A "First" in CHS History

Crowell Wildcats Win State Track Championship

Mr. and Mrs. Sam Mills will observe their 50th wedding anniversary with an open house at the Crowell Community Center Sunday, May 16, from 2:30 until 4:30 p. m.

Mr. and Mrs. Mills were married May 17, 1921. The couple's daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Naron, and four grandchildren will be hosts for the reception. Mr. and Mrs. Mills also have two great grandchildren.

The Crowell Wildcats, having that extra something when the chips were down, won the mile relay and came back to Crowell Saturday night with the Class A track and field championship firmly in their grasp.

This is Crowell's first state track championship and a fine representation of Foard County residents were on hand in Austin to see Coach Scott Boyd's charges take the state title in class A competition.

The Wildcats trailed Forney 40-34 going into the final event of the day, but when Kenneth Sellers booted his team home in the mile relay with a brilliant 47.7 anchor leg, the Cats were home free with 54 points.

Forney finished sixth in the mile relay and still managed to cling to second in the final standings with 46 points.

Crowell's sprint relay team comprised of George Evenson, Mike Weathered, Johnny Urquiza and Kenneth Sellers, took second place with a 42.6, one-tenth of a second behind Forney's winning 42.5. The Cats were .3 second better than their state meet qualifying time.

Then Crowell picked up eight more points when Junior Urquiza ran a 1:58.9 half mile which was good for second behind Corriganite Jerry Ash's winning 1:58.5. Sellers added more points to the Crowell cause when he ran a 47.9 which was good for the first place gold medal in the 440.

Sellers' 47.9 in the 440 was .9 second off the 47.0 state record for that event set in 1968. Junior Urquiza's second place time of 1:58.9 in the 880 was .3 second faster than the 1:59.2 time which won that event in last year's state finals. Crowell's mile relay time of 3:21.2 was .6 second off the winning time in the same event last year.

Sellers' 47.9 in the 440 was almost two seconds faster than the state winning time of 49.6 in 1970 and was also faster than the AAAA winner in the same event this year.

Track points are scored 10 for a first place individual winner and 8 points for second. In the relays, 20 points go to the winner and 16 to the second place team.

The Wildcats entered 11 meets during the season, and won six of them. They added a total of 23 team trophies to the CHS showcase. This does not include the individual medals won by the team members.

If I had known you less I would not grieve, seeing the year its course has nearly run.

I would be glad our task is almost done, glad for the bit of rest we shall receive.

It would not trouble me to see you leave: And, walking through the halls and classrooms where we meet so often now, their emptiness would not oppress me when you are not there.

It would not matter much; I would not care; if I had known you less.

But I have watched your minds and hearts grow strong, pitted against the problems of the hour; and I have felt a deep, upwelling power, as, like a mighty wave, you surge along into the future where your lives belong—the radiant future, where your dreams will grow and flower and fruit upon some distant shore.

To watch your progress there I

would not go, but I rejoice in prospect even so, knowing the promise you have shown before, certain of its fulfillment more and more.

Highlights

Through the years 1959 to 1971, the students who are now the seniors of '71 had many teachers and many exciting incidents. Here are a few thoughts on this subject.

In the first grade, Mrs. Sallis and Mrs. Sloan administered cruel punishment with a rule which caused terrific pain; however, if that didn't work, there was always a little red baby chair for the future seniors of 1971.

During the second exciting year of school, Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Graves told spine-tingling and chill-producing stories of Peter Rabbit and Tar Baby. Third grade teachers were Marilyn and Marian Hays; in the fourth grade, teachers were Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Barker, who felt that spelling competition between the classes was a necessity. Fifth grade instructors were Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Welch.

In the sixth grade at Crowell Junior High, students were faced with a totally new problem: changing classes. Teachers worked very hard to keep noise levels down between periods. Home room teachers have been Mr. Erwin, Mr. Gidney, Mr. Washington and Mrs. Bounds.

