## John J. Wilkins Died Saturday After Long Illness

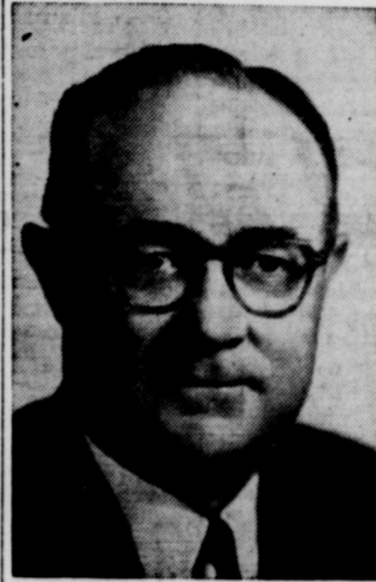
### Funeral Services Held Monday at Lindale, Texas

He plans to be out of the state on Saturday, December 4, in order that Senator W. E. Snelson of Midland may serve as "governor-for-a-day."

The invention consists of a new, improved knife that provides a fast and safe method of skinning fish. It is also ideal for de-veining shrimp, to filet fish and as a generally useful household utility device. The blade is preferably

made of stainless steel and is secured in a waterproof and heat-resistant handle by transverse rivets. The blade has a sharp cutting edge extending to a point, and the opposite side is dull with a sharp indented hook-like point, facing the handle. The sharp point enables the user to score a fish just to right depth for easy skinning.

Mr. Rader developed his invention in Crowell and now is negotiating for production and marketing rights with the assistance and guidance of The Raymond Lee Organization of New York.

## J. F. Matthews, Jr. Re-Elected Farmers Union President

J. F. Matthews was elected to a second one-year term as president of the Foard County Farmers Union when the organization held its annual membership meeting and barbecue supper Saturday night at the school cafeteria.

Elected to serve with Mr. Matthews were Eldon Whitman, first vice president; Billy Johnson, second vice president; Mrs. W. F. Stater, secretary. Members of the board of directors are T. R. Cates, Jr., Freddie Riethmayer, Warren Haynie, Kenneth Halbert, Cecil Carroll, Glyndon Johnson and Bill Bell.

Halbert, Haynie and A. V. McCombs were elected as delegates to the state convention to be held in San Antonio.

The seven resolutions passed to be forwarded to the state convention are:

1. We strongly oppose the latest regulations on farm trailer brake and lighting systems.
2. Reinstate the bracero program. It has become almost impossible to get farm help in Foard County.
3. All disaster states should receive 100 per cent of the projected yield, instead of giving California 100 per cent, and 90 per cent to the other states.
4. We strongly urge the passage of the Purcell bill, which increases parity for wheat and feed grain. This bill also creates a reserve for these commodities.
5. We oppose the banning of DDT, 2,4,5T, and other agricultural pesticides and herbicides.
6. Laws governing safety precautions for tractors and other farm equipment are unreasonable and too costly.
7. We urged the USDA to decide if barley is a small grain or a feed grain and stick with whatever decision they make.

Featured speaker for the evening was George Creagh of Fort Worth whose topic was "It's Still Easy to Keep Your Sense of Humor."

Preceding the meeting, a barbecue supper was served to Farmers Union families and guests.

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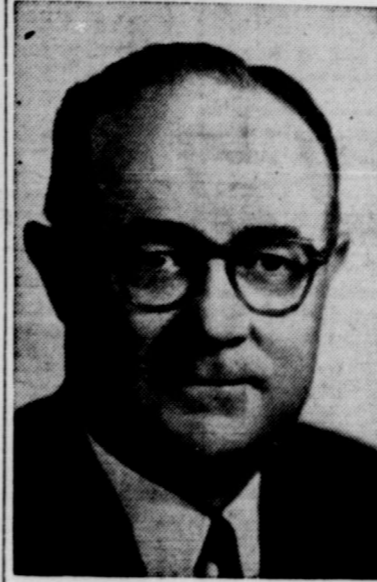

**Ronnie Bradford Saves Life of Accident Victim**

"Saving a life makes you feel good and humble at the same time," commented Ron Bradford, safety supervisor. He knows, because he recently saved the life of Michael Thomas, a Gifford-Hill-American employee in Houston.

Bradford is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Bradford of Crowell. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Bradford, live at Margaret. He is also a grandson of Mrs. S. J. Boman of Vernon.

