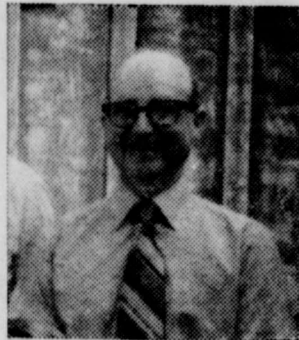

### 100-Year-Old Foard Pioneer Died Tuesday

Mrs. J. W. (Ellen) Owens, longtime resident of Foard County, who celebrated her 100th birthday on November 24, 1971, died Tuesday in a Vernon rest home where she had resided for a number of years.

Funeral services for Mrs. Owens were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday, February 23, at Womack Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Floyd Brock, pastor of the Margaret Baptist Church, and Rev. Joe Ainsworth, pastor of the Crowell Baptist Church, officiating.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack's directing. Grandsons were bearers.

Mrs. Owens was born Nov. 24, 1871, in Clinton County, Kentucky. She had lived in Foard County since 1909 except for the past seven years when she has been in Monterey Nursing Home in Vernon. Mr. Owens died in 1940.

Mrs. Owens was a member of the Margaret Baptist Church. She is survived by one son, Edgar Owens of California; three daughters, Mrs. John L. Hunter, Jr. of Gatesville, Mrs. Faye Jackson of Wichita, Kansas, and Mrs. C. L. Thompson of Geuda Springs, Kansas; 21 grandchildren, 40 great grandchildren and 33 great great grandchildren.

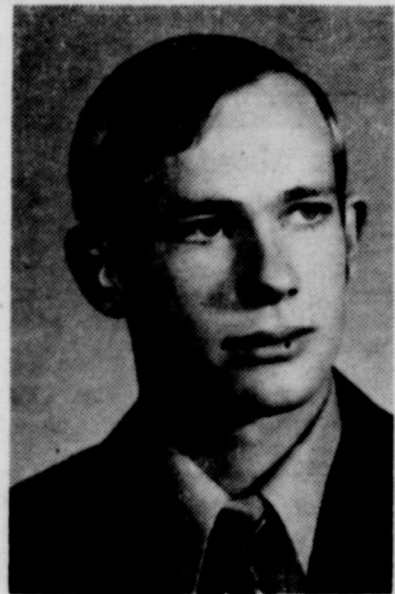
### College Group to Be at First Christian Church Here Sunday

# THIRTY YEARS AGO

When a worker becomes disabled he should contact his social security office for two important reasons: In order to get monthly payments started and to protect his earnings average for benefit amount purposes. When he files a claim and furnishes medical evidence of his inability to work, he does both. Some disabled people qualify for benefits even though they have never worked or paid into the social security system. These would be disabled widows between ages 50 and 60 and disabled sons or daughters of retired, disabled or deceased workers. To see if you qualify for these payments call your nearest social security office.

## Bob Price Speaks on "Water" at Crowell Meeting

"A word which is the symbol of prosperity throughout all of Northwest Texas is water," Congressman Bob Price said at a dinner meeting here in Crowell Tuesday night, February 15.  
"Our most serious problem is the shortage of pure water, both present and projected, without which the economy of our region as well as all life would fail," the congressman said. "It is therefore most important that we take adequate steps to locate and utilize available water resources and to plan carefully for the future so that the projected needs of an expanding region can be adequately met."

Congressman Price made reference to such projects as the Pease River Dam development program which would provide major benefits for recreation, flood control, and agricultural irrigation to the residents of Foard, Harlem and Willoughby counties. "I have continued to show a strong interest in projects such as this," Price noted, "and have already taken steps to push for further development and approval of this and similar projects. As a farmer and rancher myself, no one need tell me of the importance of water."

Congressman Price also discussed long-range plans for providing adequate water resources for Northwest Texas, including feasibility studies to bring water into the region via a canal from the Mississippi River. "There are several alternatives that I am pursuing," Price said, "including importing additional amounts of water, recycling and conserving existing supplies, and recharging subsurface water reserves. I have also supported appropriations to develop a fast breeder atomic reactor, which if successfully developed and implemented, will create a very economical system of desalting sea water."

Price concluded by suggesting that area residents work together toward a common goal of insuring that Northwest Texas shall be able to meet its water needs in the future, and he assured listeners that "I am prepared to make every effort possible to help you toward that goal."

