Funeral Services Held Wednesday at Methodist Church

Mrs. George J. Benham, 93, resident of Foard County for 61 years, died in the Foard County Hospital Monday night, Sept. 6.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m., Wednesday, Sept. 8, from the First United Methodist Church conducted by Rev. Walter Driver, pastor, and Rev. Warren Everson, pastor of Bethel Church.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Mrs. Benham was born Jan. 3, 1878, in Hutto, Williamson County, Texas, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Alexander Harkins. She and Mr. Benham were married at Hutto Sept. 13, 1896, and they moved to Foard County from Jones County in 1910. They were engaged in farming in the Vivian community until Mr. Benham's death May 14, 1945. Mrs. Benham moved to Crowell in 1946.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Otis Moye and Mrs. Hubert Brown of Crowell; six sons, Clarence Benham of Garland, Howard Benham of Carlsbad, N. M., Bruce Benham of Alamosa, Colo., Wilbur Benham of Denver, Colo., Ralph Benham of Ardmore, Okla., and Marion Benham of Lovington, N. 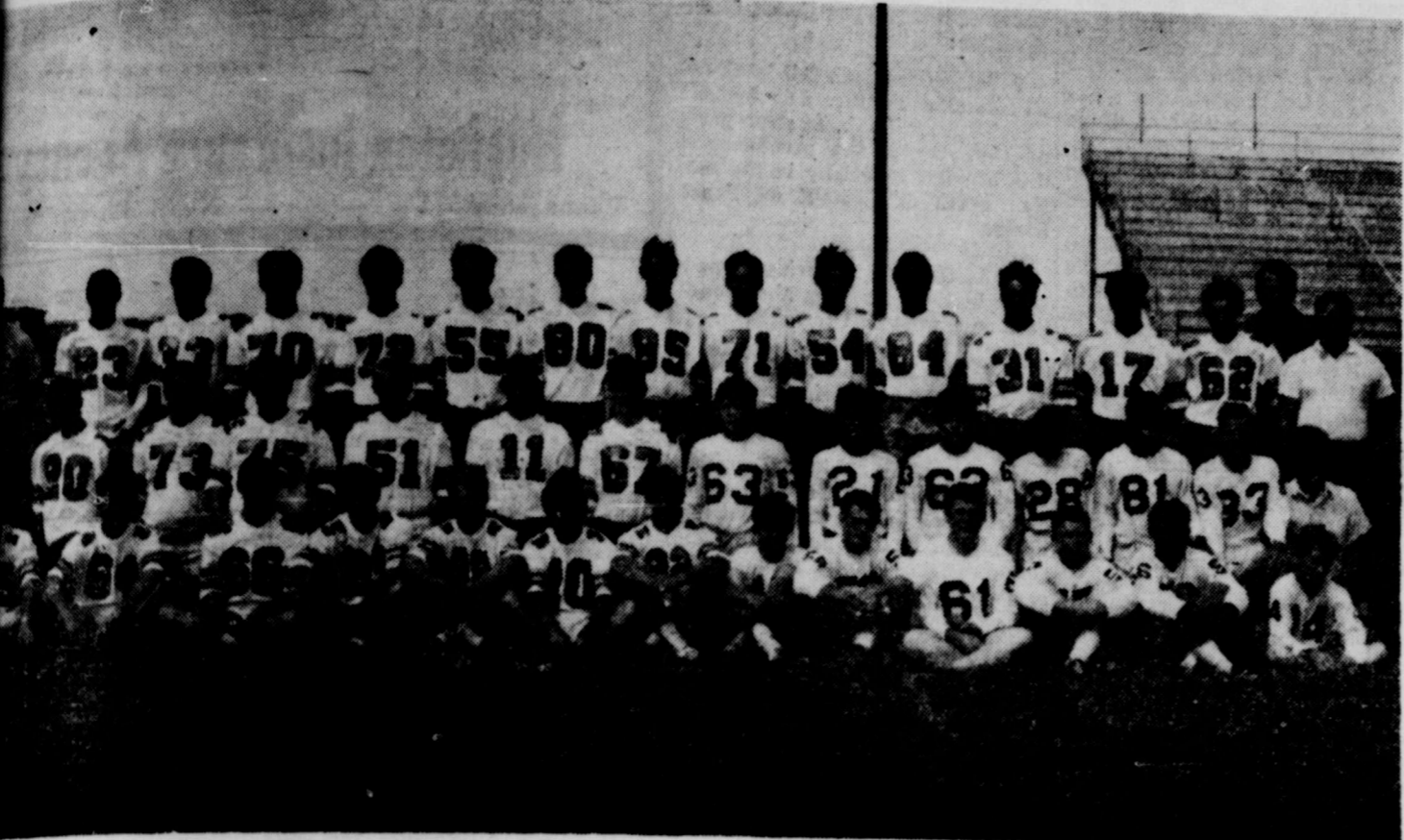

