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



CHRISTMAS LIGHTING CONTEST TO BE SPONSORED BY H. D. CLUBS

Red Arrow Motor Freight Seeking to Purchase ICX Routes in West Texas

Red Arrow Freight Lines of San Antonio, a 42-year-old motor freight company presently serving more than 400 points in Central and South Texas, has entered into a contract to purchase the West Texas area franchises of Illinois-California Express (ICX) and has filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas to approve the sale and transfer. Pat Riddle, vice president of sales for Red Arrow, said last week.

Mr. Riddle said that a hearing has been set for January 18 in Lubbock before the Texas Railroad Commission, which hears evidence both for the Railroad Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Mr. Riddle said that if the application is approved, Red Arrow will extend its service to some 90 cluding Vernon, Quanah, Crow ell, Electra, Childress, Paducal and Seymour in this immediate vicinity.

Christmas Is For Children Everywhere

A medical study in Lahore, Pakistan, shows that 9 of 10 babies who reach their first birthday have already started a lifetime of undernourishment, the Associated Press reported recently.

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
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

Last year social security disability insurance payments totaled over two billion dollars-all paid to disabled workers under 65 and their families. "These payments are part of the social security program for younger people," said Wayne Klipping, social security manager in Vernon.

Disability cash benefits are paid to workers who become unable to work because of a physical or mental condition when they have enough work credits under social security to qualify for benefits. Klipping explained that the dis-

abling condition must be expected to last 12 months or more. The work requirement for persons age 31 and over is five years credit under social security in the ten years just before the disability

Younger people are not requir ed to have as much work. If you become disabled before age 2 you need credit for 11/2 years of work during the last three years. If you become disabled between 24 and 31, you need work credit for half the time after 21 an

before you become disabled. "For more information get in touch with your social security office," Klipping said. "Ask for the booklet, 'If You Become Disabled which is available without charge.




