Rattlesnake Hunt Queen's Contest Draws Total of Twelve Entrants

A total of 12 young CHS coeds have entered the Rattlesnake Hunt queen contest, Fire Chief Leonard Tole said Monday.

The queen contest is one part of the big two-day celebration and rattlesnake hunt set for Crowell on March 25 and 26, when literally thousands of people are expected to be on hand for the activities.

In addition to the queen contest, a fried chicken dinner Saturday and a big dance Saturday night, Tole said that a carnival will be set up here in town from Wednesday through Saturday. The Saturday night dance will be held at the Thalia gym with Don and the Party Makers of Vernon providing the music.

To stimulate interest in the hunt several local snake hunters have

been out and Tole last Monday had a cage containing 38 live rattlers ranging from the average size up to one big monster caught Sunday by Doyle Whitley.

Tole added that ranchers of Foard County who have rattlesnake dens on their property are invited to call him if they are willing for hunters to capture some of the snakes. The ranchers should accompany local hunters to the den.

Ewald Schroeder Died Last Week in Wichita Falls

Mr. Schroeder Was Foard Farmer for Many Years

Ewald Schroeder, 76, long-time resident of Foard County and a retired farmer, died Tuesday, March 7, in a Wichita Falls hospital after a brief illness. He had made his home in Vernon for several years, after farming in the Riverside and Rayland communities for many years.

Funeral services were conducted at Henderson-Fields Chapel at 3 p. m., Wednesday, March 8, with Rev. Don Taylor, pastor of the Peace Lutheran Church, of which he was a member, officiating. Burial was in Wilbarger Memorial Park.

Mr. Schroeder was born Jan. 27, 1896, at Plum, Texas, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Otto Schroeder. He married Clara Kasperik at Quannah April 27, 1946. She preceded him in death in 1966. He was a World War I veteran and served with the infantry in the 82nd Division.

Survivors include a son, Audrey Schroeder of Tooele, Utah; one daughter, Mrs. Evelyn Fauler of Schulenburg; a stepson, Archie Kasperik of Yorbalinda, Calif., a brother, Alfred Schroeder of Amherst; two sisters, Alma Woodruff of Milford, Mich., and Mrs. Bonnie Phillips of Vernon; eight grandchildren; one great grandchild.

