### Another Wedding

## and Mrs. Mack Ghazal Establish Home in Benghazi, Libya

Exciting things have happened to Mrs. Cindy Erwin Ghazal as she flew to London on October 20, to join her husband, Mack Ghazal. After about a year spent in London, Mr. Ghazal went to Benghazi, Libya, to establish their home.

Some of the first things after arrival in Benghazi was a wedding. The couple were married in Las Vegas, Nevada, in December 31.

Writing about her wedding, she said "We moved into our new home on Wednesday night after we were married on Wednesday afternoon. The ceremony took place in my parents' home, but I had to get to go. Now, don't laugh, it's true! All I had to do was go into the room where Mack's father, a "Shiek," that guy who I stayed with in London last summer, were. And I asked me if I agreed to be his wife and I said "yes," and I left. That night, we had the wedding party. Everyone in his family were here: aunts, uncles, parents, cousins and friends. I dressed me up and we all sat on the floor and the walled drums, sang and danced. They killed two sheep out in the backyard and prepared the feast on an open fire. It was all so exciting and I really enjoyed the thing."

The Ghazal family has a catering service for European and American oil companies on the Sahara Desert and Mack has frequent trips into the desert. In fact, he was there at the time she wrote a letter to homefolks which arrived here last Thursday.

She told in the letter about going into Benghazi with her husband's sisters on a shopping trip for furniture for her new home, which they call a villa. She says the villa has all modern fixtures, with "a style of its own." It is located about 1 mile from the Mediterranean Sea, and is located in a newer section of town about 10 minutes away from downtown Benghazi.

In the letter, Cindy said she had a Volkswagen. "None of the women in the family know how to drive, so Mack's mother is really excited at the prospect of my teaching his sisters," Cindy stated.

She says she is about to get used to the money system, and added, "I am really enjoying all of these different ways of doing things, the money, the language, the style of houses, the small cars (which fortunately drive on the right side of the road instead of the way they did in London. Oh, that was horrible. I never did get used to it, getting in on the wrong side of the car, or going down the wrong side of the street. Of all my experiences, that was the weirdest).

"Oh, yes, I have a new name. Mack's family gave me an Arabic name, Samma. It sounds like you are saying Sammy with 'ya' on the end of it."

Life is proving very exciting for the young Crowell native in her newly-established home 10,000 miles away from her native Foard County.

Mrs. Ghazal is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Erwin of Crowell and Mrs. Herman Knight of Quanah. She is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat McDaniel of Crowell.

## WILDCATS WIN LEAGUE OPENER WITH PADUCAH

The Crowell Wildcats, coached by Scott Boyd, unleashed a potent offense, backed up by a brilliant defensive effort, in winning the first District 8A game of the season for both teams 53 to 0 over Paducah.

Coach Boyd emptied his bench in the latter stanza of the contest and the freshmen and sophomores gained some valuable experience.

The Wildcats scored 19 points in the first quarter, 20 in the second and 14 in the third. The Cats proved almost unstoppable in rushing for 310 yards and adding 145 more by passes. Quarterback Rex Driver threw for 2 touchdowns and galloped 63 yards for another.

Other Wildcats adding points by the touchdown route were Randy Dorsey, Harry Lee Swan, Billy Ray Neal, Terry Farrar and Phillip Bell.

Dorsey scored the first Wildcat TD on a 5-yard blast. Rocky Bachman kicked the point after. On the Cats' next possession, Driver passed to Swan for a touchdown.

Crowell High School Moves to District 7-A For 1972 Football

The State Executive Committee has announced the 1972 tentative football assignments for Conference A.

The past two years Crowell High School has been assigned to District 8-A having previously been in District 11-A. For the school years 1972-1973 and 1973-74, Crowell has been tentatively placed with the following schools to compose District 7-A: Archer City, Holliday, Knox City, Munday, Paducah.

The first date that a high school team in Conference A may play a game next year is September 7, 1972. The last date for certifying district champions in this conference is November 18, 1972.