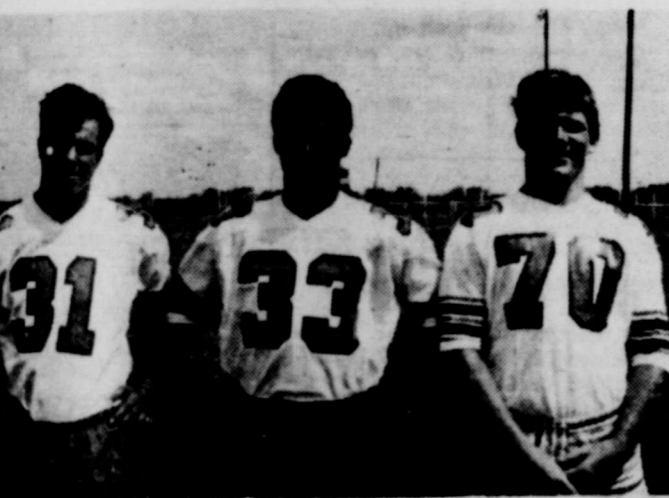

School Board Sets Policy on Free Cafeteria Lunches

At its regular monthly meeting Monday night, the Crowell school board adopted the proposed national school lunch program policy as recommended by the State Education Agency.

Free lunches will be given to children who qualify under the following family income standards as set forth by the food and nutrition service of the Department of Agriculture.

The board also adopted a current list of duties and responsibilities of school principals. Following the receiving of bids on three vehicles, the board sold the three—one school bus and two passenger cars—for a total of \$923.99.

The board has recently bought 200 new folding chairs for the school cafeteria. However, they have not yet arrived. The board discussed the possible disposition of the old chairs now being used in the cafeteria.

Mrs. Dorothy Klepper was employed as adult basic education teacher for the year, pending the approval of the local ABE program and funding by federal authorities.

The board also entered into a contract with Pritchard & Abbott, for valuating oil property and utilities within the district.

The final action of the board was a discussion of whether local teachers will be getting the pay raise in spite of the freeze on wages and prices. Supt. Larry Jones said Tuesday that the board still does not know whether local teachers qualify or not.