Couple Moves to Crowell from San Angelo

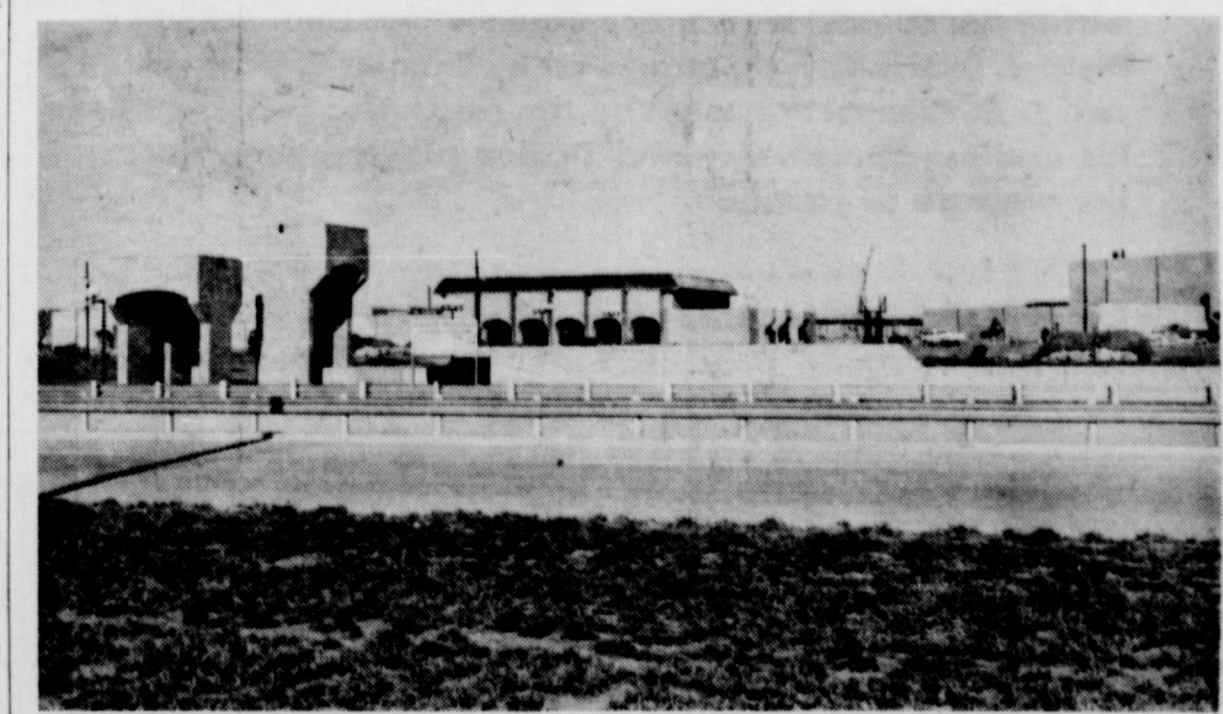

Deadline Nearing For Registering to Vote in Primaries

Do you want to vote in the May Democratic primary?

If you do, Sheriff Edward Howard says you must register in his office in the court house during the month of March, if you haven't already registered.

He said that last fall in the tax statements mailed to Foard County property owners, a voter registration form was included. He said that some residents have kept these application forms in the mistaken belief that they are registered to vote. These applications must be returned to the tax assessor-collector's office before the individual is registered to vote.

He said again that registration to vote can take place any time during the year, but must be done at least 30 days before voting in any election.

From the News . . .

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, March 19, 1942, issue of The Foard County News:

Six Foard County men were sent to Fort Sill, Okla., Friday, by the local Selective Service Board for induction into the United States Army. They are Wayne E. Diggs, Raymond Turnbull, William M. Love, Henry E. Brisco, Daniel F. Brisco, and Orville H. White.

Green bugs are doing considerable damage to wheat in this county, according to reports made by farmers and elevator men.

Vernon Regional Junior College to Open Sept. 5th

New College Is Designed to Serve Over 1,000 Students

Vernon Regional Junior College—approved by the Texas College Coordinating Board to serve the 12-county 28th Junior College Region—will open for classes Sept. 5, 1972, with a new 100-acre campus and a five-building complex designed to serve more than 1,000 students.

Dr. David Norton, president of the college, is extending an invitation to residents of the 28th region and adjoining counties to investigate opportunities available to them at the new college.

The 28th Junior College Region includes Wilbarger, Hardeman, Wichita, Clay, King, Knox, Baylor, Cottle, Archer, Haskell, Throckmorton and Foard counties.

The college will feature a full technical-vocational education program as well as standard college freshman and sophomore courses.

"We assure you that college credits earned in Vernon Regional Junior College will freely transfer to any accredited Texas college or university," Dr. Norton says.

"A distinguished faculty, comprised of doctorate and master's degree-level teachers in all academic programs, is being assembled from several hundred applicants for positions with the college," Dr. Norton said. "Students attending Vernon Regional Junior College can be assured of an instructional program—with special attention to counseling and individual personal needs of students—equal or superior to that available in comparable levels in senior colleges."

Dr. Norton said facilities with new buildings, air conditioned and carpeted throughout are among the finest in Texas.

Federal grants totaling approximately \$225,000 will enable the college to extend financial assistance to some 300 students during its first year of operation. Veterans will also be able to attend under the G. I. bill.

Dr. Norton predicts an outstanding opening year for the college. He expects an opening enrollment of more than 750 students in all programs.

