Mrs. John Thompson of Vernon, and Mrs. Ethel Rennels of Bryan.



### SMOKING AMONG TEENAGERS

### By Gordon M. Meade, M.D.

Q. Are teenagers smoking more -or less-than ever before? A. More. About one million more teenagers are smoking today than two years ago. The percentage of smokers in the 18-year-old group is Q. 43 percent for boys, 28 for girls. But the increase in new smokers is greatest at the younger ages: 13, 14,

and 15. Even among 12-yearolds, smoking has doubled. Q. Is smoking as hazardous for young people as for adults who have smoked for years? A. Even regular smoking

among teenagers tends to be at fairly low daily levels Q. by adult standards. But studies of youngsters from ages 11 to 18 show significantly more sickness among those who smoke. New research makes clear that even one cigarette causes immediate damage to the circulatory system and upsets the normal flow of blood and air in the lungs. One cigarette also slows down the action of the cilio the tiny hairlike structure in the bronchial tubes that sweep out dirt and germs This is why people wh smoke, including teenagers are more susceptible to respiratory infection than nonsmokers. And the chance of developing diseases such as lung cancer and chronic bronchitis increase with the number of cigarettes you

Texas during the Christmas-New Year holiday season. He estimates that 52 persons will be killed during the Christmas period from 6 p. m. Thursday, December 23, through midnight Sunday, December 26. An additional 46 deaths are expected during the New Year holiday which begins at 6 p. m. Thursday, December 30, and ends at

midnight Monday, January 2. The DPS director cited statisics which show that last year, December led all other months for fatal traffic accidents in Texas. He said deaths for the 1970 Christmas week end were 14 per cent higher than the average three day week end period, with those for the New Year holidays running 51 per cent above average. Deaths for all four major holiday week ends in Texas last year were 26 per cent higher than the average of all other comparable week end periods.

In an effort to reduce the expected toll, Speir said the Department of Public Safety and local law enforcement officers will be out in force during the holidays, and will be paying special attention to hazardous violations such as speeding and driving while intoxicated.

Social Security Issues News Release About Medicare

Doctor hills for October, Noember and December may in me cases he counted toward the \$50 annual deductible for both 1971 and 1972 under the "earry over" provision of the medical in surance part of medicare, according to Wayns Klipping, social seurity manager in Vernon. The industible is the first \$50 of cov ered medical expenses accumulat ed in a calendar year, Klipping Idias.

"Before any payment can be made by medicare," he said, "your record must show that you have met your deductible. So, as soon as your hills come to \$50, attach them to a "request for medicare payment" form, and send them to the carrier that handles your med icare claims.

The "carry over" rule helps the heneficiary who might otherwise have to pay the \$50 deductible twice in a short period of timeat the end of one year and at the beginning of the next year, he said

"Even if you have not met the \$50 deductible before October," he said, "he sure to send in all the hills for sovered services you reesive in October, November or Decomher. They can help meet the deductible for 1972."




News items below were taken from the Thursday, Dec. 25, 1941, issue of The Foard County News:

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