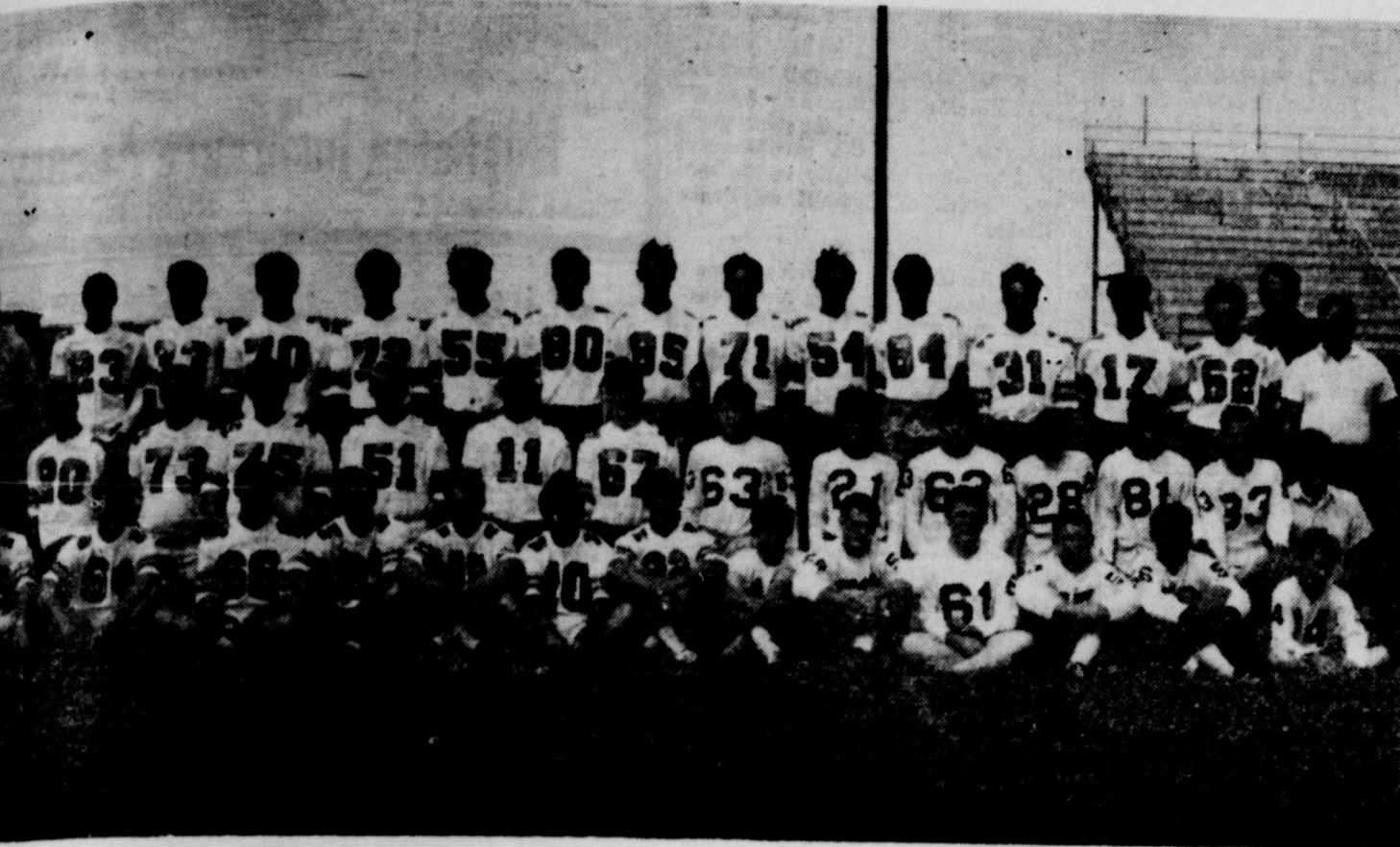

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Park Litter Getting Worse

There may be an increasing awareness in the environment elsewhere, but visitors are still pulling the same old stunts in Texas' state parks.

In fact, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, the litter situation may be worse, since more and more persons are coming to the parks.

Those in charge of maintenance in the parks are still picking up loads of cans and bottles along the roads and in camping areas. An increasing problem is the tabs from beverage containers.

"They're small, so even the most conscientious of visitors feel no compunction about pulling them off and dropping them on the ground," said one park official.

Another problem is filter tips from cigarettes which have accumulated for many years. Because most are made from artificial fibers, the filters will not deteriorate, and they are so small and numerous that it is practically impossible for the limited parks staffs to pick them all up.

"Somehow, the link between litter and environmental problems hasn't been made in the public's mind," said the official.

Hopes Boosted for Fresh Water Dam On Pease River

A six-member regional delegation has returned from a conference in Tulsa, Okla., with representatives of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers tremendously encouraged about prospects for final approval of a fresh-water dam across the Pease River in the vicinity of the Copper Breaks State Park north of Crowell.

According to the Vernon Daily Record, the encouragement came primarily from the possibility that an interim feasibility study can be undertaken on the project that would move it well ahead of a comprehensive plan that is scheduled for the entire Red River drainage basin above the Denison Dam. The drainage basin comprehensive plan report is scheduled for 1980.

Returning last Thursday from the conference with Corps of Engineers authorities were Mayor Sam Breedlove of Quannah, Nor-tex Regional Planning Commission Assistant Executive Director Bob Mowery of Electra, Red River Authority Executive Director Fred Parkey of Iowa Park, Red River Valley Association Executive Director Calvin Watts of Shreveport, La., Wilbarger Soil and Water Conservation District Chairman Ed Lehman, Jr. and Vernon Chamber of Commerce executive vice president Ed Coltharp.

Mr. Coltharp said it was the opinion of those attending that if the interim feasibility study can be made, it could advance the project by as much as five years.