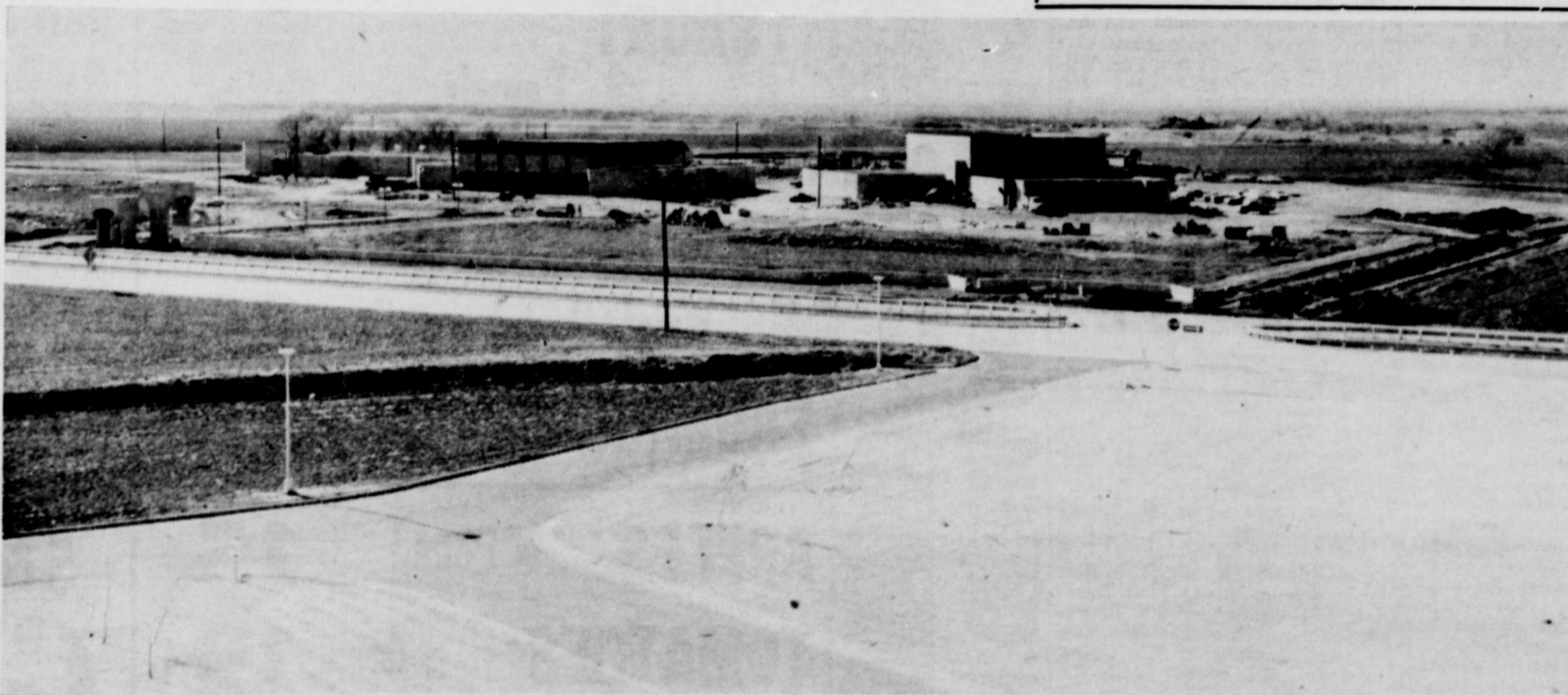

What It Will Cost to Attend

Tuition costs at Vernon Regional Junior College will be \$60 per semester for a normal full-time course load of 15 semester hours for students residing within the Wilbarger Junior College District, the taxing jurisdiction which is providing campus facilities and certain operational costs for the college. Tuition for a similar course load for Texas students residing outside the district will be \$70. The cost will be \$4 per semester hour for each additional course-hour taken. Many students take as many as 17 hours per semester and

may transfer a total of 66 hours to a senior college or university, sufficient for full Junior status.

Additional expenses which students should be prepared to pay include costs of books, activity fee and laboratory fees, where required for specialized courses. Costs of room and board in private facilities should also be figured if the student does not plan to live at home and commute to the campus during the five days each week—Monday through Friday—in which classes will be offered at the college.

Assistance for 300 Students

Initial approval has been given for Federal grants that will enable Vernon Regional Junior College to extend financial assistance totalling approximately \$225,000 to some 300 students during its first year of operation.

The funds approved include:
—\$79,750 in Educational Opportunity Grant funds, providing as an outright grant a maximum of \$550 per qualifying student that must be matched by the student personally, or by funds that can be borrowed through the Texas Opportunity Plan for later repayment. The grant would provide funds for at least 145 students.

—\$116,814 in Work-Study Program funds, in which a fulltime student taking 12 semester hours or more can earn up to \$24 a week by working 15 hours at the minimum wage as library assistants, typists, clerks, groundskeepers and lab assistants.

3. Submit scores on the (ACT) or the (SAT) entrance examination. Any high school graduate who is otherwise qualified will be accepted at Vernon Regional Junior College, as results of the tests are used only for counseling purposes and in proper placement of students in course work.
4. Contact the Dean or Registrar for pre-enrollment conference to plan your course objectives and to clarify any questions that you may have concerning registration and other details.

NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned intend to request the introduction of a bill in the Sixty-second Legislature, First Called Session, of the State of Texas, the general purpose, nature and substance of which is as follows:

Such bill will provide that Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority shall comprise all of the territory contained within the Cities of Childress, Clarendon, Hedley, Quanah and Crowell on the effective date of said bill. Woodard, mother of the groom-to-be.