In 1967, the top class of CJH was graduated into that hallowed institution of higher learning, Crowell High School. Eighth grade class scholastic leaders were valedictorian, Doug Chowning; salutatorian, Buff Nelson; and honor students Bill Myers, Rita Coffey, Pat Cates, Elaine Jackson, Kristi McLain, Mieke Owens, Sherry Prince, Sheri Speer and Peggy Welch.

Of course, listing all classes or teachers that seniors have been under would be too lengthy; however, Mrs. Manard, Mrs. Bounds and Mr. Black, who have retired from high school, deserve special recognition from the seniors for their dedication to the teaching profession.

In the four years of high school class sponsors from freshmen to the senior classes have been Mr. Myers, Mrs. Halbert (2 years) and Mr. Boyd. Class presidents have been Buff Nelson, George Eavenson, Pat Cates and Doug Chowning.

Future Plans

The future plans of the seniors range from college to work and to business school. Those planning to work and not pursue further education are Brenda McGee, Edward Crosby, Jim Tom Smith and George Brown; Kathy Denton will become a nurse, while Carolyn Moore, Charlotte Walker and Elaine Jackson attend business school. Jerry Martin will attend Clarendon College; Peggy Welch, Tarleton; Kristi McLain, Texas Christian University; Rita Coffey, North Texas State; and Junior Urquiza hasn't quite decided on his college preference. Kay Shirley is to attend South Plaine College. Brenda McBeath will enroll at T at Arlington, and Jesse Barrera and Toni Baggett will attend Ranger Junior College. Those seniors planning to attend West Texas State are Jackie Thomas, Ken Sellers, Mike Weatherred, Jacque Gillispie and David Myers; Molly Lopez hopes to become a beauty operator, as does Karen Eavenson. Texas Tech in Lubbock will have eight graduates from this class: Mieke Owens, Jimmy Glover, Bill Myers, George Eavenson, Doug Chowning, Buff Nelson, Pat Cates and Mike Tomanek. Shayne Garrett has married and marriage is in the future for Sherry Prince, Rita Coffey, Peggy Raspberry and Marvin Machac.

Indeed, many plans are represented. Everyone wishes only the best for all the graduating seniors of Crowell High School 1971 in whatever they have planned.

First Loves

"Love means never having to say you're sorry," and this isn't always true. In the first grade, Bill Lynch had to apologize to Kenneth Sellers after they fought for Rita Coffey. Through the years there have been famous lovers such as Romeo and Juliet, Anthony and Cleopatra, Liz and Dick, and the class of '71 had their share too—Pat and Brenda, Mieke and Bill, Jr., Kristi and Buff, Toni and George, Peggy Jan and Billy, Peggy Claire and Pat Halsell.

In this day and age, along with love sometimes come separations. In the fifth grade, the girls' beloved frog, George, froze to death. After his funeral service, the boys dug him up and threw him away. The girls were furious and broke up with their boy friends; however, in a few days, it was all forgotten, and all was forgiven.

The circus came to town during the seventh grade year. This was when most everyone had their first dates. Other first dates were to church banquets, football banquets, and the eighth grade banquet. The class was very famous for its eighth grade parties. This was the year of the trampled

wheat crops and seven seconds went to thirty. Who can forget their first date?

Some of the "love stories" in the class of '71 have advanced to the stage of marriage. Mallen Moya was married in the fall, as was Shayne Garrett; Jim Tom Smith married in the winter. Rita Coffey will be married in June, Peggy Raspberry and Marvin Machac, June; Sherry Prince in July. Ah... first loves!

Parents' Professions

Parents of the seniors of 1971 present a varied line of professions.

Farming or ranching is the livelihood of a majority of fathers with twenty-one engaged in some sort of farm or ranch work. Other vocations represented are three ministers, one carpenter, two oil pumpers, one truck driver, three county employees, three merchants and three mechanics. Mothers of graduates are mostly housewives, but in addition, three are secretaries, one a beauty operator, three nurses, with two teachers in the group.