Main factors in the project in order of importance are seen as: —Flood control aspects. —Irrigation, municipal and industrial usage potential. —Recreation.

The biggest question mark involves quality of water, but delegates are hopeful about this aspect of the project, as well.

Proposed location of the dam is 2 1/4 miles west of the Pease River bridge over Texas Highway 283 between Crowell and Quannah.

According to a 1927 study by the old Pease and Red River Valley Irrigation Association, the proposed reservoir would have some 390,000 acre feet of storage space, a dam 8,000 feet long and 102 feet high, and a spillway 90 feet above the river bottom. Approximately the same dimensions would be expected for a dam constructed now.

The lake, described as long and deep, could cover some 11,000 acres of land, primarily undeveloped ranch and pasture property.

The Pease River would flow some 195,000 acre feet into the proposed reservoir annually and would irrigate some 111,600 acres of Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger County farmland if applied at the rate of an acre-foot each year.

The Pease River drainage basin covers some 3,430 square miles, with the river originating in Floyd County on the High Plains. The Pease River provides 5.1 per cent of the water which flows into the Red River from its tributaries.

St. Paul wrote to Timothy, many centuries ago: "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (II Tim. 3:16).

The apostle referred, of course, to the sacred Scriptures, also called "the Word of God." All of it, he says, is "God-breathed" and "profitable," to "teach," to "reprove," to "correct" and to "instruct."

But why, then have so many heresies and false teachings sprung up through the years—all based upon the Bible? And why have so many thousands of sincere people been led astray by these false teachings?

The reason is that teachers and followers alike have failed to heed another important statement which Paul made in this same letter prior to his declaration that all Scripture is inspired of God and profitable. This statement is found

in chapter 2, verse 15: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of truth."

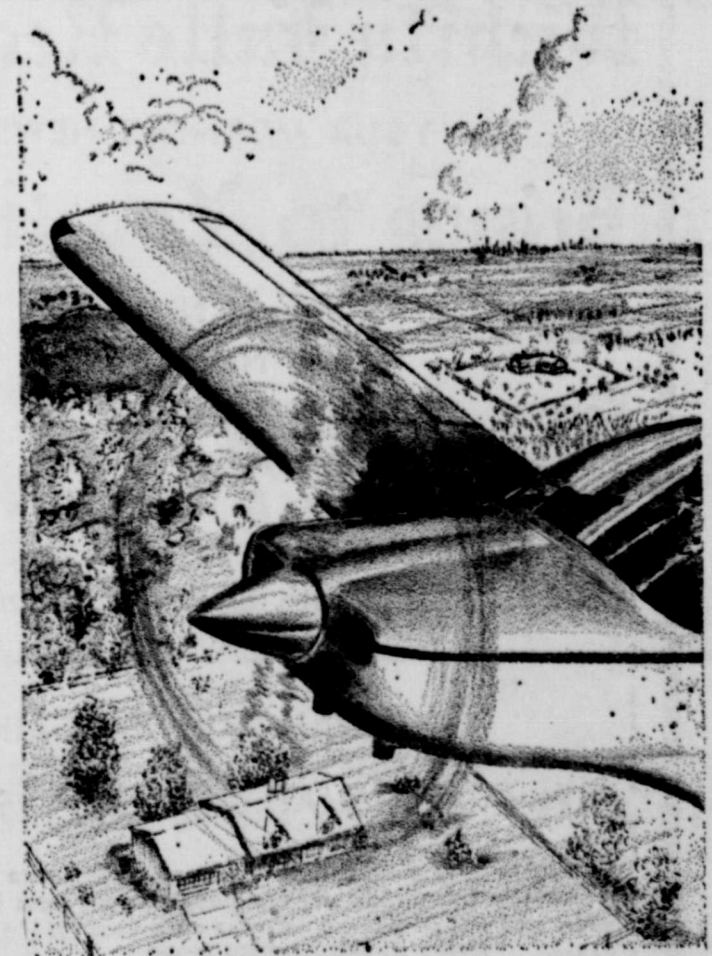
We must study to rightly divide the Word of truth for the simple reason that if we do not do this we can pervert the truth and use it to teach error. Through the centuries God has often changed His dealings with mankind. Many religious rites which were commanded in Old Testament times are positively forbidden in this present dispensation of grace.

