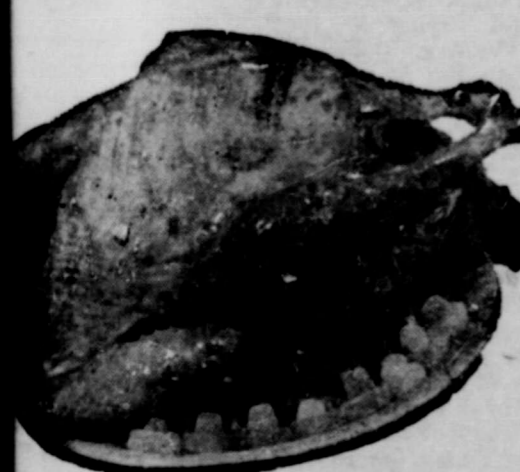