## Election Called for Nov. 6 on New Tax Plan for Greenbelt Water Authority

Greenbelt Water Authority directors voted Tuesday, Oct. 12, to submit to voters in the authority on Nov. 6 a plan which would provide for refunding the authority's \$8,200,000 outstanding bonded debt and would authorize the authority to levy taxes in Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis, Childress, Quanah, and Crowell for retirement of its debt.

The authority proposes, if the election is successful, to reissue \$5,475,000 in combination tax and revenue bonds, \$2,000,000 in straight revenue bonds, and retire \$25,000 from the authority's surplus reserve fund. The remaining \$700,000 in bonds would be paid by the Texas Water Development Board's purchase of additional water conservation storage space in Lake Greenbelt from the authority.

The dissenting vote to call the Nov. 6 election was cast by the Memphis director of the authority board, J. Wendell Harrison. Board vice president W. Carroll Knopp of Clarendon abstained, and Crowell's representative on the board, Henry Black, was absent. Voting to call the election were R. A. Yarbrough of Childress, president of the authority, and directors C. L. Johnson of Hedley and Howard Stanley of Quanah.

Voting in the election will be in all cities forming the authority—Clarendon, Memphis, Childress, Hedley, Crowell, and Quanah. Polling places have been established at the city halls in each city except Hedley where voters will cast ballots at the Lions Club hall. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 5 p. m.

Absentee voting began Monday, Oct. 18, at the authority's filter plant north of Clarendon on State Highway 70 and continue through Nov. 2. Absentee votes may be cast daily except on Saturdays and Sundays and state holidays. Hours for absentee voting will be 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Absentee voting may also be accomplished by mail. Ballots may be obtained by writing the Greenbelt Water Authority, Box 665, Clarendon, Texas 79226.

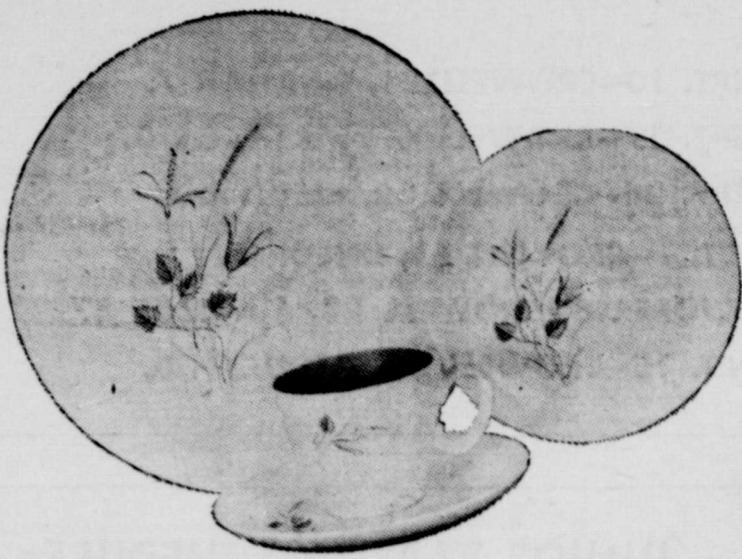

**Organized Labor Leaders Urge Defeat of Nixon**

Support Urged for Yarborough for Any Office He May Seek

Austin, Tex. — Organized labor leaders of Texas have set as political priorities for 1972 the defeat of President Nixon and support of former U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough for any office he seeks.

AFL-CIO State President Roy R. Evans announced the goals were adopted by his organization's executive board and the COPE administrative committee in a recent meeting here.

It is "quite possible," Evans said, the AFL-CIO will make no endorsements in next year's governor's race unless Yarborough is a candidate. He noted a two-thirds majority of delegate strength is necessary for endorsement in a COPE convention.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde are announced gubernatorial candidates.

Evans listed the lieutenant governor's race as the No. 3 priority of labor; the House Speaker's race No. 4 and congressional, state Senate and House contests No. 5.

He unveiled a voter registration goal of six million by the 1972 general election.

In a September poll of AFL-CIO convention delegates, Evans reported 201 felt Yarborough should run for the U. S. Senate, while 120 preferred that he run for governor and 26 for neither office.

The labor delegates liked Sen. Hubert Humphrey for president, giving him 313 straw votes to two for Alabama Gov. George Wallace and none for President Richard Nixon.

