Mr. Brown received 91 votes, Mr. Whitley received 90, Martin Jones of Crowell received 45 and Mrs. George Anne Johnson received 8 write-in votes.

## INTEREST MOUNTING FOR APRIL 28-29 TOUR

Interest is mounting in the proposed tour of Childress, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties by officials of local, state and federal elected officials, to observe the problems of economic development in a predominant rural area. The dates of the tour have been set for April 28-29, and will be co-sponsored by the executive committee of the Economic Opportunity Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties (a community action agency), and the Four Winds Industrial Foundation of Childress, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman counties.

At a called meeting of the executive committee members of the two organizations held in Quanah last Thursday, Henry Black, the chairman of the EOAC, Crowell, was elected chairman of the tour committee, and Mayor V. L. Hutchison of Paducah was elected co-chairman.

Mayor Robert Kincaid of Crowell was elected secretary-treasurer. City chairmen will be elected in each city along the route of the five-county tour from Vernon, Childress, Quanah, Paducah and Crowell. Tentative route of the tour will be one that will start in Vernon, go through Chillicothe, Quanah, Childress, Paducah, and will end in Crowell.

Already some 15 officials have agreed to come and make the tour. Hosts will explain the potentials of their communities as well as the problems that these rural counties face in economic development. The latter is the main reason the tour has been planned.

How to overcome the problems is the theme of the economic development tour and local people hope to learn how to apply all resources, local, private, state and federal, in a concerted effort to make the most frugal attempt, as well as the most dynamic attempt, to bring in new industry and new business to this rural area.

around the corrals and association meeting rooms. Esther is in error, of course. Probably she realizes this but just got up on the wrong side of the meat counter one morning and decided she had to raise hell with somebody, and who but the cowboys would be the best target?

However, she's playing smart politics, no matter how her judgment may have been clouded by whatever morning malaise prompted the ads. The food chain's customers are bound to be saying, "Thank heavens SOMEBODY'S on our side!" It would be interesting to know how much meat sales in Giant stores went down, and how much extra peanut butter has been sold since the ads appeared. No matter. Esther once more got her name in all the livestock papers, on the AP wire, and in the profane conversation of many a cowperson.

To a lady of her proclivities, how sweet it is. The messive irony of it all is that cattlemen are so vulnerable to attacks like this. When the dock workers decide they want more money (a decision they reach about once a month) they simply go on strike. Wheat farmers, unable to ship their grain abroad, sit back and suffer along with a lot of non-farmers. But the victims have nobody like Esther to defend them against the longshoremen.

How come everybody else can gouge the public to the quick and get away with it while the livestock producer, forever at the mercy of the market, is furiously attacked every time he gets a chance to make a dollar? A lot of politicians in addition to Esther are on a kick-the-cowboy kick. But apparently they don't have anything against, say, plumbers' wages. The other day at our house a sewer line went haywire and so did the boss lady of the house. She called a plumber. He couldn't find the line; neither the builder nor the original plumbing contractor had any record of where it was located. He climbed up on the roof, with his helper, and spent some time in diligent search.



No luck. "Well," the plumber declared, "it just means we're gonna have to dig up this whole yard till we find it. I haven't got a man that'll dig a ditch for less than \$9 an hour. That's it."

No, I said, that's not it. Our yard is about a hundred feet across and the whole habitation isn't worth a hundred feet of slow digging at nine smackers per hour. We'll put the Ace Reid water watch system into effect, I said, and find the missing line for the price of two used coat hangers, which is all the job's worth. Reid swears he can straighten out a pair of wire coat hangers and, walking slowly while they swing this way or that, find water lines under or through any building in the country.

One day down at Kerrville he found the men's room in Frank Smith's bar. The hangers pointed right at it. **Sen. Curtis Compares Beef, Cattle Prices with Those of 20 Years Ago**

HASTINGS, Neb. — Cattle feeders around Hastings were getting a little less for fed steers and heifers back in January of 1952 than they were in mid-February this year, but today's retail beef prices are about twice as high as they were then.

Sen. Carl Curtis of Nebraska recently compared current retail and live cattle prices with those of 20 years ago, getting his information from the Hastings newspaper, and put the following information in the Congressional Record:

That county plus Fayette, Gonzales, Webb, Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy counties are under state quarantine while a total of 18 counties are still under federal quarantine, according to Dr. E. L. Judy, coordinator of the USDA hog cholera eradication project at Harlingen. He urges all producers to report any sick hogs to the veterinarian, county agricultural agent or animal health official.

## An Open Letter To The People Of Texas

Dear Voter:

I'm a candidate for attorney general of Texas because I believe it's time for a change in the office. Crawford Martin is seeking a fourth term. It's the first time in the history of Texas an attorney general is running for a fourth term. Campaigns should be run on the issues and I don't like to inject personalities and personal relationships into a political campaign. But, the relationship between Frank Sharp and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin cannot be swept under the rug.