Memories Are Made of This

In their first year of school, the students who would eventually be the seniors of 1971, couldn't remember not to talk during class; they also considered the rest period another recess. Recalling the first grade in 1959, one memory is of the great fight between Ken Sellers and Bill Lynch over Rita Coffey. Second grade brought around the May pole celebration, with King Buff Nelson and Queen Mieke Owens presiding. Mike Weatherred fell off the football stadium in the fourth grade, breaking his arm.

Another memory outstanding in the minds of this year's graduates is the occasion in the eighth grade when several class members got hungry and helped themselves to some seventh graders' lunches in the back of the science room.

When this class graduated into high school, they went from the top dogs to low man on the totem pole. The sophomore year proved quite lonely, for the class was no longer the smallest members of high school, or the oldest.

In the junior year, class members won the spirit stick and found it easy to envision themselves as the seniors of 1971. However, when 1970 arrived and the class was officially the top class in Crowell High, class members realized that it would be over all too soon. Whether or not they care to admit it, seniors all are reluctant to leave their friends and activities in high school. Ask any senior for some "mature philosophy," and you'll get some version of the following advice to underclassmen: "Study hard, have fun—it's over too soon and then it's too late."

Senior Sports Spots

Most athletic events involving seniors started 'way back in 1964 in the sixth grade. It seems one of the first lessons football boys had to learn was how to put on their suits. Mr. Wall was coach in the eighth grade and not a great deal was expected from the Wildkittens, but they won the district crown much to the surprise of almost everyone. People began to realize that perhaps this was the class to watch, and as time went on, it was!

Many interesting incidents happened during the years between 1967 and 1971 in all sports played at CHS: football, basketball, track. L. H. Wall was head coach from 1967 to 1970. Girls' basketball was an exciting sport, too. Coach Wall may be remembered for laying the foundation in the seniors of 1971 which they later used to great heights. Perhaps the most impressive list of accomplishments from this graduating class came in 1970-71. New coaches Boyd and Cook had a successful football season. Seven seniors were named to the all-district squad in 1971. Coach Cook had a basketball season to be proud of, with both the boys and girls teams. Senior class members of the varsity basketball teams were Ken Sellers, Jimmy Glover, Jacque Gillispie and Toni Baggett, with Ken and Toni receiving all-district recognition.

The 1971 track season was highly successful, thanks to the dedicated effort of Coaches Wall and Boyd. The relay teams of CHS, composed of seniors, blazed their way to the state class A track championship.

A LOOK AT THE FOUR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON IN TEXAS TUESDAY, MAY 18

Following is an account of what the four proposed amendments to the State Constitution would do if passed. Voters will cast ballots on these four Tuesday, May 18.

Amendment No. 1
 The proposed Amendment No. 1 would:

(1) Create a State Ethics Commission consisting of nine members, three to be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, with advice and consent of the court's associate justices; three to be appointed by the chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the consent of the other members of the commission; and three to be appointed by the presiding judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, with the advice and consent of the other judges serving on the court. Of each group of appointees, no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition to these nine members, the proposed amendment would provide for two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate, to be elected on the first day of each regular session of the legislature by a majority of the membership of each house for a term ending on the first day of the next regular session.

(2) Provide for a term of office of six years for each appointee, with the exception of the initial appointees whose terms would be designated by the appointing officer, with a member serving two, four, and six years, respectively. Provision is made for filling interim vacancies in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but appointments would be only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The chairman would be elected by the commission from its membership for a term of two years.

(3) Provide for reimbursement of members of the State Ethics Commission for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties;

(4) Require the commission to recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the legislature and permit the commission to recommend the salary of the Speaker and the Lieutenant Governor at

an amount higher than that of other members, notwithstanding provisions of Article IV, Section 17, which, under existing provisions, now set the salaries of these two officers at the same level of other members of the legislature, except when the Lieutenant Governor serves as Governor and is compensated on the basis of the chief executive's salary;

(5) Require that the commission promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers, and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission board, or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either house of the legislature. The commission would also promulgate rules requiring that each member of the legislature and each of the officeholders named file a complete financial statement with the commission within 10 days after being elected or appointed to office. Information so filed would be privileged to be used only by the commission in determining whether a conflict of interest exists or there has been a violation of the rules of ethics promulgated by the commission or the laws of Texas. The proposed amendment directs the legislature to enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of privileged information.

