

mitted Jim to accomplish projects which, on casual consideration, seem impossible for a blind man has been that he can do just about anything he wants to do if he believes he can do it.

"I've found that if I sit down and give a lot of careful thought to something I want to do, I can figure out some way to get it done. I haven't had anywhere near the problems I thought I'd have when I lost my sight," he says.

People are usually amazed at what a blind person can do. Jim has found. "I think the public believes that the blind person can't do much. But I also think that blind persons think they can't do much, and the hardest task we encounter is deciding to do something; it's not the doing, but making up our minds to do it."

Last summer, Jim and his wife went camping and decided that a tent was too inconvenient. But when they started shopping around for a camper, they found price tags of between \$3,000 and \$4,000 which they felt was beyond their

Larvae samples should also be taken from wounds and submitted to the Mission laboratory for positive identification.

In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in ques-tion. The membership shall

Texas children in 1970-71 will 227,500,000 times from September to June as the lines get longer and federal food allotments grow larger than ever before.

This year, the federal funds appropriated for expansion and oper-Texas public schools will total \$42,596,096-an increase of about 123 per cent over last year's \$24,-

The sudden bulge in figures of the mathematical variety is caused by more than an increase in appetites, however. Most of the increased funds will provide free or reduced cost lunches to the greater number of children who became eligible under new federal regulations on Sept. 4, 1970.

During the 1969-70 school year, 173,227,002 lunches, including 24,853,421 served to children free or at a reduced rate. This year the lunch total will round out at more than 220,000,000. More than 59,000,000 will be served free or at reduced cost to the child.