The new book about the Texas stock fraud scandal, "Texas Under a Cloud," tells about that relationship. On page 128 the book says:

"Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin... got some free newspaper publicity when it was revealed in October, 1971, that he received a 'stock tip' from Frank Sharp - while Martin and his family were Sharp's ranch guests late in 1969 and again at Sharp's Houston office early in 1970."

"Sharp was trying personally to sell National Bankers Life stock to Martin, although the attorney general said that Sharp never mentioned the possibility of Sharps' town Bank loans to buy the stock. 'Martin said that he turned the stock offer down because it would have cost too much, because NBL was in 'shaky' condition, and because he did not buy 'speculative' stocks."

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official's accepting a stock tip of that sort - perhaps, because Martin, as attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharps' town State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin. 'Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC.'"

"As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion. 'Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?'"

Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968.

I certainly would appreciate your support. It is time for a change.

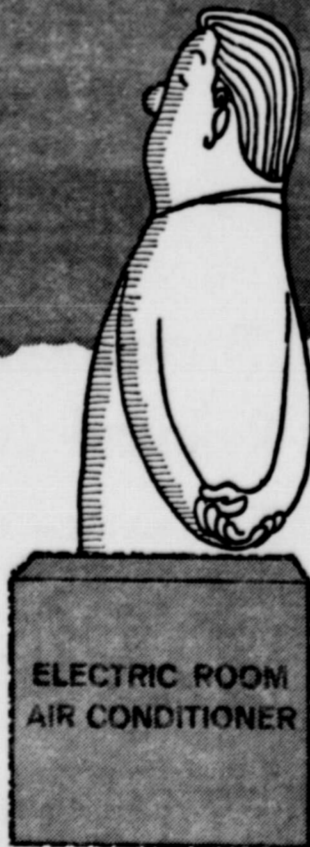

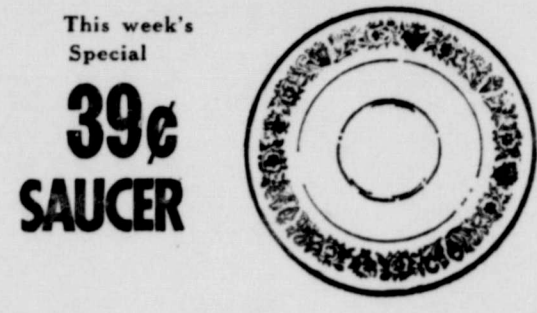

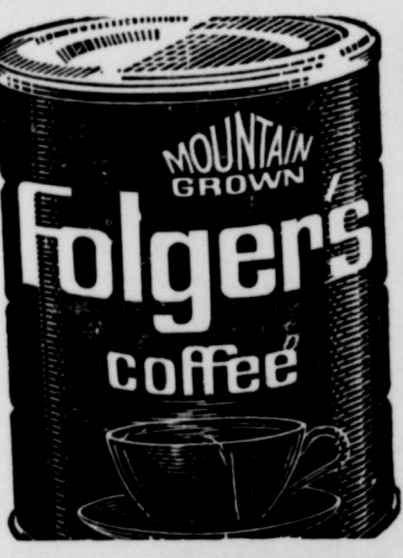

**Highlights and Sidelights from The State Capitol**

Austin, Tex.—State lawmakers polished off billboard control and primary election finance legislation in a three-day special session—and added far-reaching procedural reform rules for good measure.

They will be back to work in June on budget and tax matters. In their "mini-session," the legislators—many anxious to get back to the campaign trails—logged these accomplishments:

\* They provided for emergency state financing of the May and June primary elections and set aside \$2 million to pay the bills.

Another long-term primary finance measure will be necessary next year.

\* They moved to meet federal highway beautification requirements by outlawing billboards within 660 feet of major highways and providing for screening of junkyards. The measure will cost the state about \$5 million a year in condemnation costs for five years. But it will prevent a \$24 million loss of federal highway construction funds for non-compliance with regulations.

\* Both House and Senate adopted joint rules including sharp limitations on powers of conference committees to write new legislative matters without majority permission.

\* The House also accepted rules installing a limited seniority system for committee assignments, reducing the number of committees from 46 to 25 and providing for electronic recording of House and committee proceedings.

\* Legislators also made Texas the eighth state to ratify a proposed federal constitutional amendment guaranteeing equal legal rights for women.

Highlight of the opening day was election of Rep. Rayford Price, 35, of Palestine as new speaker of the House. Price won 77-65 over Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi. He succeeds Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham who resigned after his conviction for bribery conspiracy.

Labor costs for marketing farm products account for 47 per cent of the total expense of getting food from farm to consumer, according to agricultural researchers.

**Brucellosis Eradication**

Action is needed to "weed" the brucellosis testing program so that the dreaded cattle disease can be eradicated, emphasizing James Armstrong, extension veterinarian. Although all counties are "modified-brucellosis free" at present, of these have delinquent and will lose their status unless certain requirements are met. When a reactor is discovered, the herd must be slaughtered, the herd must be anted and a test date set. Dairy herd with a suspicious ring test must be quarantined, blood tested. All infected must be retested in not more than 120 days after the last retest.