(6) Direct the commission to conduct its meetings, hearings, or other proceedings as they desire but compel the body to hold a meeting in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary;

(7) Provide that all rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances, or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission, be promulgated before the convening of any session of the legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State, and that each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission take effect on the

15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation, unless disapproved before that day by resolution of either house of the legislature. Also, all rates of compensation, mileage allowances, or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission would not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both houses of the legislature; all votes on these resolutions or parts thereof would be required to show individual votes in the respective journals of both houses;

(8) Empower the commission to investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and to report its findings to the appropriate agency, official, legislative body, grand jury, or district attorney;

(9) Provide that until changed by the commission and adopted by resolution of both houses, legislative compensation, per diem, and mileage would remain at the present rates (\$4,800 per year salary, \$12 a day for first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session, and 10 cents per mile for distances traveled to and from regular sessions and special sessions called later than one day after a regular session). Duration of a regular session would still be limited to 140 days; and

(10) Empower the commission to recommend to each legislature changes which would update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process.

Amendment No. 2
 This proposed amendment makes one change in the Constitution. It would permit the legislature to propose a constitutional amendment during a special or called session of the legislature. It is now required that proposed amendments may be considered only during the biennial regular sessions.

Amendment No. 3
 This proposed amendment makes two changes in the Constitution: (1) It removes the old age assistance, aid to the blind, and aid to the permanently and totally disabled programs from the constitutionally-imposed expenditure ceiling, leaving only the category of aid to families with dependent children controlled under a new ceiling of \$55 million for assist-

ance grants from state funds during any one fiscal year.

(2) It deletes the provision, inserted by constitutional amendment adopted on August 5, 1969, which makes a supplemental appropriation of \$15 million for each fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, 1969 and ending Aug. 31, 1971.

Amendment No. 4
 This proposed amendment adds a new section to the Constitution including three major provisions: (1) It permits the Texas Water Development Board, on the direction of the Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the legislature, to issue additional water development bonds up to \$100 million for use in providing grants, loans, or combinations of grants and loans, to cities, towns, and political subdivisions, so that these entities might qualify for federal matching funds for water quality enhancement programs.

(2) It provides that the bonds authorized under this new section bear interest of not more than 6 per cent per annum, instead of the existing maximum rate of 4 per cent.

(3) It eliminates the requirements that financial assistance programs authorized under the Texas Water Development Fund be terminated after Dec. 31, 1982. Under the proposed Amendment No. 4, such programs would be continued beyond that date provided authorized bond money is still available in the fund.

Sturdy and Caprock, two semi-dwarf or "shorty" hard red winter wheats, released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1967, have already established themselves as leaders in both production and quality. Commercial yields of 100 bushels and more per acre were recorded during the 1969 and 1970 seasons. The 100-plus yields were made under irrigation and with heavy fertilizer applications. The new wheats have approached 70 bushels an acre on dryland. They are bred to produce heavy yields without lodging.

14 Hours Training for Each Boy

TWENTY-SIX BOYS TAKE TRACTOR COURSE

A special program for training of youth for exemption from the hazardous agricultural occupation law was held Tuesday and Wednesday, May 4 and 5, in the Vocational Agriculture building at the Crowell High School, according to information furnished the news by Marvin Myers, Vocational Agriculture teacher, and County agent Joe Burkett.

Twenty-six youths received a total of 14 hours training each in tractor safety, maintenance, and operation.

This special training program was provided for and in accordance with the U. S. Department of Labor Agricultural and Child Labor requirements under the Fair Labor Standards Act as amended January 7, 1970.

