Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday from the First Christian Church conducted by Minister Philip Wilson, Rev. Walter Driver, Methodist pastor, and Rev. Warren Everson, Bethel pastor.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under direction of Womack Funeral Home.

Mr. Greening was born Dec. 4, 1903, in Crowell, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Greening. He married Beneta Vaught Jan. 3, 1925, in Crowell and she preceded him in death Feb. 23, 1970. He was a member of the First Christian Church and the Down Town Bible Class. He was a farmer and rancher.

## First Cotton from 1971 Crop Ginned Here Nov. 4th

### Crowell Farmers Gin Gets Two Bales Last Thursday

J. E. Ingle of the Margaret community brought in the first bales of 1971 Foard County cotton last Thursday afternoon to the Farmers Co-Op. Gin in Crowell.

Gin manager Bill King said the first bale yielded 2120 pounds of seed cotton and a 515 pound bale. The first bale was ginned free and in addition Mr. Ingle was presented a \$25.00 bonus. The load of cotton yielded 24.40 per cent lint, Mr. King added.

The second bale, brought in a short time later, yielded 2320 pounds of seed cotton and a 624 pound bale for a 26.8 per cent lint turn-out.

Mr. King said the Ingle cotton was stripped without defoliation about three weeks ago. It was scattered on 5 trailers and turned until it dried sufficiently for ginning. The cotton came from a 12-acre tract.

## WILDCATS WIN FRIDAY AT ARCHER CITY

Coach Scott Boyd's Crowell Wildcat football team bounced back from their defeat the previous week by Holliday, to take a commanding 42 to 0 win over the highly-regarded Archer City Wildcats at Archer City last Friday night.

The two clubs battled on even grounds through a scoreless first quarter, but Crowell started moving in the second period as Billy Ray Neal capped a drive with a two-yard blast for six points. Rocky Bachman's try for point-after failed. A few minutes later, Archer City's Johnny Hudson was caught in his own end zone giving Crowell a two-point safety.

Shortly before half-time, Terry Farrar, who led the Crowell runners with 73 yards in 14 carries, shot across from four yards out for a Crowell TD with Bachman's

try for extra point good, giving the Foard County Wildcats a 15-0 half-time lead.

Crowell continued its blistering pace in the third period with Neal scoring again, this time from one yard. The kick failed. In the same period, Harry Lee Swan took a 13-yard pass from Neal to add 6 more points with Bachman kicking the point-after.

Crowell's last two touchdowns were in the fourth quarter with Farrar scoring from 10 yards out and defensive tackle Freddy Matysek intercepting an AC pass and going 33 yards for the last Crowell score. Bachman added one of these points after and Jim Shook tackled on another.

The entire Wildcat defense looked good in this game, especially Johnny Urquiza, Farrar, Ronnie Naylor, Bachman, Ernest Barrera, Matysek and Philip Bell. Rex Driver, Wildcat quarterback, ably led the Crowell offensive wishbone T attack.

### Foard Countians Are Invited to Mesquite Control Field Day

Interested ranchers, farmers and agriculture workers are invited to a field day showing the results of mesquite control followed by range seeding that will be held on the Badger Nest Unit of the former Mill Iron Ranch on Nov. 11 (today).

A short tour showing the results of the brush control and range seeding work will start at 10:30 a. m. and a free barbecue will be served at the Badger Nest headquarters beginning at about 12:30 p. m. The location for the range tour and barbecue can be reached by turning off Highway 86 at Parnell on a county road and driving six miles south to the entrance of the Badger Nest unit.

The rangeland to be toured is in an area of about 49,000 continuous acres with more than a dozen operators, where more than 15,000 acres of upland rangeland has the mesquite dozed and side-odds grama grass seeded on the dozed ground. From the Badger Nest headquarters the surrounding country must look much like it did when the original settlers came to the Rolling Plains area in the 1870's and 1880's.

This type of mesquite control was started in 1965 by A. W. Johnson, former Foard County resident and brother of Virgil Johnson of Foard City. Results were very encouraging and the practice has been spreading to his neighbors.

