Record Shark Caught At Artificial Reef

San Antonian Timothy Torrence went fishing at a man-made reef in the Gulf of Mexico and hauled in a record fish-a 320pound bull shark.

The 9-foot 5-inch shark was caught June 5 off Port Aransas after a two-hour and 15-minute battle. A 130 pound test line baited with the tail section of a jackfish was used to land the shark. No previous record for bull sharks was listed by the Texas Fish Records Committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. In cases of sharks and sunfishes, the committee decides if a new category is justified for each species.