Myers and Burkett were in

charge of the school, and these two and Bud McLain served as instructors.

Any farmer desiring to hire one of these boys must request and keep in their files the employer's copy of the boy's exemption certificate.

Local ASCS Lists County's Drought Aid Programs

Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager of the Foard County ASCS office, says that Foard County has been designated as a drought disaster county and is eligible to participate in the following emergency programs:

1. Emergency grazing and hay-feeding of set-aside and CAP acreage: Foard County has been approved for emergency grazing and feeding of land designated under CAP and annual set-aside acreage through June 30, 1971. Producers must make application to be eligible. There will be no charge for irrigated acreage. A charge of \$1.00 will be made for grazing livestock not owned by producer.
2. Emergency livestock feed program: Foard County has been approved for the livestock feed program and hay transportation assistance program. This program provides for financial assistance in hauling hay (which is two-thirds the transportation cost not exceed \$20.00 per ton) and provides milo at a reduction in cost. The cost of milo to a producer brought from an approved producer will be approximately \$60 per cwt.
3. ECM program, wind erosion control: Foard County has been approved and received funds for cost-share assistance of emergency chisel, listing and deep plowing to control wind erosion. Assistance under this program is not routine farming practices involved in preparing to plant a crop. Applications are now being seen at the local ASCS office.

in the legislative process.

Amendment No. 2: Providing that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution called as well as regular sessions of the legislature.

Amendment No. 3: Removing limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance to the needy aged, the aged blind, and the needy disabled, and setting a limitation on total state appropriations during fiscal year for assistance grants to needy dependent children and caretakers of such children.

Amendment No. 4: Authorizing issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality improvement purposes; providing for the improvement and continuation of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development bonds at 8 per cent.

(A more detailed account of amendments appears on page 3 and Foard County residents are urged to study these proposed changes to the constitution before voting next Tuesday.)

GOVERNORS BLAST NIXON ON DROUGHT

Govs. of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma in statements here blasted the Nixon administration for failure to provide complete aid to their drought-stricken areas.

Governors said they will ask their congressmen to press harder for disaster relief.

Meanwhile, Texas House members on the drought committee visited Washington officials and found "some hope" of low-interest federal loans. Committee reports that farmers and ranchers are not adequately informed on the types of loans available to them and asked for special meetings with the Farmers Home Administration to explain aid which can be provided.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher, who pushed for concurrence in the Senate changes, indicated an agreement has been reached to roll back the beer tax increase to \$5 a barrel in subsequent liquor-by-the-drink legislation which will be voted on later.

SMITH VEToes 10-2 JURY VERDICTS — Governor Smith, in his first veto of the current session, rejected a bill to set up comparative negligence in personal injury lawsuits and 10-2 jury verdicts.

In a strongly-worded veto message, Smith claimed the bill would throw the judicial system "into utter chaos" and substantially increase auto insurance premiums.

Little chance was seen for overriding the veto.

Higher Postage Rates May 16th

Postmaster Ted Reeder reminded Foard County residents Tuesday that new higher postal rates will become effective May 16.

The first class letter rate is increased to 8 cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce for pieces weighing 12 ounces or less. Pieces weighing over 12 ounces are subject to the priority mail (heavy pieces) rates. The weight for heavy pieces has been reduced from 13 ounces to 12 ounces.

The rate for post cards is increased to 6 cents each.

Second and third class rates are increased while fourth class mail rates are unchanged.

The rates for airmail weighing 8 ounces and under are increased to 11 cents per ounce or fraction. The rate for airmail postal cards is increased to 9 cents each.

More detailed information on other new rates can be obtained at the local post office, Reeder added.

A. B. McReynolds, noted the much-potential man-power that was never used as he conducted meetings over the country. The aim of this men's meeting is simply, "How can I make my life count more effectively for Christ?"