## H. D. Agent Gives Several Recipes For Potatoes

Potatoes or spuds, whichever you would like to call them, are in plentiful supply for October eating, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Whether you pride yourself on a cosmopolitan taste or are more "just plain folks," you probably like potatoes, most folks do. Why not try these ideas and surprise your family with something new?

### Potato Pudding

2 cups finely diced potatoes, 1 cup boiling water, 1 1/2 cups hot milk, 4 eggs, slightly beaten, 1/3 cup minced onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1 or 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, sour cream.

Cook potatoes in boiling water until tender; drain. Stir hot milk slowly into eggs. Add potatoes and remaining ingredients, except sour cream; mix well. Pour into a greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake at 350 degrees 40 minutes or until set. Serve topped with sour cream. Makes six servings.

With pork also on the plentiful foods list for October, why not try

### Scalloped Potatoes with Pork Chops

2 cups thinly sliced raw potatoes, 1 small onion sliced, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper, 4 loin or rib pork chops (1/2 to 3/4 inch thick) 4 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk.

Arrange potatoes and onions in layers in a greased baking dish, seasoning each layer with salt and pepper. Trim fat from pork chops and save it for later use. Lightly season each chop with salt and pepper and coat well with 3 tablespoons of the flour. Brown chops on both sides in some of the pork fat in a frying pan. When the chops are well browned, remove from pan. Set aside all except 1 tablespoon fat from frying pan. Mix the remaining 1 tablespoon flour with the fat in the pan. Avoid scraping off any browned flour from pan. Add milk, blend lightly until smooth, and cook to the consistency of thin white sauce. Pour sauce over potatoes in baking dish. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) from 50 to 60 minutes until potatoes are soft and meat is tender. Makes 4 servings.

Try this, too. It's sure to please:

### Potato Curry

4 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 teaspoons turmeric, 2 pounds potatoes, 1 cup boiling water, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon dried ground red peppers, 2 tablespoons minced parsley.

Melt the butter in a skillet. Stir in turmeric and potatoes that have been peeled and quartered. Cook over low heat 5 minutes, shaking the pan frequently. Add the cup of boiling water, salt and dried red peppers. Cook 10 minutes longer or until tender. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons minced parsley. Serves 4 to 6.

When you have left-over mashed potatoes, do you wonder how to use them? Try this idea.

### Potato Griddle Scones

Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon baking powder. Cut in 3 tablespoons fat. Blend in 1 cup cold mashed potatoes. Mix 1 beaten egg with 1/3 cup milk; add to the first mixture. Mix slightly. Roll 3/8 inch thick and cut into 2-inch squares. Bake slowly on a hot greased griddle or frying pan, 7 or 8 minutes on each side. Makes 10 to 12 scones. These go well with creamed meat or fish.

Please try these! They are delightful.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE GREENBELT MUNICIPAL AND INDUSTRIAL WATER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election shall be held on November 6, 1971, in said Authority in the election precincts and at the polling places, and with the Presiding Judges and Alternate Presiding Judges, as follows:

Precinct A shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Childress, Texas. The polling place for Precinct A shall be the Council Chamber of the City Hall, Childress, Texas, and voting shall be conducted during the regular office hours of said City Secretary, with the following election officials: Roy Swain, Presiding Judge; Dick Bellah, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct B shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Clarendon, Texas. The polling place for Precinct B shall be the Council Chamber of the City Hall, Clarendon, Texas, and voting shall be conducted during the regular office hours of said City Secretary, with the following election officials: Sam Lowry, Presiding Judge; Walter B. Knorpp, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct C shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Crowell, Texas. The polling place for Precinct C shall be the Office of the City Secretary, City Hall, Crowell, Texas, and voting shall be conducted during the regular office hours of said City Secretary, with the following election officials: Mrs. L. A. Andrews, Presiding Judge; L. A. Andrews, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct D shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Hedley, Texas. The polling place for Precinct D shall be the Lions Club Hall, Main Street, Hedley, Texas, and voting

shall be conducted during the hours of 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M., with the following election officials: Myrtle Kirkpatrick, Presiding Judge; L. D. Messer, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct E shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Memphis, Texas. The polling place for Precinct E shall be the Council Chamber of the City Hall, Memphis, Texas, and voting shall be conducted during the regular office hours of said City Secretary, with the following election officials: W. D. Young, Presiding Judge; Gordon Gilliam, Alternate Presiding Judge.

