**Purcell Seeking
 Investigation of
 Parity System**

Congressman Graham Purcell, (D-Tex.), last week introduced legislation calling for a full investigation into Department of Agriculture attempts to make farm income appear higher than it actually is. Prime target of the legislation is the Administration's attempt to avoid the traditional parity ratio, computed on a base period of 1910 to 1914, and replace it with a new figure, simply known as "Ratio," which unrealistically appears to boost parity 20 points or more.

Parity, as applied under agricultural law, is a level of income providing a farmer and his family with a standard of living equivalent to that afforded persons in other gainful occupations, in return for like investments in time, energy, and money. In determining parity, economists take into consideration the relationship between what a farmer pays for items going into production, and the prices he receives for his crops and livestock.

Purcell, who is chairman of the Livestock and Grains Subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture, was joined by several leading farm state Congressmen in introducing the bill, and it was simultaneously introduced by Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.).

Purcell pointed out that his bill calls for a complete investigation into the method of reporting parity. It is oriented particularly toward examining whether the provisions of existing law as related to the determination of the parity prices for any commodity and the parity ratio are being implemented. The investigation could be broad reaching and carries the mandate to examine the provisions of existing law relating to the goal of parity for farmers.

Former Foard Countian Receives Two Major Honors

Former Foard County resident, Dr. Earnest F. Gloyna, dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Texas, has received two major honors.

Dr. Gloyna attended the old Riverside Elementary School north of Thalia and was graduated from Five-in-One High School.

Announcement was made last week that Dr. Gloyna has been named to the research advisory board of the Cities Service Co. of New York. Organized in 1967, the five-member board advises Cities Services on research and development opportunities in new scientific frontiers, including oceanography, nuclear energy and synthetic fuels.

Dr. Gloyna was also honored Friday in Lubbock when Texas Tech University's College of Engineering paid tribute to four former students at the fifth annual "Distinguished Engineer Awards" luncheon.

Dr. Gloyna was cited along with Roy Butler of Ardmore, Okla., the president of the Samedan Oil Corp., Edwin B. Locke of Dallas, vice president for engineering, Texas Employers Insurance of Texas; Don Maddox of Gastronia, N. C., president of Textiles, Inc.

Dr. Gloyna received his bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from Texas Tech in 1946, his master's with a major in sanitary engineering from the University of Texas in 1949 and his doctorate in engineering with a major in sanitary engineering and water resources, and minors in public health and hygiene and chemistry at John Hopkins Uni-

Railroad Takes Look at Wheat Crop Situation

Here's what the Santa Fe Crop Report and Other Agricultural Data newsletter has to say about the wheat crop in the area served by the Santa Fe Railway:

Winter Wheat: Plagued by a lack of adequate moisture since mid-September, 1970, much of the winter wheat acreage in Texas, west and southwest Oklahoma, eastern New Mexico, and in several counties in southwest Kansas and southeastern Colorado, much of the 1971 non-irrigated winter wheat acreage in these areas can at best be rated only fair to poor with many fields being near failure or very poor.

Even many irrigated fields did not stool properly, resulting in a rather small number of stalks per plant. Many farmers are using their wheat for grazing this year, expressing the thought they can not more from the crops in this manner than by letting it mature and cutting it for grain.

Reports of infestations of greenbugs, brown mites and cutworms continue to be received. Farmers are attempting to control these insects by spraying where they think the condition of the crop makes such measures justified. Some relief for the drouth areas was provided by the moisture which fell during the period April 15-19, but much of the early wheat acreage in the Red River Valley of Oklahoma and adjacent areas, that should be matured late in May or early June, has been abandoned and the remaining acreage is headed out with short straw and a thin stand. To the north and east conditions gradually improve with north-central Oklahoma and the eastern two-thirds of Kansas generally showing normal growth with only a minimum of stress from lack of moisture reported.

The five states of Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico could produce as much as 400 million bushels of wheat this year, if growing conditions in the more favored areas continue to have good growing conditions until the crop matures and if there is no further deterioration in areas where moisture has been short since September of 1970. These five states produced a crop of almost 525 million bushels in 1970 and almost 542 million bushels in 1969.

FISH DIE AS CITY LAKE GOES DRY

Raccoons, quail, song birds, and cotton tails that loved their City Lake have to move their home now.
Fish that lived in the water were friends to some and food to others, but couldn't go with them. They had to be left behind and crowded together in the slums of their shrinking home. With increasing swiftness, they had to leave brothers, sisters, mothers and fathers struggling on the drying mud, wondering why.

From time to time, birds and animals visit what was once their beloved home by the lake still wondering what happened. Man built them a home and promised them happiness. And they did enjoy happiness for many years.
However, because land was farmed that is not suitable to be plowed, grass grazed too close, a sequence of crops planted which allowed erosion, and crop residue plowed under or destroyed, their home was taken away. Even if the mesquites had been killed to allow the original condition to return or terraces and waterways constructed to control water runoff, they might not have had to move.

But that is only speculation now. Man gave them a home and man took it away. Maybe their next home will be conserved for the happiness of man and animals alike.

Wheat Voting on Referendum Underway Here

Absentee voting in the upcoming wheat referendum and producer board election opened at the county agent's office Wednesday of last week.

Wheat producers in Foard County who desire to vote absentee in the election can do so between April 20 and May 10.

On May 11, the Texas Wheat Producers Association will hold an election over a 34-county area to determine whether or not to assess producers not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat produced for purposes of research and promotion. At the same time, producers will have an opportunity to elect a nine-man producers board to administer funds for such a research and promotion program.

The Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has certified the TWPA to hold such a referendum and election and that a two-thirds favorable vote will be required to enact the self-assessment program. If the program is approved, the nine-man producers board will have total authority for the collection, use and accounting of all funds and the implementation of programs designed to strengthen wheat growers' income.

Foard County producers who do not vote absentee are encouraged to vote in the election on May 11 at the county court house.

Foard County in Area Designated For Drought Aid

Emergency drought aid was extended to farmers in dozens of Texas counties Wednesday of last week by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Department officials said \$2 million has been allocated to Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for use in an area including Archer, Baylor, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wheeler and Wilbarger counties.

The department earlier this month announced other assistance to drought-burdened Texas farmers in designated counties. The list was expanded Wednesday into additional areas.

Emergency livestock feed programs, including reduced priced grain and hay transportation assistance, was extended to 31 additional counties.

Haying and grazing privileges on cropland taken out of production under the government's Crop Land Adjustment Program were extended into 26 additional counties where drought conditions have reduced the forage supply. Included are Clay, Foard, Haskell, Jack and Wichita counties.

In other action, the board voted to buy two large deep freezers with a combined capacity of 94.4 cubic feet of space. Under the non-food assistance program for the cafeteria, the local school will be required to pay \$554.50 on the purchase of the deep freezers, which is 25 per cent of the total cost of \$2,218.00. This will give the cafeteria three large freezers in which to store frozen foods.

The board discussed the summer program of the school. It is hoped that at least 35 children of preschool and kindergarten age can be accommodated in the summer program at the local Neighborhood Center.

There are a large number of bills pending in the Texas Legislature at the present time concerning public school education, and at Monday night's meeting, several of these were discussed. One would provide 100 per cent state financing of the Minimum Foundation program. One would create a state insurance plan for the public schools of Texas while another would include within the Minimum Foundation Program educational secretaries and instructional-administrative personnel.

Another one would give teachers greater job security after a probationary period. If passed, after a three year period of one-year contracts, teachers would be given 3-year automatic extension contracts. Each year the contract would be reviewed prior to April 1; it would then be extended one year or the teacher would be notified of nonrenewal. At that time the teacher would still have two years remaining on the contract in which to "shape up or ship out."

Another bill received considerable attention is the one providing for operation of all school districts in the state on a quarterly rather than a semester basis.

A county-wide Home Demonstration program on "Planning and Financing a Funeral" was held in the County H. D. Agent's office Thursday, April 29. Approximately 20 women attended the program.

The program dealt with the many aspects of funeral planning. Responsibilities of the family and funeral director were discussed. Duties the family will perform were mainly the selection of the funeral day and time, notification of friends and relatives, selection and procurement of cemetery plot, casket, vault, and clothing; selection of pall bearers, filing benefit claims; and writing letters of acknowledgment.

Duties performed by the funeral director are assisting the family in the notification of friends and relatives, counselling with family regarding funeral plans, obtaining burial permits and death certificates; and help the family to complete benefit and insurance claims.

The cost of the funeral will vary. The average cost of a funeral in the State of Texas is \$924, which includes a casket fee. This average cost does not include the vault, cemetery plot, marker or monument, honorarium for the clergy, flowers, transportation charges, burial clothing, and newspaper notices.

Local Residents Attend Workshop at Graham May 1

Pointers for historical preservation were the subject of a workshop attended May 1 in Graham by members of the Foard County Historical Survey Committee.

Attending were Meses. Darwin Bell, Ed Huskey, Leon Solomon, L. A. Andrews, N. J. Roberts, Virgil Johnson, Bill Bell and Otis Gafford.

Conducted by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, the workshop constituted the 1971 regional meeting of county Historical Survey Committees for this area of the state. Four professional staff members of the state survey committee in Austin touched upon virtually every phase of historical preservation work currently being carried out by the state of Texas.

"Historical Research" and "Archives: Cataloging and Cross-Indexing" were two of the topics treated by Mrs. Deolee Parmelee, TSHSC director of research.

Miss Diana Files, state museum consultant, spoke on "Do's and Don'ts in Museum Techniques."

Her presentation was followed by the showing of a film about historical archeology, entitled "Doorway to the Past."

Wayne Bell, restoration architect, delved into the "Comprehensive State-wide Survey," "The National Register," and "Project Grants-in-Aid."

Subsequently, Bob Watson, director of field operations, spoke to the group on "1971 Committee Competition Guidelines" and "Recording County History on Film and Tape." Mrs. Parmelee then took the floor again to explain "Oral History Recording Procedures" and "Finer Points in the Processing of Marker Applications."

The workshop was closed with a presentation by Wayne Bell on "Current Legislation on Historical Preservation."

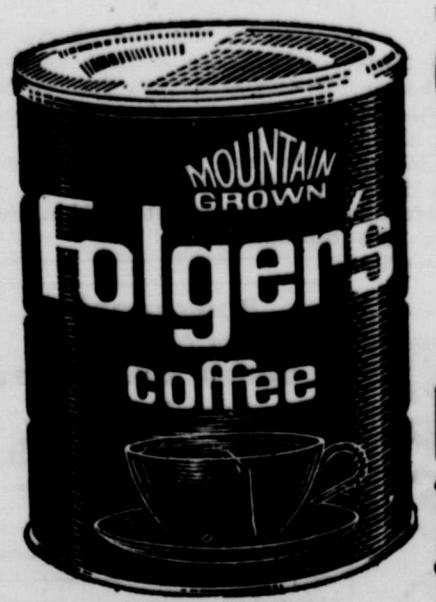