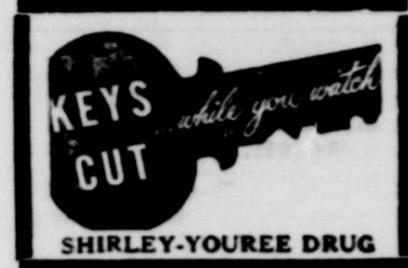

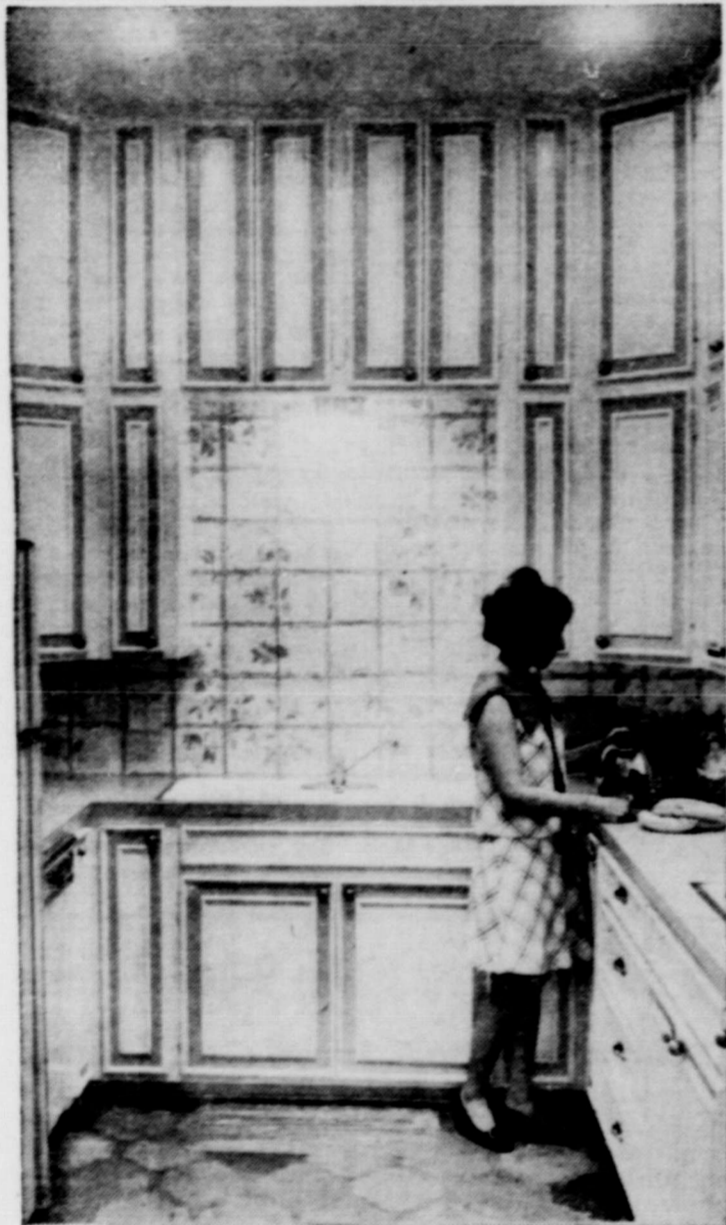

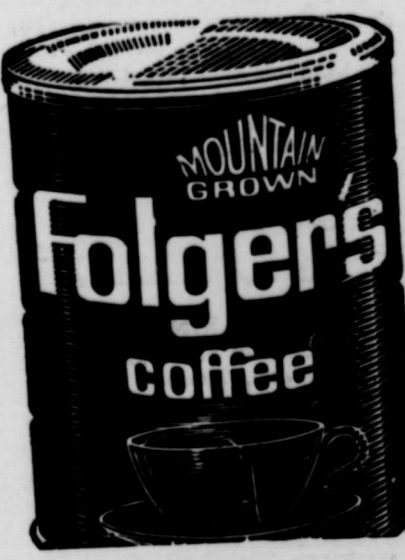

At School Tax Office—County Courthouse Building in Crowell, Texas, in said School District, with Thomas L. Tامل as Presiding Judge, and Mattie Carroll, Mary Sandlin, Thelma Garrett and Eleanor Black, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.

m. to 7:00 o'clock p. m.

4. Cornelia McDaniel is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Janis Everson is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting.