On July 6, Ron made a safety presentation to the employees at Gifford-Hill Pipe's Houston plant. He was scheduled to go to Gifford-Hill-American's Victoria plant and upon return to Houston the following day to talk with the GHA employees there.

Ron decided to stop at the GHA Houston office, before going on to Victoria, to see if all was ready for his visit.

"I had no more than stepped out of my car, when John Robertson, office manager, and Ed Wombol, plant manager, ran out of the office. They said that there had been a bad injury down at the brush coat machine . . . and to get down there."

Ron jumped back into the car and headed for the area, not knowing what to expect. "When I got there, all that I could see of the man was his head and his dangling left arm. He was pinned under a heavy cart.

The crew had already hooked the cart to a winch truck and were ready to free the man — there was no heart beat in the left arm. We thought he was dead."

Robertson and Bradford pulled Thomas from the cart and felt of his chest. He was surprised to feel a very strong heart beat — but, the man was not breathing. The time lapse had been about 10 minutes from the time of the accident to the time he was on the ground.

Reacting quickly, Ron prepared Mike to receive air and began giving him mouth to mouth resuscitation. Fluid had built up in his lungs by this time. "Everytime I blew breath into his lungs, he expelled fluid. After a while, I got sick."

Robert Miller and David Bishop jumped in and spelled Ron while he stopped to rest. "It seemed like an eternity until the ambulance came. John Robertson was by my side and the entire time giving aid."

The ambulance crew had the proper mechanical equipment and took over. Thomas was hospitalized and is recuperating. He is paralyzed from the neck down.

Ron has been with Gifford-Hill for two years in the safety department. He and wife Pam have one daughter, and an infant son.

**New Licensing Law for Auto Dealers Now in Effect**

A new era in the giant Texas automobile industry, and in the protection of the buying public, has opened this fall as the new Dealer-Manufacturer Licensing law goes into full effect.

The six-member Texas Motor Vehicle Commission, set up to administer the law and regulate the industry, is at work licensing the more than 1,600 franchised new car dealers and approximately 1,500 factory representatives in the state, and holding public hearings to pass on the operation of new car dealerships and adjudicate other issues within the industry.

**Public School System No More Effective Than 15 Years Ago**

Over the last 15 years, the number of students in our public school system has increased 78 per cent but the number of public education employees has gone up 172 per cent and expenditures for education have increased 489 per cent, according to E. J. Dwyer, chairman of the board of directors of the National Association of Manufacturers. He points out that while expenditures went up six times faster than the increase in the number of students, the Carnegie Commission report issued last year found that the public school system is no more effective now than 15 years ago. Thus, we have additional evidence that the mere spending of more dollars doesn't insure better education. It's up to the citizens to demand quality education—and get it.

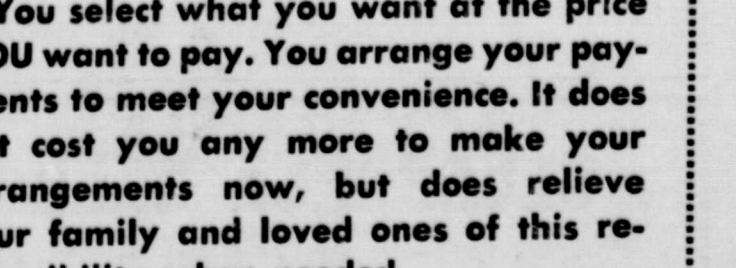

# WATER MEETING IS IMPORTANT TO ALL RESIDENTS OF AREA

The limiting factor today in agriculture is water . . . good water. New crop varieties, commercial fertilizer and technical know-how have allowed tremendous production increases in beef and field crop.

The limit now is rainfall or availability of irrigation water.

On top of this, a number of towns and cities in North Texas and Southern Oklahoma came close to running completely out of municipal water during last summer's drought.

Thus a meeting planned Nov. 18 in the Iowa Park High School cafeteria by the Wichita Farm and Ranch Club should be of interest to both rural and urban North Texas residents.

Billy Mahaffay, chief of the planning branch of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, Tulsa division, will discuss "Water, Now and in the Future."

Calvin Watts, executive director of the Red River Valley Association, will be a second speaker.

Farm & Ranch Club officers Don Lodge, president; Glen Tole, vice president; and Jim Schur, secretary-treasurer, explained the meeting should draw an audience from Waurika, Okla., Vernon, Quanah, Crowell and many surrounding towns interested in the area's watershed and salt control projects.