### From the News . . .

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Nov. 13, 1941, edition of The Foard County News:

The Foard County Community Lunch Project is now in full sway, according to County Judge Leslie Thomas, who announces that four lunch rooms in the county are now operating daily through the school week. The lunch rooms, with ten workers serving approximately 275 lunches daily; Thalia, with three workers, serving approximately 97 lunches daily; Riverside, with three workers, serving approximately 65 lunches daily; and Margaret, with two workers, serving approximately 30 lunches daily.

Roy N. Barker is announcing this week his appointment as dealer for the new Ford tractor with Ferguson System. The name of the new firm is Barker Implement Co., with Mr. Barker as owner and manager.

The weather has been good this week for cotton picking in Foard County and many hundreds of bales have been gathered. Gins of the county have been running almost constantly, both day and night. From all reports there are plenty of pickers and farmers are taking advantage of the clear weather to get the crop harvested.

An oil showing was encountered in the Bruce Sullivan No. 1 Gladys McCoy, 6,000-foot wildcat test in the J. M. Seaton survey five miles south of Crowell last Saturday.

### Livestock Survey Questionnaires Due Here Soon

Phillips, editor of the Berger News-Herald, has written The Foard County News and other Texas weekly newspapers calling attention to the "Annual Newsletter of the State Textbook Committee, Texas Society Daughters of American Revolution" by Mrs. Charles N. Baker, Rt. 1, Box 121-Q, Sanger, Texas, 76266. The following statements are excerpted from the article:

"The fading importance of the printed word as the most used mode of communication in education is being stepped up . . .

"The use of books and other printed modes (the use of printed words) is decreasing in importance daily as non-print multi-media receive more emphasis in education . . .

"Non-print multi-media include television, films, film strips, recorders and tapes, radio, and telephone . . .

"We must contemplate the impact of ignoring the printed word . . .

"If you cannot read, you can only do what you are told . . ."

Mr. Phillips goes on, "Newspapers are threatened with the loss of readers if the present political indoctrination of our children's school books are permitted to run its course. . . Not taught to read, a generation of non-readers will have no need for your newspaper. . . Such a generation of non-readers will, of course, be aware of only that which they hear and see over the air and in the form of pictures, moving and otherwise.

"Your newspaper can do something it probably has never done before and that is to call attention to the hearing on this subject in order that intelligently concerned readers might add their support to the three mothers who will appear before the State Board of Education in Austin, at 8:30 a. m., November 13, 1971." 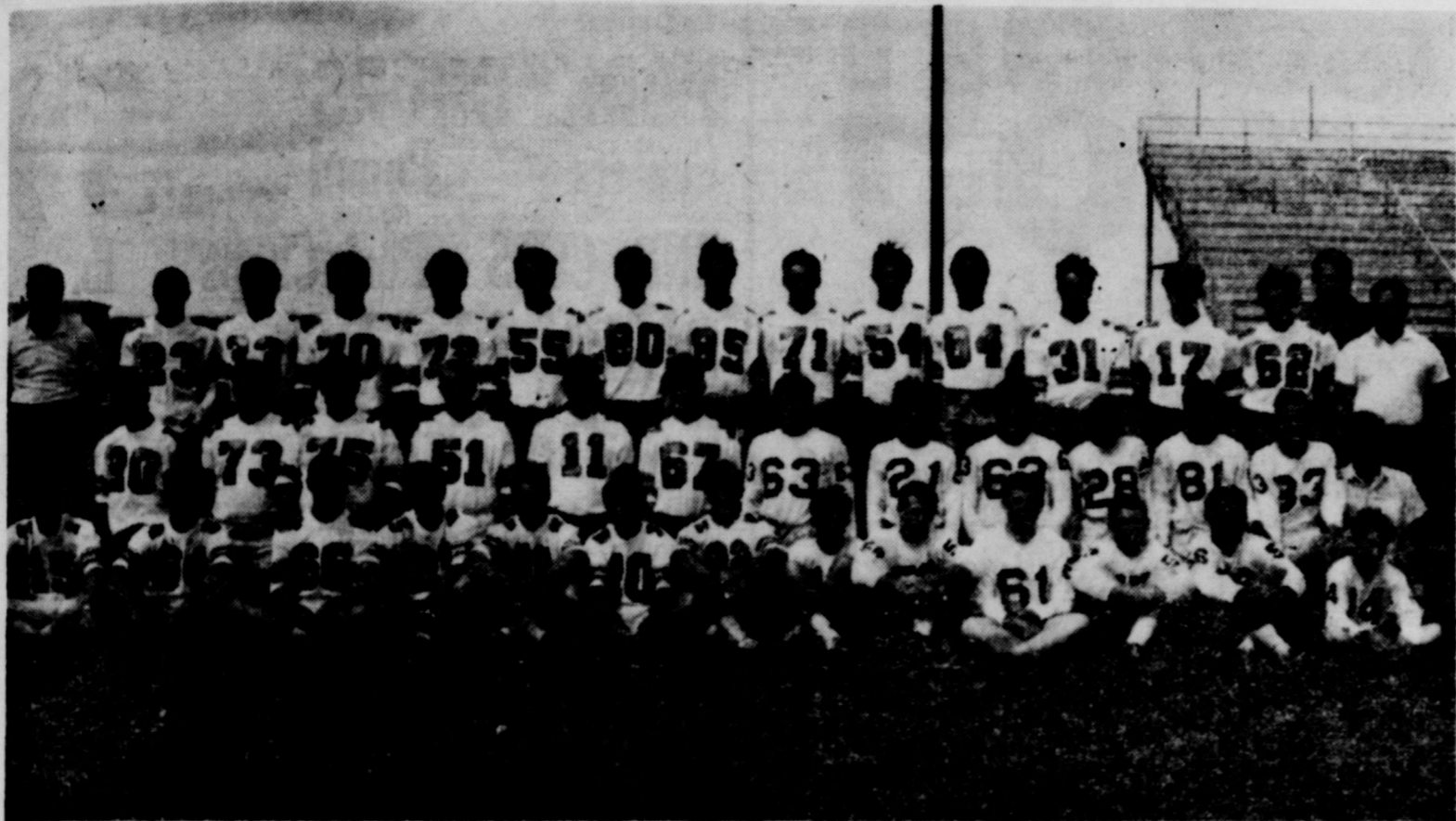