It proved so helpful to the men attending that another meeting with the same theme was proposed for 1950. And so it became an annual gathering designed to get men working for Christ and His Church. From the small beginning of 66 men from 7 states attending in 1949, the clinic has consistently grown each year. At the 1970 clinic, more than 5,500 men were in attendance from 40 states and 7 foreign countries. They travel in almost every conceivable way — car, truck, bicycle, motorcycle, chartered bus and plane.

Just above Christ's 40 Acres, an airstrip has been carved out of the mountain side. Bringing well over 100 men, 43 planes used the strip in 1970. There were approximately 7,000 men in attendance this year.

The men who attend the Kiamichi Clinic help arrange the program. Each year after the clinic is over, a questionnaire is sent to each person who attended requesting that he check the names of the speakers who did the most good for him. Also, suggestions for next year's speakers are solicited. Thus, men, outstanding in some particular phase of Christian service, are chosen to inspire and tell how God has used him in His service.

An outstanding phase of the clinic is its music. The special music features many Bible college quartets, TV and recording artists, and other vocalists and instrumentalists.

The boy preacher contest has proven very popular. The winner from each of the 8 districts preaches a 10-minute sermon and the world's champion boy preacher is selected. The contest is open to any high school teenager.

In an attempt to keep pace with the remarkable growth of the clinic and other activities, 57 acres have been added to the original 40 acres, thus providing ample parking and camping area.

Since the clinic began, an average of one new building a year has been erected. There is dormitory space for about 800. The steel tent, to which 1,920 square feet has been added to the original floor space, will provide seating accommodations for about 4,700. At many sessions, benches scattered all around the steel tent get the over-flow crowds.

From a recently-constructed modern kitchen, very tasty meals are served by the missionary women and ladies from the 15 mission congregations. It's almost unbelievable how quickly thousands are served. The first meal is served on the first Tuesday evening in May and the following Thursday's supper is the last. Some men attending really want to "rough it," preparing their own meals. For this purpose, firewood is furnished, and there are electrical outlets in the camping area. There are no luxuries at Christ's 40 Acres, but all basic necessities will be found there. Facilities and accommodations are designed for men only.

The cost to attend the clinic is men who pre-register, and they are encouraged to do so, the cost is \$3.45. Those arriving at the clinic without pre-registering must pay \$4.45. Registration includes medical-accident insurance (3 days of the clinic plus 48 hours travel time before and after the clinic.) Registration entitles a man to dormitory space (bring your own bed roll) or a place in the camping area, free parking, attendance at all the sessions, 7 tasty meals and all the fresh pine-scented air you can breathe.

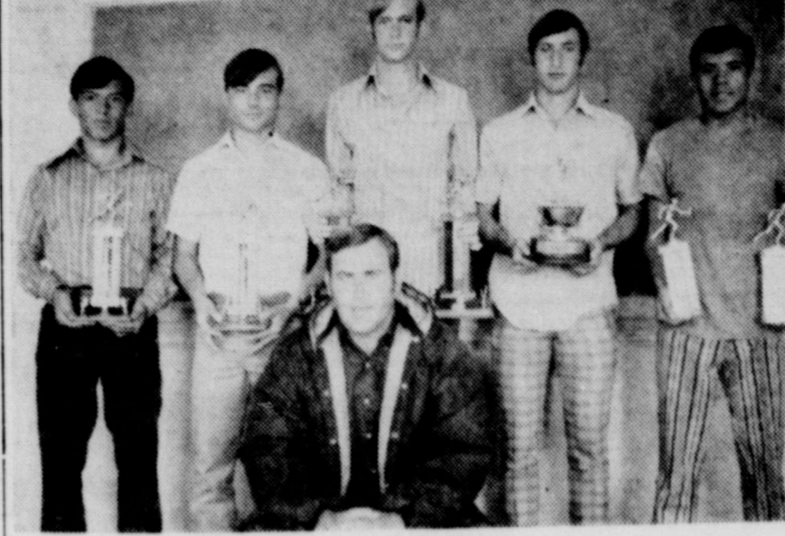