Mahaffay will describe various water development and purification projects funded and underway. He will also discuss those scheduled to be started in the near future along with the major items for which engineering and planning appropriations have been made throughout the Red River Basin area.

Items of special interest include Lake Kemp, the Pease River project and salt control along the Wichita River.

Of prime importance to water-conscious North Texans, said Fred Parkey of the Red River Authority, will be a progress report on the Arkansas-Red River Chloride Control Project and the Pease River Project.

This \$60 million plan, as designed by the Corps, will remove 80-85 per cent of the natural salt pollution that is now in Lake Kemp water, as well as abating 18 per cent of the total salt load in the Red River.

Methods of handling this salt control make a story in themselves.

Mahaffay will describe the unique methods of disposing of the massive doses of salt and brine pollution coming from natural sources. These include the use of a series of deep injection wells and inflatable rubber dams which will be used in conjunction with new settling basins and reservoirs.

On top of this, the new lakes and ponds can have a second use as recreational areas.

Work already completed in-

cludes an initial injection well test facility 6,500 feet deep, which was started early this year on Johan Creek in Childress County, Texas.

The rubber dams are similar to ones already in use in South Texas to keep ocean water from backing up in the Guadalupe River.

They are to be constructed on the south, middle and north forks of the Wichita River.

Water stored behind these dams will be pumped into new lakes to be built northwest of Truscott in Foard County and on Canal Creek northwest of Crowell in the same county.

The lake on Canal Creek will also receive salt water from the Pease River, said Parkey.

The rubber dams are so constructed that during flood periods, they can be partially deflated, permitting pure flood water (with low salt content) to flow over the dams. After the flooding period is over, they can be re-inflated to hold back the slow running salty water.

Watts, who heads the Red River Valley Association from Shreveport, La., will give a resume of major water projects built, underway and authorized throughout the Red River Basin of Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

The meeting is open to the public, said Lodge, and the only charge will be \$2 to cover the cost of the dinner which will be served at 7 p. m.

Everyone who owns property, a business, or who has an interest in the future of North Texas should want to hear these prominent authorities on water development. They'll outline these projects and answer questions.

Parkey told how the county water improvement district began attempts more than 25 years ago to control the salt content of Lake Kemp water. It proved too big a job for such a small and under-financed group so they have been seeking federal help for the last decade.

Now, he said, it looks like North Texas and Southern Oklahoma are on the verge of controlling the salt content of this water. The speakers Nov. 18 will say just how close. You're invited to be there to hear.

## Dean of Vernon Junior College Joins Rotary Club

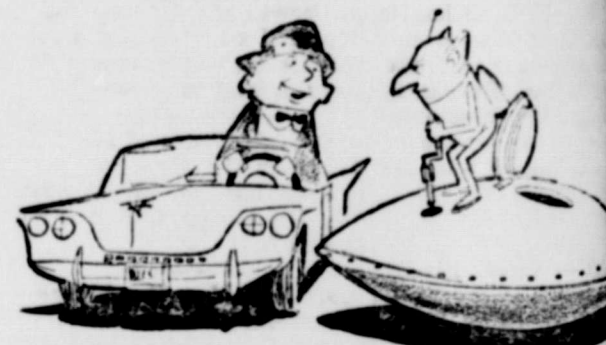

## State Study Shows Agri. Income Is Down in County

Report Says 1970 Farm Income \$3 Million Less Than '69

Foard County experienced a decline in income from agriculture during 1970 from a year earlier, according to 1970 County Statistics published jointly by the Texas Department of Agriculture and the United States Department of Agriculture. Declines were also noted in Hardeman, Wichita, Baylor and Wilbarger counties.

Foard County's total agricultural income was \$5 million, down from \$5.3 million in 1969.

Foard County during 1970 recorded cash income of \$1.8 million from all crops, down from \$2.1 million in 1969; \$1.6 million from livestock and livestock products, down from \$2 million. Government payments were \$1.4 million, up from \$1.1 million in '69.

Foard County produced 2,880 bales of cotton in 1970 from 8,500 planted acres; 1,009,000 bushels of wheat from 43,300 harvested acres; 254,000 bushels of oats from 5,800 harvested acres and 1.9 million pounds of guar from 2,900 harvest acres.

Foard County had 19,000 head of cattle as of Jan. 1, 1971, down from 20,000 a year, and 2,400 hogs, up from 2,000 a year earlier. With the effects of the prolonged drought cutting wheat production drastically and with a poor cotton crop coming up, figures for 1971 will undoubtedly be below the 1970 figures.