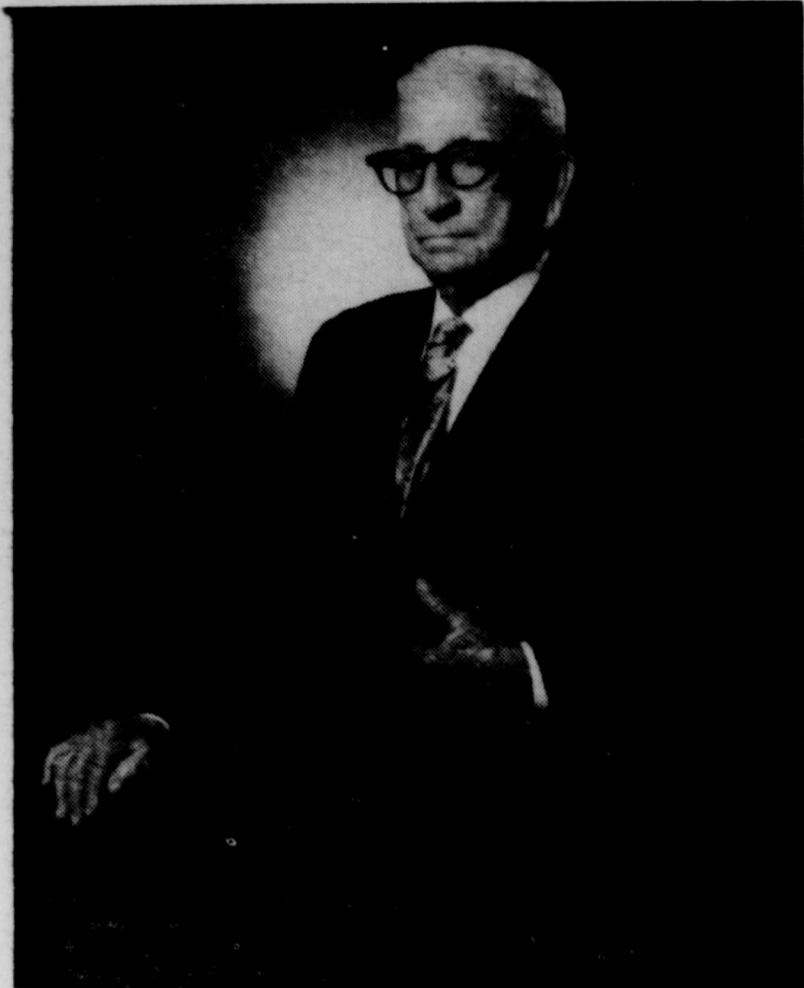

**One of State's  
Largest Businesses  
Opens This Month**

One of the largest businesses in  
Texas opens its doors in Novem-  
ber.