Precinct F shall consist of all that part of the Authority contained within the city limits of the City of Quanah, Texas. The polling place for Precinct F shall be the Council Chamber of the City Hall, Quanah, Texas, and voting shall be conducted during the regular office hours of said City Secretary, with the following election officials: J. W. Crockett, Presiding Judge; Hugh Mabry, Alternate Presiding Judge.

2. That the Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. Absentee voting for said election shall be conducted at the Authority's filter plant located on Texas State Highway 70, between Clarendon and Pampa, the mailing address of which is P. O. Box 665, Clarendon, Texas 79226. The clerk for absentee voting shall be Sandra Mooring, and the alternate clerk shall be James L. Kuhn. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.

Absentee voting shall commence on the 20th day preceding the date of the election herein ordered and shall continue through the fourth day preceding the date of said election.

4. That notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of this Resolution at three public places in each of the election precincts of said Authority, one of which shall be at the City Hall contained within each precinct, not less than 15 days prior to the date set for said election; and a substantial copy of this Resolution also shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in each city having territory in the Authority, the date of the first publication to be not less than 14 days prior to the date set for said election. It is hereby found and determined that publication in the manner prescribed herein will accomplish publication in a newspaper or newspapers which are of general circulation in the Authority.

5. That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the Authority and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the Authority shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically, with respect to a submitted Proposition, (a) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the Proposition by resident, qualified electors of the Authority, and also (b) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the Proposition by resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the Authority and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. 6. That at said election the following Proposition shall be submitted in accordance with law:

**"Turned Out to Grass" Subject of Motion Picture**

Picture to Be Shown At Local Rotary Meeting Oct. 27th

A film recording of "Turned Out to Grass" as given by Leon F. "Monty" Montague before a large inter-city meeting in New York City will be the program at the Crowell Rotary Club meeting on Wednesday noon, October 27, at the community center.

Grady Halbert, who is bringing the film to Crowell, urged all club members to attend and to bring guests.

"Turned Out to Grass" is an address designed to stimulate the thinking of people, whether they be in their 40's, 50's, or 60's, as to the importance of discovering and developing their special interests and talents prior to retirement so that when retirement day comes, they will be prepared to retire "To Something" — not "From Something."

"Monty" Montague, a past officer of Rotary International, is an old Kansas cowhand who began his education in a one-room country school. This led to a master of science degree from Kansas State University, graduate work at Harvard, and membership in Phi Kappa Phi national honorary scholastic society.

Reared on a cattle ranch, he spent his early years raising purebred Hereford cattle, and during the 1930's grew five million tree seedlings annually for the government's dust bowl shelter belt project.

His life-long interest in grasslands and field botany extended into development of the landscaping for Rotary International's world headquarters in Evanston, Ill. It received the national "Plant America Award" of the American Association of Nurserymen, the "Certificate of Commendation" of the Men's Garden Clubs of America, and attracted the attention of Scotts, the grass people.

Upon retirement from Rotary International at age 65, he became associated with O. M. Scott & Sons. This company has sponsored his internationally famous address "Turned Out to Grass" on radio and television and before more than 100,000 business and professional leaders in the major cities of the nation.

The film recording was photographed, directed and produced by a staff from MGM.

Mr. Halbert is a personal friend of Mr. Montague—a friendship which began when Halbert was serving as District Governor for Rotary International.

**Prussic Acid Poisoning**  
Farmers and ranchers should be cautious when turning livestock out to graze on hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures, says Dr. James Armstrong, extension veterinarian. Prussic acid poisoning, caused by hydrogen cyanide in the plants, occurs when livestock grazes pastures that have been damaged by frost or when pastures perk up and begin fast growth after a drouthy period. Hay that is improperly cured can also present prussic acid poisoning problems for a short time. Nitrate poisoning may occur during the late fall on winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy weather.
