

Lynch is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Lynch Sr. of Canadian. former Crowell residents, and he is a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Jones of Crowell.

Although 10 other gridders drew consideration, Lynch was a shoo-in for the Back of the Year Laurel. Twice named Globe-News Player of the Week during the recent campaign, Lynch led the area in individual total offense with 2,632 yards-1,136 of that on the ground. His aerial percentage wasn't particularly impressive but he made his throws count. He connected on 79 of 170 attempts for 1,493 yards and 14 touchdowns and added six conversion tosses.

The slippery signal-caller dashed for 17 TD's and scored 15 PAT points to play a direct hand in 213 of Canadian's 362 points. Lynch is 5 feet, 7 inches tall,