Its 510,000 customers will  
spend about \$88 million in about  
two months. The business will  
utilize 37 million acres of leased  
land, and the processed product  
will be worth more than \$6 mil-  
lion.

It's the annual fall deer sea-  
son in Texas, an event anxiously  
awaited by hunters as well as  
hardware store owners, ranch-  
ers and packing house opera-  
tors.

The economic impact of the  
deer harvest in the state is be-  
coming well known to most Tex-  
ans. But oddly enough, the im-  
pact could be greater yet if all  
the areas populated by deer were  
used properly, according to Texas  
Parks and Wildlife Department  
officials.

A total of 290,706 deer was  
legally taken during the 1970 sea-  
son. That's a lot of deer, but the  
total represents only about nine  
per cent of the herd.

Biologists say under most con-  
ditions an annual harvest of 15  
per cent to 25 per cent of the  
herd is appropriate. In fact, stud-  
ies have shown that a higher har-  
vest rate results in a healthier  
deer herd from year to year.

The state's overall deer popu-  
lation is remaining fairly stable at  
around 3.2 million animals, but  
civilization's constant inroads on  
deer habitat are likely to reduce  
that number in the next few years.

**School Board  
Covers Many  
Topics at Meeting**

At a called meeting of the  
Crowell School Board Monday  
night, a variety of business was  
tended to, ranging from a state-  
ment on non-discrimination in em-  
ploying personnel to voting to  
plow up the football field.

In accordance with Civil Rights  
Action 5291, the board adopted  
a policy statement in which the  
board agreed not to discriminate  
against any race in its hiring prac-  
tices.

The board authorized school of-  
ficials to dispose as they see fit  
of some old library books, many of  
which have not been checked out  
in over 20 years.

The board accepted the resig-  
nation of Mrs. Laverne Prince as  
a school cafeteria employee and  
hired Mrs. Anna Laura Eavenson  
to replace Mrs. Prince.

The board discussed and autho-  
rized Supt. Larry Jones to look  
further into Special Education  
Plan A, another state program to  
be adopted by all Texas schools  
by Sept. 1, 1976.

The board will seek an amend-  
ment to the 1970-71 Title I bud-  
get so a part-time special educa-  
tion aide can be employed.

Supt. Jones told the board that  
the local school had a 483 average  
daily attendance during the past  
six weeks.

The board okayed the accepting  
of bids for 50 gallons of paint  
to repaint the old gym.

In another federal program, the  
board told Supt. Jones to make  
application under Title 3, ESEA,  
for employment of a guidance  
counselor for the school.

The school board members were  
informed that the school has spent  
14.85 per cent of its budget in the  
first two months, which is  
"staying within the budget." J.  
H. Gillespie, secretary, reported  
that 73 per cent of the school's  
taxes were collected during Octo-  
ber, which is 1 per cent less  
than the total collected at the  
same time last year.

Work will get underway this  
week on plowing up the football  
field and re-working it. Even with  
heavy fertilization and watering  
last summer, the field's turf never  
did get very thick, and it is hoped  
that cultivating the soil will  
help correct this next year.

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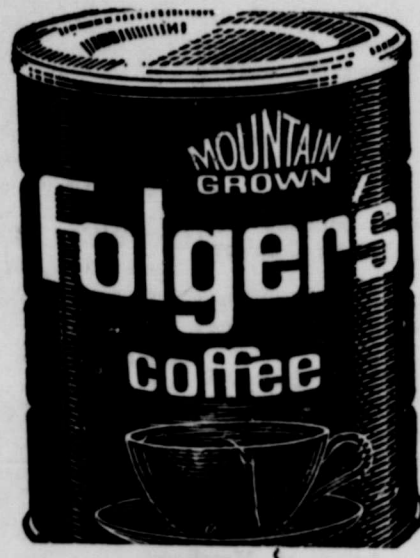