In Old Testament times, for example, animal sacrifices were required for acceptance with God, but some years after the death of Christ, Paul was sent forth with "the preaching of the cross," and declared that "we have redemption through Christ's blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). "Being justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin, Tex.—Gov. Preston Smith sprang one surprise after another in announcing appointments to key state positions.

One of the biggest was selection of his longtime legal aide and top political campaign worker Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, formerly of Hillsboro, as Secretary of State, succeeding Martin Dies Jr.

A few days earlier, he selected another staff assistant, V. Larry Teaver of Lubbock, to the State Board of Insurance. Surprise here was that Teaver did not replace Durwood Manford, veteran member of the board.

Manford got a new six-year term and Charles D. Mathews, a Dallas trucking executive and attorney until two years ago, was moved from the board to an Austin district judgeship.

Teaver replaced Mathews when the freshman board member became judge of the new 200th Travis County district court.

Smith stirred some controversy by naming a successor to Brig. Gen. James M. Rose as assistant adjutant general of Texas for air. On recommendation of Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, the state adjutant general, he picked Lt. Col. Bellario D. J. Flores of San Antonio for the Air National Guard command.

REDISTRICTING MOVES ON

—A two-way legislative redistricting fight moved toward a Supreme Court decision last week.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin filed briefs in appeal from the August 2 Austin district court ruling that House of Representatives reapportionment this year is unconstitutional because it improperly violates county lines. Martin said the "one-man-one-vote" rule of federal courts eliminates state constitutional provision safeguarding county lines.

At the same time, 53rd District Judge Herman Jones refused to prevent the Texas Legislative Redistricting Board from reapportioning the State Senate and said the Board may also do preliminary House realignment. Time for attack on boards' work, concluded Jones, is when it finishes.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson brought suit in Jones' court to

prevent the Board from redistricting House and Senate. He contended new census data is not complete and that reapportionment should be left until 1973.

Head indicated efforts will be made to get his suit before the Supreme Court at the same time as the attack on House reapportionment of the regular session.

TAX STUDY LAUNCHED

New Legislative Property Tax Committee began a four-year study of how property taxation can be made "fair, viable and efficient."

Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg was named chairman of the group and Jack Hart of Midland staff director. Hart noted a recent decision of the California Supreme Court may make the Texas committee's job more difficult.

California court held reliance on property taxes alone to finance public schools is unconstitutional. Committee's work is being financed by a charge of \$1 per delinquent tax receipt authorized by the Legislature this year. Among goals is computerization of ad valorem tax records on a statewide basis.

TEACHER PAY HIKE OK

Up to 90 per cent of 138,000 Texas teachers will get their pay raise as approved by the Legislature in spite of the 90-day wage freeze, under a Texas Education Agency ruling.

Ruling by State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar is subject to approval by federal authorities. It would go to 1,200 local school districts on Sept. 8 unless reversed in Washington, but is subject to further interpretation at local school board level.

Edgar said teachers signed contracts prior to August 15, many were at work July 1, and others had reached an agreement and established eligibility to perform with a local school before the president's freeze order. Commissioner Edgar concluded that raises were in order also in local school districts which pay salaries above the state minimum where agreements were reached before August 15.

Texas Public Employees Association filed a petition for exceptions from the freeze since the Legislature last June passed an appropriations bill calling for state worker pay raises.

A. G. OPINIONS — Appropriations bill limitations on extended state pay to aliens do not prohibit the Texas Industrial Commission from hiring a Mexican National to work in Mexico full time in a Texas Industrial Commission branch office there, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* A justice of the peace who is not an attorney must have served a minimum of two terms of four years each to be exempt from attending a 40-hour course of instruction for non-lawyers.

WATER PLAN ALIVE — Master \$10 billion water plan to move surplus Mississippi River waters to Texas High Plains farms is still alive, according to Harry Burleigh, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board.

Burleigh urged campaign to win congressional support of plan in 1973, when federal agency water conservation report is due.

Although Texans rejected \$3.5 billion bond issue to finance state's share of giant project, it is believed much of the money can now be obtained from the federal government, Burleigh indicated. Two groups, West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Water, Inc., are spearheading the new drive for financing.

WELFARE CUT DELAYED — Start of new state fiscal year September 1 did not bring reduced aid to fatherless welfare families, even though Texans refused to raise \$80 million a year categorical benefit ceiling last spring.