## Two Minutes With the Bible

What is a Church?

Do you know that most people, even the great majority of religious people, do not even know what a church is? Ask the average man on the street what a church is and he will probably reply: "A church? Well, anybody knows that! A church is a building where people go to worship!" But this is not correct.

The word translated "church" in our Bibles, simply means assembly, so a church is not a building, but the assembly of people who meet in the building. And a church is not necessarily a gathering of worshippers. The righteous in Paul's day is called a "church" (Gr. ekklesia) in Acts 19:32, and this passage states that this assembly, or church, was "confused, and most of them did not know wherefore they were come together." So a church is simply an assembly, not a building.

The church of which the Bible has most to say is "the Church of God, which He hath purchased with His own blood" (Acts 20:28). St. Paul calls this church, again and again, "the Body of Christ," or "the Church which is His Body."

We do not join this Church by water baptism or any other religious rite; we join it by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Referring to believers in Christ, Paul declares: "By one Spirit are we all baptized into one Body" (1 Cor. 12:13), and in Rom. 12:5 he says "Ye being many are one Body in Christ."

Many sincere people have had their names on the rolls of religious organizations for years before learning this great truth, that the true Church, the Church of God, the Body of Christ, is not a building, but the company of those who have come to trust in Christ as their Savior.

We sincerely hope the reader belongs to this one true Bible Church—and also attends a local church, an assembly of believers in Christ who love and study the Word of God, so as to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 3:18).

## Rotary Club Seeks Foundation Candidates

Floyd C. Borchardt, president of the Rotary Club of Crowell, has announced that the club is seeking young men and women in the Foard County area as candidates for Rotary Foundation educational awards for study abroad in 1973-74.

Four types of educational awards are offered by the Foundation: graduate fellowships, for those between the ages of 20 and 28, with a bachelor's degree or equivalent; undergraduate scholarships, for those 18 to 24 with a minimum of two years of university level work; technical training awards, for those 21 to 35 with a secondary education and at least two years' working experience; and awards to teachers of the handicapped, for those 21 to 35 who have been engaged as fulltime teachers of the mentally, physically or educationally handicapped for at least two years at the time of application.

Each award covers round-trip transportation, educational and living expenses for one academic year, and, if necessary, funds for intensive language training. 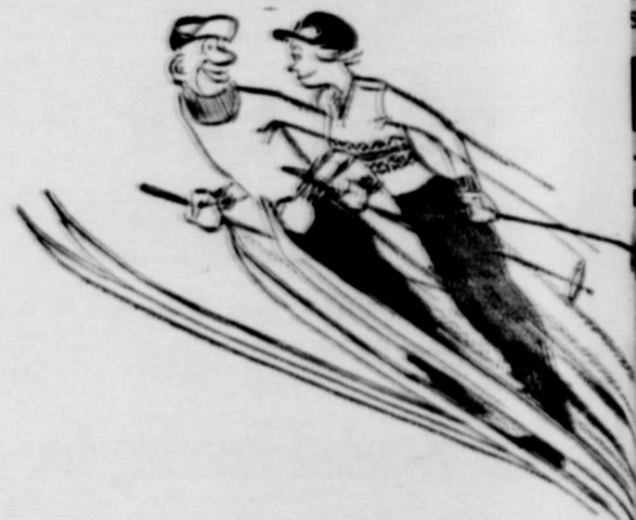

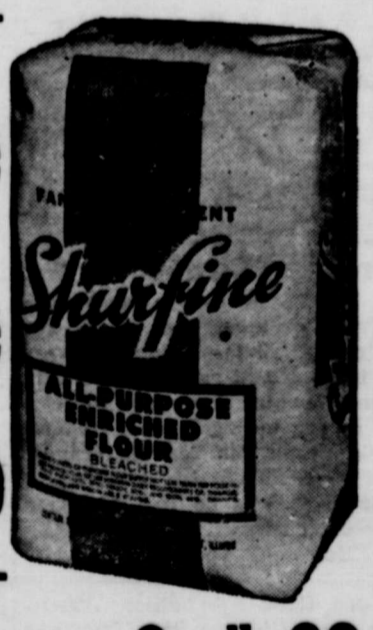