Cuts are expected in a few months, however, State Welfare Department reports. Average of \$118.53 per month assistance for families with dependent children is expected to remain through January.

New program for paying medicine bills of welfare recipients through separate program helped postpone reduction, Welfare Department said.

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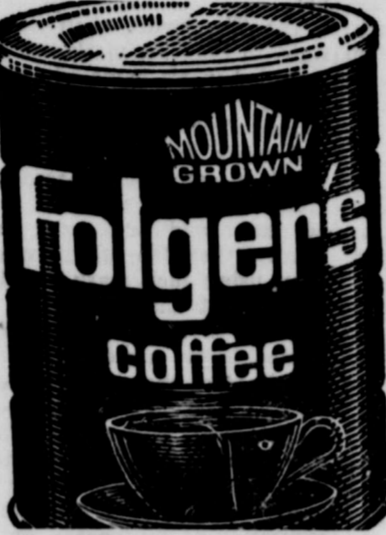

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Plans Being Made For October Visit Of Bloodmobile

Red Cross Blood Program Director Is Speaker in Crowell

In preparation for the semi-annual visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to Foard County on October 6, Jon Ayers of Wichita Falls, executive director and administrator of the blood program, met with a number of Foard County residents at the community center Wednesday afternoon of last week and explained in detail the Red Cross' blood program.

He said that the Wichita Falls Blood Center is one of 59 centers scattered across the nation which are meeting the blood needs of the sick. He said that there are three organizations involved in the collection of blood by the Red Cross: the individual community which is to recruit donors; the local hospital which stores the blood; and the regional center which provides the technical know-how for the blood program.

He explained that the Red Cross handles blood for the veterans hospitals in the nation. Blood is collected by the Red Cross from the no-cost donor—that is, a person who voluntarily gives blood for a humanitarian cause. He added that most donors of blood come from the "middle class" society of America. That is, very little blood is donated by the rich or the poor.

School Principals' Duties Outlined By Local Board

The duties of the school principals as adopted by the Crowell school board Monday night follow:

1. To organize and administer the school program in the unit to which he is assigned.
2. He shall be the instructional and co-curricular co-ordinator for his school unit.
3. He shall be responsible for the supervision of all employees working in his school unit and the discipline of all youth.
4. He shall prepare and/or approve all publications and public relations materials applicable to his school unit in accordance with procedures established by the superintendent and/or board of trustees.
5. He shall furnish records on students and employees to other school personnel and to local, state and national governmental units in accordance with board policy.
6. He shall be responsible for curbing disruption to the instructional or other school programs caused by persons in addition to students, teachers and employees.
7. To participate in consultation and negotiations as assigned by the superintendent of schools.
8. Other professional duties as assigned by the superintendent of schools.
9. Any area of organization and administration not specified by the organizations or persons above and necessary to the efficient operation of his school unit shall be at the discretion of the school principal.
10. Duties of the school principal shall not be items considered negotiable between teachers and boards of trustees.

Gun Plugs a Must In Some Counties

A recent change in state hunting regulations allowing "un-plugged" shotguns for the taking of non-migratory game birds and game animals does not apply in all of Texas' 254 counties.

The regulation applies in counties which are under regulatory authority of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission except Uvalde County. The others are "general law" counties which have their hunting and fishing laws set by the Legislature.

Foard County is one of the "general law" counties. The commission recently removed the restriction calling for shotguns to be permanently plugged to three-shot capacity for non-migratory species except in Uvalde County. Migratory birds, which may be hunted only with shotguns plugged for a three-shell capacity, include ducks, geese, brant, coots, rails, gallinules, jacksnipe, woodcock, sandhill cranes, white-winged doves and mourning doves.

As finally passed and sent to the Governor.

AN ACT

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in reregistering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485 and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendar in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

Record Shark Caught At Artificial Reef

San Antonian Timothy Torrence went fishing at a man-made reef in the Gulf of Mexico and hauled in a record fish—a 320-pound bull shark.

The 9-foot 5-inch shark was caught June 5 off Port Aransas after a two-hour and 15-minute battle. A 130 pound test line baited with the tail section of a jackfish was used to land the shark.

No previous record for bull sharks was listed by the Texas Fish Records Committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. In cases of sharks and sunfishes, the committee decides if a new category is justified for each species.
